PHILADELPHIA ATHLETICS WIN THE CHAMPIONSHIP

LEADERS OF THE AMERICAN LEAGUE BECOME CHAMPIONS OF THE BASEBALL WORLD IN A RUNAWAY GAME.

FAIRLY SLAUGHTER THE GIANTS

New York Giants, Champions of National League Overwhelmed in What Proves Final Game of the Series—Telegraphic Story of the Game.

(By Associated Press.) Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 26.—Philadelphia is considered pretty sleepy in some things, but it is evidently very much awake when it comes to baseball.

The Game in Detail. Philadelphia, Oct. 26.—With weather conditions favorable, the fans turned out early and by nine o'clock there were thousands lined up at the bleachers waiting as patient as possible to see if the Athletics could revenge themselves for the loss of yesterday's game and carry off the world's championship.

All the veterans of the series were in their places, Ames and Meyers starting the game for the Giants and Bender and Thomas for the Athletics. The game by innings.

TAFT INVADING THE "ENEMY'S COUNTRY"

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OF THE NATION IS TODAY VISITING AT POINTS IN WISCONSIN, THE STRONGHOLD OF LAFOLLETTE.

(By Associated Press.) Green Bay, Wis., Oct. 26.—President Taft today entered the "enemy's country"—Wisconsin, the home of Senator La Follette, who may be his opponent for the Republican Presidential nomination in 1912. The president arrived here early today. He is due in Milwaukee tonight and will make a large number of stops and rear end platform speeches during the day. Fond du Lac which had withdrawn and released an invitation to the president, will be reached at four o'clock this afternoon. His reception there excites great interest. Mr. Taft before reaching Fond du Lac will make stops at Appleton and Oshkosh, giving nearly three hours of his time to Oshkosh. In the estimation of members of the Taft party, the reception given the president here was not surpassed at any point on the present trip. None of the "insurgent" members of congress from Wisconsin were present at the station to extend a welcoming hand, but Senator Stephenson, former Governor W. D. Hoar and Congressman Knop did the honors. Fifteen thousand people assembled around the court house heard President Taft's speech on the subject of "Peace Arbitration." CHINESE TROOPS MUTINY AND KILL THEIR LEADERS

SITUATION AT VARIOUS POINTS OF REVOLT IN CHINA IS BECOMING MORE ACUTE AND CHARGED WITH DEATH.

MORE WARSHIPS ARE ASKED FOR

Reported That General Chao Erh Fend and Minister of War Lin Tehang Have Been Murdered—Empire and Family Prepare to Seek Japanese Protection at Mukden.

(By Associated Press.) Peking, Oct. 26.—Chinese newspapers report that troops at Cheng Tu, the capital of Sze Chuen in that province, have mutilated and killed General Chao Erh Feng, commander of the imperial forces, and have joined the rebels who now hold the capital.

The American legation is asking for more warships to be sent to Chinese waters.

Shang Suan Hual, minister of communications, who negotiated the foreign railroad loan has been dismissed from office in accordance to a demand made by the national assembly.

Ruler to Seek Refuge. Shanghai, China, Oct. 26.—A Chinese newspaper announces that Minister of War Yin Tehang was assassinated by his own troops. It is also announced by the same paper that Canton was seized by revolutionists after great bloodshed.

Native newspapers also announce positively that the emperor and his family are prepared to start for Mukden, Manchuria, where protection is guaranteed by the Japanese. Later it is said that the imperial family will set sail for the United States.

London, Oct. 26.—Indefinite rumors are afloat this morning in Vienna and Berlin, that Emperor Nicholas of Russia has been assassinated, but careful inquiries have failed to elicit the slightest confirmation of this report. The emperor has been stopping at the palace at Yalta, Crimea.

ESCANABA GETS ANOTHER GOOD NEW ENTERPRISE

BARREL FACTORY AND COOPER SHOP ESTABLISHED IN A TEMPORARY LOCATION ON LUDINGTON STREET.

ALREADY IN FULL OPERATION.

Although in Operation But a Short Time, Many Orders Are Received From Local and Outside Concerns and Success Is Apparently Assured—Permanent Factory Building In Prospect.

Fresh proof that Escanaba is growing and spreading is received every day. New enterprises are being launched and new capital is being put into the industries of the metropolis of the upper peninsula.

The latest addition to the commercial business of the city is a new barrel factory and cooper shop that has been opened at 207 Ludington street. This concern came into existence a week or more ago, established itself in temporary headquarters and is already doing an amount of business that is gratifying to the men who have come here and put their money into the enterprise.

Doing Good Business. Deliveries are being made frequently to the chemical plant, extract plant and other concerns of the city which can use its product. This local trade is by no means the limit of the business the new concern does or expects to do, however. Orders have already come from the Pioneer Iron company at Marquette and other out of town firms.

The whole northern peninsula will be canvassed for business and there is no reason to doubt that the new barrel factory will prove a success and that the men who have backed it will be amply repaid for their faith in coming here to invest their money.

It is the intention of the promoters of the enterprise to lease or erect a building for their factory as soon as arrangements to that end can be perfected.

DOCTORS DIFFER OVER QUARANTINE

RECENT QUARANTINING OF HOSPITAL BECOMES SUBJECT FOR CONSIDERABLE COMMENT IN THE CITY.

Considerable comment has been made by local physicians and others relative to the placing of the Delta County hospital under quarantine, when a maid employed in a family suffered from scarlet fever, became ill with the disease and was removed under a physician's supervision to the institution last Monday.

Putting a hospital under quarantine is an unheard of thing, according to the opinions expressed today by various local physicians and it is declared that only the afflicted maid's quarters in the hospital should have been quarantined.

Health Commissioner H. W. Long, took a decidedly different view when interviewed today.

Dr. Long said that while it may not be customary to quarantine a hospital, yet he had a perfect right to do it and that in so doing he was simply fulfilling his duty as a health officer.

"The state board of health will always back me up in any action of this kind," said Dr. Long, "and I have its entire approval in this case. I have a right to quarantine any place, whatsoever, that harbors a case of contagious disease."

VAN BROTHERS BUY A CREAMERY

According to information received by The Mirror, the Phillips creamery situated about four miles east of Stephenson has been purchased by the Van Brothers of Escanaba. Hugh Phillips, the former owner, has been operating the plant for a number of years, and it has proved a very satisfactory industry to the farmers of the community. The Van Brothers, who own a number of other creameries, have taken over the plant and are operating it at present. The plant is running continuously, and while part of the cream is made into butter there, the rest is shipped to Escanaba.

QUAKER MINISTER MAY ESTABLISH "NATURE SCHOOL"

S. DONALD ROGERS, MISSIONARY AND EVANGELISTIC WORKER OF SOME NOTE, FAVORS ESCANABA WITH A VISIT.

WILL STAY IN CITY TWO WEEKS.

He is Looking for a Desirable Location for the Establishment of a "Nature School"—Tells of His Conflict and Experience with Management of the Marquette Prison.

S. Donald Rogers, whose former home was at Vassar, Mich., a Quaker minister who has traveled extensively in this country and England in connection with his missionary and evangelistic work, is now in Escanaba for a stay of about two weeks.

Mr. Rogers has been on the upper Peninsula since the middle of April in connection with his regular work, and in the meantime has been quietly looking over the U. P. with the view of finding a desirable location and suitable opening for a "Nature School," as he calls it, a school along the lines of agriculture, industrial and manual training, domestic science, etc., with a proper setting and environment in regard to keeping next to nature.

By the way, it may be mentioned here that this is the same S. Donald Rogers who had the pleasure and privilege of spending a few weeks at the Marquette prison last spring, at the special invitation of the warden and Governor Osborn.

Talks of What He Did. "Now, the Quaker ministers," said Mr. Rogers, "have a way of their own of doing things, a way akin to that which David used when he slew Goliath with a few small stones from the brook, and what I did to the Marquette prison system of discipline was practically the same thing that David did to Goliath—he put it out of business, and fortunately for all concerned, he used exactly the same means as David did, with the slight variations essential to modern conditions."

For it so happens that in school work and other ways I have proved the efficiency of human kindness in the management and control of human beings. And so after due investigation, being convinced that the methods and system of Warden Russell were very much at fault, I quietly got hold of a few simple facts in regard to the management and laid them before the governor, and the governor who was looking for information, got busy and turned the management upside down.

"The jury has done that for you," said the judge before imposing sentence in reply to Raue's declaration that he did not seem to find himself guilty. Raue has been taken to the state penitentiary at Waupun, Wis.

SHORT SESSION OF THE U. S. COURT

According to the Marquette Mining Journal, the adjourned session of the United States court, which convenes at Marquette November 7, will in all probability be quite short. There are but a few criminal or civil cases on the calendar and the indications are that these will be quickly disposed of. Two Delta county men are among those who have been drawn to serve as traverse jurors during the term. These are W. J. Clark of Escanaba and Henry Kassten of Ford River.

DECLARES WAR ON JOY-RIDERS

JUDGE COLLINS OF INDIANAPOLIS IS AFTER THE SPEED-FIEND AND THE NOISE-MAKER—HIS VIEWS SET FORTH IN THE FOLLOWING ARTICLE.

Judge James A. Collins, of Indianapolis, has declared war on the joy-rider. He is also the enemy of the maker of unnecessary noise. In this, the third year of his term as City Judge of Indianapolis, he is making a record that leads the rest of the United States, in point of justice meted out to offenders.

"I believe," said Judge Collins, in discussing existing conditions, "that the only remedy for the misuse of automobile horns is to make the penalty for their misuse so severe that there will, be few second offenses."

"That the ultimate solution of the warning signal problem is restrictive, not prohibitive, legislation is apparent to anyone who has given the subject intelligent thought. It is the logical result of the fact that the greatest trouble for motorists is made by the actions of persons under eighteen years of age. There should be a warning signal, with a harsh, abrupt note, that will be recognized as a warning of danger. But it must not be used unnecessarily loud or often, and only for a warning of danger. The law must regulate its use. This is the solution of the problem.

"I am now mentally framing a law the passage of which I shall urge at the next meeting of the Indiana Legislature, which will require every driver of a motor car to take an examination to demonstrate whether or not he has the ability to drive a car. Such person is to be given a license if he passes the examination, and no person shall be granted a license who is under 18 years of age. The driving of a motor car in Indiana except by persons holding a license will, in consequence, become a statutory offense. Arrangements will be made whereby the law will not work a hardship upon tourists.

"Furthermore, when any holder of a license violates the statute, the clerk of the court of record where conviction is obtained will be required to forward notification of such conviction to the Secretary of State. Upon receipt of this information the Secretary of State shall notify the convicted license holder to turn in his license. Should he fail to do this, his arrest will follow.

"When I began my term of office of fenders against the Automobile Speed Law had been accustomed, upon conviction, to paying a fine of \$1 and costs. I made it \$10 and costs, and the newspapers roared me for not making it more. The second year I made it \$20 and costs. Beginning the first of last January, I made the fine \$1 a mile and costs. If a man is speeding thirty-five miles an hour, he will get thirty five dollars and costs, and according to that ratio.

"That is the only way to handle the speed and the automobile warning signal problems. If I find the fines do not stop the nuisance so far as the speeding is concerned, imprisonment will follow. It makes no difference who the offender is. All will get the same treatment from me."
