

It is an heirloom in the imperial German family, having been given by William IV, of England to Frederick William III., great-grandfather of the present emperor. The boat is a full rigged, three masted warship, fifty-five feet in length, drawing but four feet of water and having a capacity of thirty tone. Emperor William's favorite amusement when a boy was to sail in this boat. His brother, Prince Henry, always went with him. This man-of-war can sail the water the same as the largest ship, but the crew must of necessity be limited in number. The name of this great toy is the Royal Louise. after the Prussian Queen Louise.



#### OUT OF THE SAVAGE STATE

By DAVID WALTER CHURCH

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From the time America was discovred to, say, half a century ago there were repeated cases of white children being carried away by Indians and brought up in the tribe. Those that were raised by red men were boys. At any rate, I never read of a girl having received such treatment. Doubtless killed. Savages are not overburdened

with respect for the value of women. Some forty years ago I was a young lieutenant in the -th U. S. cavalry, and my principal business about that our skirmishes with the Sioux we cap-It tured one of the white boys who had been brought up as an Indian. He was a handsome little fellow, tall and straight, about fourteen years old, and his originally white skin from having been exposed had turned brown. ADOPTS NEW SYSTEM.

Door County To Use Uniform Account ing System.

Sturgeon Bay, Nov. 29.-This county is the first in the state to adopt the uniform accounting system, this step being taken by the county board on Wednesday. H. E. Logan of Madison, who introduced the system, was present in the capacity of representatives of the tax commission and appeared before the board, explaining he working of the system.

The new system is a decided improvement over the one now in use in this and most other counties of the state.
