

#### A MODERN HELEN

privation. One morning when the Dutchmen awoke and were preparing their breakfast of stale victuals they beard a clatter of tongues and, looking over the ramparts, saw a number of women coming with baskets on their arms. They were too far off for the Dutchmen to hear what they said or in what language they spoke. When they came pear the fort its commander bailed them and asked them where they were going. One of the women replied that they were taking butter and eggs and vegetables to the market to sell. When they came directly beneath the fort they displayed their produce to the hungry Dutchmen, who said thes would gladly take their whole supply but they must act quickly, for if the French enemies saw them they would prevent the sale.


