ANCIENT DOCUMENT BROUGHT TO LIGHT

A. R. MOORE FINDS DEED FOR HIS OLD FAMILY HOMESTEAD MADE OUT TO GREAT-GREAT-GRANDFATHER.

While A. R. Moore was visiting his old home at Squirrel Island, Me., last month he went through some of his father's old papers and among a lot of other documents found a title to the old family homestead. The deed is printed in old style type and expressed in the phraseology of long ago is made out to Joseph Moore, great-great-grandfather of A. R. Moore and bears the date January 22, 1803. Joseph Moore bought this tract of 10 acres from the direct heirs of the English nobles to whom the land was originally granted by the English King James the First, about the year 1588.

The description of the land as given in the old deed says that the tract is in the Kennebec valley, but aside from that it gives the present day lawyer very little information that he could really use.

On the reverse side of the document is given a full recitation of the original grant and the subsequent owners of the tract, printed in quaint old type and in the language of a day long gone. The legal form is of course identical with the one still in use to the present day. The first paragraph of this odd document reads as follows: "TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, GREETING: "Whereas his late Majesty King James the First, for the Advancement of a Colony and Plantation in New England in America, by his Highness Letters Patents under the Great Seal of England, bearing Date at Westminster, the Third Day of November, the Eighteenth Year of his Highness Reign of England, & did grant unto the Right Honorable Lodowick, late Lord Duke of Lennox, George, late Lord Marquis of Buckingham, James Marquis of Hamilton, Thomas, Earl of Arundell, Robert, Earle of Warwick, Sir Fernando Gorges, Knt., and divers others whose names are expressed in the said Letters Patents at their successors," etc, etc.

Mr. Moore brought this document with him to Escanaba and has had framed so that he may keep it as a quaint antiquity whose history, to him at least, is interesting.

**CHAPTER XXII.

BARELY had Sheldon reached the Balesuna, when he heard the faint report of a distant rifle and knew it was the signal of Tudor, giving notice that he had reached the Balesuna, turned about, and was coming back. Sheldon fired his rifle into the air in answer, and in turn proceeded to advance. He moved as in a dream, absent mindedly keeping to the open beach. The thing was so preposterous that he had to struggle to realize it, and he reviewed in his mind the conversation with Tudor, trying to find some clue to the common sense of what he was doing. NEW GET-RICH-QUICK SCHEME; IN CAT SKINS!

FINE CHANCE FOR NORTHERN PENINSULA INVESTORS IT IS SAID; CAT FUR TO MAKE WEALTH.

Postmaster Campbell of Chicago was presented today with a scheme that comes almost as near a solution of endless motion as the plan of dumping refuse into the Chicago river and then digging it out again, with profit in each operation.

"A Most Wonderful Proposition."

He received a letter, reading as follows:

Knowing you have had some interest in the fur business I take the liberty of presenting you with what seems to me a most wonderful proposition, and in which no doubt you will take a lively interest and perhaps wire me the amount of stock that you wish to subscribe towards the formation of this company, The object of the company is to

operate a large cat ranch in or near Oakland, where land can be purchased cheap for this purpose.

To start with we will collect about, say, 100,000 cats. Each cat will average twelve kittens a year. The skins will run from 10 cents each for the white ones to 75 cents for the pure black. This will give us 12,000,000 skins a year to sell at an average of 20 cents apiece, making our revenue about \$10,000 a day gross.

A man can skin fifty per day for \$2. It will take 100 men to operate the ranch and therefore the net profit will thus be \$9,800 per day.

We will feed the cats on rates and will start a rat ranch next door. The rats multiply four times as fast as cats. If we start with 1,000,000 rats we will have therefore four rats per day for each cat, which is plenty.

Now, then, we will feed the rats on the carcasses from which the skins have been taken, giving each rat a fourth of a cat.

It will thus be seen that the business will be self-supporting and automatic all the way through. The cats will eat the rats and the rats will eat the cats, and we will get the skins.

The concern also produces all cedar products; shipping many ties, poles and posts. It is a common saying that the company would saw anything that floats and the figures which follow tend to prove the statement. During the seven months which they operate their mills their cut is approximately as follows:
