Six Large Tents Will Be **Erected Before** Week End

A total of 630 feet of frontage has been subscribed for by exhibitors for the coming Northern State Fair in Escanaba September 27-28-29. More requests for space are coming in reg-

A gang of men are now on the grounds, putting them in shape and erecting a band stand and other necessary buildings. The huge tents will be erected before the end of this week, allowing the exhibition to put in their displays.

To Erect Six Tents. Six tents will be erected. Two of these are as large as the ordinaary circus tent, being 150 by 200 feet and 150 by 210 feet, respectively. There are four smaller teuts, 30 by 50 feet each, for live stock exhibits.

The secretary today announced that he has received several letters from farmers requesting the space be held for their exhibits. He says that there will be plenty of room for all agricultural exhibits, and that the space which is now almost completely sold is for industrial exhibits.

Issues Explanation. He issues the following explanation:

To Farm and Garden Exhibitors: "Many letters are coming to my deak from those who wish to make exhibits of farm produce, stock, poultry, etc. asking us to reserve space for them. SUPREME

IN DETROIT SPEECH TODAY TAFT UPHOLDS JUDICIAL BODY IN TOBACCO CAUSES.

(By Associated Press.)

Detroit, Sept. 18 .- President Taft, at a luncheon with the Board of Commerce here today, made the first of speeches of his six weeks' tour of the country. He took up the trusts and clearly outlined his views concerning them.

He defended, with much vigor the decisions of the United States supreme court in the Standard Oll and tobacco trust cases and were was a distinct campaign note in the president's challenge to his ancient political enemy, William Jennings Bryan, to point out what particular contract or restraint of trade he would condemn which would not be condemned within the definition of the statute as laid down by Chief Justice White.

Will Not Visit Home of LaFoHette. President Taft today declined an invitation to visit the Wisconsin university at Madison, the home of Senator LaFollette. He said that his itinerary prevents him from accepting the Defends Supreme Court.

With the recent activity of the supreme court as his theme throughout, he said in part:

"I repeat again that in spite of all the denunciations that we have heard of the decision of the supreme court in the Standard Oil and Tobacco cases, there is not one who has criticized them that can formulate a contract in restraint of trade that ought tract in restraint of trade that ought to come within the statute that does not come within it under the decision of the supreme court.

It is said that the supreme court has read something into the statute that was not there before; that it has inserted the word "reasonable" before restraints of trade, when the same court had said that this could not be properly done, because congress had evidently not intended to include such a limiting word in the statute. This is not fair to the court. It is true that the court, in the early days of the construction of the statute, had said that it could not limit the statute in effect by excluding from its operation what was deemed reasonable at common law. But as other cases arose it found it necessary to make exceptions to the literal operation of the words "restraint of trade," and it did so by excepting what was minor, or incidental, or indirect, and including only those cases where the chief object of the contract or combination was the restraint. In doing so the court said that it must give the statute a reasonable construction and not one leading to absurd or ridiculous re-

NAHMA ROAD WORK TO BEGIN AT ONCE

After re-advertising for bids the county road commissioners in a meeting Saturday at the court house awarded the contract for the two miles of road in Nahma township to the Delta Contracting company, which submitted the lowest proposal for the work. The Solid Rock Construction company was the only other bidder. The latter concern bid \$8,955 for the work comblete, while the successful bidder asked a price of \$4,100 per mile. The work, which consists of repairing the road with gravel, following grading, will be instituted at once, and must be finished by December 1.

Thorsen Brothers of Stonington were given the contract for improving the west end of the Portage road in Bay de Noc township for \$1,420 and \$1 per cubic yard for rock work. Two other bids were presented but the Stonington concern furnished the lowest figure.

TEN KILLED AFTER PRESIDENT'S SPEECH

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 18.-In full view of 50,000 persons, shortly after President Taft had left the state fair grounds, a big racing automobile plunged through the race track fence late Saturday, crashing into the crowd and killing six men outright; decapiating a boy, whose father was among the killed; fatally injuring three who later died in hospitals and seriously injuring eleven more. The total dead at midnight was ten.

The accident occurred at the first turn of the track after leaving the grandstand. On the inside of the oval the people were jammed against the fence. The racers had just completed the forty-third mile of the race, and De Palma was leading, Oldfield was coming close behind.
