

SAFE AT GRAND UNION HOTEL WAS OPENED EARLY YESTER-DAY MORNING AND \$170 AND OTHER EFFECTS STOLEN.

LOCAL AUTHORITIES MYSTIFIED.

After Midnight on Wednesday Morning Saloon of J. F. Burns Was Entered and \$26.60 Purloined-Sheriff's Office and Police Department Working Hard to Solve Robbery Cases.

Two of the most baffling burglar mysteries which the local authorities have been called upon to solve in recent years, occurred on the mornings of the 20th and 21st respectively. The safe at the Grand Union Hotel, 418 Ludington street was opened after midnight on the latter date and \$170 taken out. A dozen packages of cigarettes and a bottle of rye whiskey was also stolen. Early in the morning on the 20th the saloon of J. F. Burns, 706 Ludington street was robbed of \$26,60. Rev. Father Henri Blanchot, of St Joachim's Roman Catholic church in Detroit yesterday. He says he has watched with interest the controversy going on between those who demand the trial suppression of the happening of the divorce court and those who contend they should be placed before the public "because, as they affirm, the public press is a social mirror and ought to faithfully reflect the failings as wel las the virtuous acts of the present generation."

"I ask any unprejudiced person to read the eight grounds on which a divorce may be obtained in this state and tell me whether, from a purely human standpoint, these laws are not a disgrace to a civilized community and a mockery of what the most ordinary Christian recognizes as the stability of the union between man and wife? Could the pagans of old in all their effeminate degeneracy have devised any more convenient method of shaking off obligations duly contracted by both parties before God and man?

"Let us not, then lay the blame for these scandals on the public press, or rather let us, dispensers of the law and ministers of God, have the courage to attack the root of the evil
