ARTHUR LINDQUIST RAPS ON THE CHIEF-MAKES A NEW CON-FESSION.

IVERSON GETS FACT

The Accused Sald He Had Been Thinking the Matter Over and Had Decided to Tell All He Knew Concerning the Murder of Fogarty-Admits Having Helped to Dispose of Body.

Chief of Police Iverson, who has been working hard to unravel the facts surounding the slaying of Alvin Fogarty, ever since the finding of the body a few weeks ago, declared today that the entire mystery will be cleared up very soon. Yesterday Arthur Lindquist, one of the trio of suspects in custody, rapped on his cell door at police headquarters and asked to "I'm going to tell you everything I know," he is quoted as saying. "I have give you all the facts." The chief he has hitherto kept from the police. evening at 7:30 o'clock.

Chief Iverson said that he considered it policy not to divulge the full details of the new confession, but he remarked that Lindquist's latest explanation throws a great deal of light on the murder mystery and will help the authorities in arriving at a complete solution of the affair. He Led British Conservative Party For Many Years.

FEW HAVE RISEN SO RAPIDLY.

Was First Elected to Parliament In 1874, When Twenty-six Years Old. Late Marquis of Sallsbury Was His Uncle and Helped Shape His Career.

ish Conservative party, both in office and opposition and who has just resigned his leadership, was born in 1848. His father was James Maitland Balfour, scion of a distinguished Scottish family, and his mother was Lady Blanche Cecil, a sister of the late Marquis of Salisbury. The boy was educated at Eton and Cambridge university. He was a great favorite of his uncle, the Marquis of Salisbury, who had great faith in his abilities, and in 1874 be was able to enter parliament as a Conservative from Hertford, Four years later be became his uncle's private secretary, and from that moment his upward progress in political life was constant.

In 1878 he accompanied Lord Salis bury to Berlin, and on his return to England associated himself with what was called the Fourth party. He did not prove himself a remarkably energetic member of this resisting asso-

BUSINESS MEN DECLARE THAT REMOVAL OF FIRE STATION WOULD BE A GREAT MENACE TO PROPERTY.

MAY CIRCULATE A PETITION

The Idea of Depriving the Lower End of the City of Fire Station No. 2 is a Ridiculous Proposition Say Various Business Men-Half of the City Would Be in Danger.

Various prominent business men of the city when interviewed today regarding the proposed removal of the No. 2 fire station, expressed themselves as strongly averse to any such move. It would greatly endanger life and property in the lower end of the city. That is the prevailing sentiment among them.

'Why the very idea is absurd, ridiculous," said one business man. They might as well remove the entire fire department far out into the outskirts of the town, as to attempt to do away with the lower end department. Look at the large number of wooden structures that would be exposed to the danger of fire. If a fire should start over there, half of the buildings might be burning before the fire department would arrive from the West end."

"This talk about removing the fire station at the lower end of Escanaba sounds like a mere child's talk," said another business man.

Petition or Injunction.

"It will not be done if the business interests here have anything to say. I can't understand the purpose of such a proposition. Remove No. 2 fire station! Why it would be a crazy action! If they attempt to carry out any such move a petition will be circulated to restrain such action, and presented before the city council, or perhaps we might get an injunction in court to stop the removal."

riation, and in 1884 the ught it wisest to sever his active connection with it. He soon became a privy conscilor and president of the local government board. In 1886, when his uncle returned to power he found himself a member of the cabinet and secretary for Scotland.

Excelled In Debate.

Meanwhile, he had been steadily establishing his influence in the house of commons, where he was recognized as a fluent, subtle and forcible debater. Soon he was appointed to the exacting post of chief secretary for Ireland.

Thus Mr. Balfour got his foot upon the first step of the ladder. The crimes act and the creation of the congested board were features of his Irish policy. In 1890 he made a prolonged tour in Mayo, Donegal and other western districts of Ireland and met with an exceedingly cordial reception from the peasantry, then in imminent danger of famine. This calamity fell upon them in 1805, and Mr. Balfour issued a public appeal which resulted in the collection of \$300,000

In October of 1891 W. H. Smith (Old Mornlity), the respected leader of the Unionists in the house of commons, passed away, and Mr. Baffour was called by the unanimous voice of his party to succeed him. A rise so swift is rare in British political annals. In the general election of 1892 his par-

ty was beaten, and when he again entered the house of commons it was as Hay Feyer and Summer Golds leader of the opposition,

On the return of the Unionist party to power in 1895 Mr. Balfour once more became first lord of the treasury and leader of the house of commons In 1905, by which time his government had plainly lost much in public confidence, he resigned, and at the ensuing general election he and his party were overwhelmingly defeated.

Since then he has, been in opposition. and his leadership until very recently had never been directly challenged. Mr. Balfour in his leisure moments has found much delight in philosophic speculation. His best known works are "A Defense of Philosophic Doubt" "Foundations of Belief." He is also the author of a Romanes lectureship on "Decadence," and he has been the recipient of many honors from various universities.

CURIOUS BITS OF HISTORY

A DUMPING GROUND FOR JAIL-BIRDS.

By A. W. MACY.

Prior to the revolution England used the American colonies as a dumping-ground for her undesirable citizens. It is estimated that between 1717 and 1775 not less than 50,000 corlvicts, of all kinds and of both sexes, were taken from the jalls of Great Britain and Ireland and transported to the American colonies, where they were condemned to hard labor and hired out to the settlers. The Maryland colony suffered most from the affliction, 20,000 or more of the jall-birds being sent there. Some of them, however, had been convicted of slight offenses.

Contracts in force at the beganing of the fiscal year were practically completed and new contracts entered into for a vast amount of frames, valves gates and other paraphernalia needed to put the canal into operation. More than 954 tons of castings were made on the isthmus. Building of the great lock gates-each leaf of which is fifty four feet eight inches high-was expedited. At each lock en rance strong fender chains attached to powerful springs will be installed to prevent ships from battering down the locks.

The Culebra cut is ten miles long and deep enough to receive the United States capitol, dome and all. From there remained 23,924,140 cubic yards to be removed. Estimates of excava tion necessary in this cut have been largely increased to allow for the great earth slides. Last year these slides cutting after it had been practically completed was 4,879,378 yards, or over 30 per cent of all the material removed

when the natural slope of the canal banks is restored.

Breaks have occurred on both sides squeezed upward by the pressure from beneath and from the sides, interrupting the drainage and covering up the railread tracks. To meet this condition intermediate benches bave been cut along the slope to distribute the top weight and reduce the amount of material to be removed. It is declared that when the bottom grade of the canal is reached no further trouble need be anticipated, as greater stability will be given by the water.

Slides Qidn't Increase Cost. The slides have caused no increase in the total estimated cost of the Cule-Beth Elliott ripens rapidly, and Beth bra cut. The Cucaracha slide covered 47.1 acres and the Culebra slide #6.6

The temperature for the calendar year 1910 was about normal for all the stations. The highest recorded was 94 degrees F. at Ancon on March 13. 1910, and the lowest, 61 degrees F., at Culebra on March 21, 1910.

The average rainfall over the canal zone for the calendar year 1910 was well above normal, being unusually heavy in July and December, but be-

low that of the previous year. Slight seismic disturbances were of frequent occurrence during the year. very few of which, however, were physically observed in the zone.

The work performed for the sanitary amount expended by the quartermaster's department on orders from the sanitary department for zone sanita-

At the end of the fiscal year this department was operating the Tivoli hotel, nineteen line hotels, three night restaurants, sixteen European laborers' messes and fourteen common-laborers kitchens, an increase of one hotel and a decrease of three messes and four kitchens. The total number of meals served by the hotels was 2,216,740. which was an increase of 40,289 over the previous fiscal year. The cost of supplies per meal was 25.44 cents, or 0.57 cent more than during the previous fiscal year, and the expense in preparing and serving meals was 0.62 cent less, or 5.61 cents, resulting in a decrease in the total cost per meal of 0.05
