"After having corresponded with clinicians of world-wide repute on this subject," explained Dr. Guild, "I feel, fully justified in my belief that there is no distinctive disease in either man or dog to which the term 'rables' can be correctly applied. Some of the world's most distinguished clinicists have assured me that they have never seen a case of 'rables' in a dog and do not profess to know what malady is meant by that term. These distinguished canine pathologists tell me that the madness or delirium manifested in a so-called 'mad dog' is merely symptomatic of some brain disorder in the canine 'patient.'

DECLARES RABIES

(Continued from page one.)

"One of the surest ways of treatment for converting a dog bite, a rusty nail, pick or a wound from any cause, into hydrophobia, lockjaw or other forms of septic infection, is to cauterize the wound, even if the patient is afterwards sent to a mad dog cure.

"The kind of dressing to create septic poisoning, which may take several forms-namely rables, lockjaw or septicemia-is to cauterize the woundseal it up, as it were, with coagulated blood. 

THANKSGIVING DAY.

Along with the announcement in a dispatch from Chicago of President Taft's designation of Thursday, November 30th, 1911, as a day of thanksgiving and prayer, some newspapers have published the statement that the propriety of observing Thanksgiving Day on the fifth Thursday of November is disputed-that the fourth Thursday should be observed instead.

This is sheer insurgency, says the Milwaukee Evening Wisconsin. The day appointed by the President is Thanksgiving Day. Unusually, but not always, it is the fourth Thursday in the month. There were days of prayer and praise proclaimed by the Dutch governors of New Amsterdam in 1664, 1645 and 1666. The English governors of New York followed the example of their predecessors in 1755 and 1760 Throughout the Revolution the Congress annually recommended days of thanksgiving, and President Washington appointed a day of national Thanksgiving in 1789 and again in 1795. The date which he named in 1795 was Thursday, the 9th of Febru-

From the time of Washington to the great crisis of the Civil War Thanksgiving Day was not enjoined by Presidential proclamation, but was merely a local observance in some of the states, the proclamations being issued by the governors. It was Lincoln who revived the day, and the following of his example made it an annual na tional institution. His proclamation of 1863 named as Thanksgiving Day the last Thursday of November in that year. Since 1863 every President of the United States has appointed the last Thursday of November as a national day of Thanksgiving, and nearly all the governors of the states have followed with proclamations for their respective states.


