### HOW THE PRESIDENT TRAVELLED

(Continued from page one.)  
and cities at different stopping points and provisions for the eating, sleeping and working accommodations for the members of the party were all worked out to an exact science by those in charge of President Taft's tour of the country.  
Railroads Get Paid Well.  
"Under the law, the President is allowed traveling expenses to the extent of \$25,000 a year, but that sum probably will fall short of the actual cost of the President's travels for the present year, and the outlay does not include the cost of at least two of the cars of the special train or the provisions made for the press representatives and others of the party. In the old days, when passes were in order, the cost of transportation was practically nothing. Today, the railroads re-

quire the payment of twenty-five fares for each sleeper or day coach transported. There were three of these regularly a part of the President's special. That called for the expenditure of money enough for seventy-five fares, while there are only twenty-three members of the regular party accompanying the President. It is a matter of simple mathematical computation to ascertain what the railroads will get as their share of the outlay, as they will collect for seventy-five fares for 16,000 miles.  
President and Press Divide Expenses.  
"This expense is apportioned between the President and the newspapers and press associations represented on the train. The Associated Press and United States each had representatives, while the Western Union was represented by a special man who carried expert operators with him as needed and made certain that the President and the newspapers had the finest telegraphic facilities at their disposal. Six of the big Eastern newspapers had staff correspondents with the train and representatives of the larger papers in the states through-

which the party passed were provided with accommodations on the special for such distances as they desired to accompany the party. Incidentally, as illustrating the expense to which newspapers are put to procure news of such events as the President's tour, each of the daily papers that was represented on the train throughout the trip had to pay about \$1,500 for transportation, meals and sleeping accommodations on the special train, while expense for telegraph tolls will exceed that amount by a considerable sum for each paper. Newspaper representatives accompanying the train for short trips, extending over one or a few days, pay \$25 a day, which includes their transportation, meals and sleeping accommodations.  
"Of course the chief point of interest in the special train is the President's car, the Ideal, a typical private car of steel construction, with an observation and dining room, bathroom and five or six compartments. The observation end of the car is really the moving White House, for where the President sits is the head of the government. This is the executive office, although the President's clerks and stenographers have a working apartment of their own.

"The Florida, another compartment car, accommodates the regular and special newspaper men. Most of the regular newspaper men with the party represent the big Eastern dailies and the press associations have learned from experience to transform their compartments into working dens, with typewriters, paste, scissors and all the equipment of the working desk at the home office.  
Co-operation in Handling News.  
"By a plan of co-operation by the President's representatives, the press correspondents and the Western Union, the difficulties of gathering and forwarding news of the trip was reduced to a minimum. W. W. Mischler and C. C. Wagner, official stenographers to the President, accompanied the party, made shorthand reports of every speech, long and short, and promptly transcribed them, furnishing copies to all of the press representatives with the party. Usually before the train stops at a station, the newspaper men have official stenographic reports of the speech made at the last stop, this system leaving the correspondents' time between stations to prepare their 'leads' and their observations on the incident of the trip. With this data in hand, the work of forwarding the reports by wire was the next consideration. H. F. Taft, manager of the Western Union office at Washington, had personal direction of this work. He has made a number of tours with Presidents and other public officials and has his system reduced to an exact science. Keeping in constant touch with the telegraph offices ahead of the train he knew just where and when to file reports in time to catch the afternoon or morning papers. If the train is traversing a thinly populated country, where fast operators are scarce, Mr. Taft made a requisition on the nearest large city and carried a corps of trained operators with him. These were dropped off, in numbers required at filing stations, catching up with the train later. In Wyoming, Montana and South Dakota, Mr. Taft had eight lightning code operators at his disposal and used them to such an advantage that messages were handled with as little delay as would mark operations at St. Paul or Chicago. At Hingham, S. D., for example, the day operator was on duty. The night operator was called out and when the press reports amounted to something like 20,000 words ready for filing at 10:35 a. m., two expert operators were dropped from the President's train and the reports were cleared in time for pub-



lication in the Dispatch of that afternoon and in the newspapers of the East, in spite of the hour's difference in time. The night stops were usually made at larger towns and cities. Here Mr. Taft or myself took personal charge of the office and superintended the forwarding of the press reports and the official business of the President. Mr. Taft has the record of every word sent about the trip since the start. He has not made up his statistical report yet, but predicts that there are more words in the reports of the 16,000-mile trip than there are in the Encyclopedia Britannica.

Physical Director of Radcliffe Announces a Novel System.

To make Radcliffe college girls the most perfect representatives of womanhood is the plan of Miss Elizabeth Agnes Wright, physical director. The card system has been introduced, and each student will account for her hours of sleep, her hours of exercise and other details of her daily life.

An effort will be made to regulate the amount of exercise taken by each girl daily. Walking will be especially encouraged. Freedom from coughs and colds will be sought. Each day on making out the card the student will state whether she has caught a cold.

That sufficient sleep will be enjoyed by each girl is the hope of Miss Wright, and she believes a proper amount may be insured after the first month's records have been turned in and examined. Recommendations will then be made to the students. Miss Wright expects to treat the students individually.

"If a girl goes so many nights to the theater that in my opinion it might impair her health I will advise her accordingly," she said. "It is purely a matter of personal hygiene so far as I am concerned."

"I believe a girl should get at least eight hours' sleep. Nine hours is better. It is a personal equation."

"I don't think a girl ought to eat pickles or very much candy."

"Radcliffe has a reputation as a place filled with very studious girls. I hope and believe it will earn a reputation of turning out girls perfectly physically as well as perfect scholars."

elation, and in 1884 thought it wisest to sever his active connection with it. He soon became a privy councillor and president of the local government board.

Excelling in Debate. Meanwhile, he had been steadily establishing his influence in the house of commons, where he was recognized as a fluent, subtle and forcible debater.

Thus Mr. Balfour got his foot upon the first step of the ladder. The crimes act and the creation of the congested board were features of his Irish policy.

In October of 1891 W. H. Smith (Old Morality), the respected leader of the Unionists in the house of commons, passed away, and Mr. Balfour was called by the unanimous voice of his party to succeed him.

In the general election of 1892 his party was beaten, and when he again entered the house of commons it was as leader of the opposition.

On the return of the Unionist party to power in 1895 Mr. Balfour once more became first lord of the treasury and leader of the house of commons.

In 1905, by which time his government had plainly lost much in public confidence, he resigned, and at the ensuing general election he and his party were overwhelmingly defeated.

Mr. Balfour in his leisure moments has found much delight in philosophic speculation. His best known works are "A Defense of Philosophic Doubt" and "Foundations of Belief."

## SPENT ON CANAL

(Continued from page one.)

Contracts in force at the beginning of the fiscal year were practically completed and new contracts entered into for a vast amount of frames, valves, gates and other paraphernalia needed to put the canal into operation. More than 954 tons of castings were made on the isthmus. Building of the great lock gates—each leaf of which is fifty-four feet eight inches high—was expedited. At each lock entrance strong fender chains attached to powerful springs will be installed to prevent ships from battering down the locks.

The Culbra cut is ten miles long and deep enough to receive the United States capitol dome and all. From this cut, despite the enormous excavation during the year, on July 1 last there remained 23,924,140 cubic yards to be removed. Estimates of excavation necessary in this cut have been largely increased to allow for the great earth slides. Last year these slides that had to be removed from the canal cutting after it had been practically completed was 4,879,378 yards, or over 30 per cent of all the material removed from the cut.

These slides have occurred where the material excavated was left on a slope steeper than the permanent incline will be, and the trouble is expected to cease when the natural slope of the canal banks is restored.

Breaks have occurred on both sides of the cut where the underlying rock is of poor quality and is broken up and squeezed upward by the pressure from beneath and from the sides, interrupting the drainage and covering up the railroad tracks. To meet this condition intermediate benches have been cut along the slope to distribute the top weight and reduce the amount of material to be removed. It is declared that when the bottom grade of the canal is reached no further trouble need be anticipated, as greater stability will be given by the water.

### Slides Didn't Increase Cost.

The slides have caused no increase in the total estimated cost of the Culbra cut. The Cucaracha slide covered 47.1 acres and the Culbra slide 46.0 acres.

The total appropriations made by congress leave \$81,630,531 of the estimated cost of canal yet to be appropriated.

The temperature for the calendar year 1910 was about normal for all the stations. The highest recorded was 94 degrees F. at Ancon on March 13, 1910, and the lowest, 61 degrees F., at Culbra on March 21, 1910.

The average rainfall over the canal zone for the calendar year 1910 was well above normal, being unusually heavy in July and December, but below that of the previous year.

Slight seismic disturbances were of frequent occurrence during the year. Very few of which, however, were physically observed in the zone.

### Sanitary Work.

The work performed for the sanitary department has increased, the grass cutting area having been further extended to include more territory. The amount expended by the quartermaster's department on orders from the sanitary department for zone sanitation was \$210,403.20 and for hospitals, quarantine, etc., \$77,284.48.

At the end of the fiscal year this department was operating the Tiroll hotel, nineteen line hotels, three night restaurants, sixteen European laborers' messes and fourteen common laborers' kitchens, an increase of one hotel and a decrease of three messes and four kitchens. The total number of meals served by the hotels was 2,216,740, which was an increase of 40,289 over the previous fiscal year. The cost of supplies per meal was 25.44 cents, or 0.57 cent more than during the previous fiscal year, and the expense in preparing and serving meals was 0.62 cent less, or 5.61 cents, resulting in a decrease in the total cost per meal of 0.05 cent.

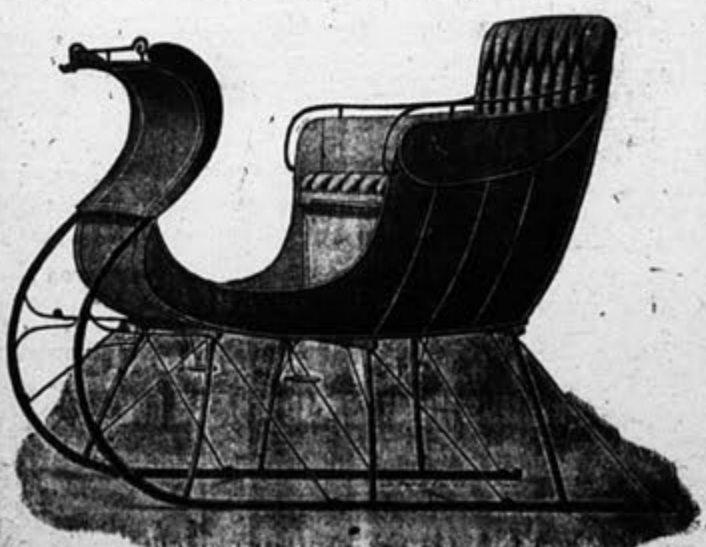
