# STACK MILL

DISASTROUS FIRE AT MASON- cabinet, army and navy officials and COMPLETED THE DESTRUCTION OF ENTIRE MILL.

### BIG SAW MILL IS TOTAL WRECK.

Crew Had Gone Home for Holidays and few were left to Fight Fire. Tramways were Torn Down to Pre vent Fire From Spreading to Lumber Yards.

The lumber mill of the Escanaba Lumber company at Masonville, was totally destroyed by fire on Sunday morning. Every effort to save the property proved unavailing and it was only by dint of great effort that the piles of manufactured lumber about the mill were preserved.

Late Saturday afternoon, a trifling accident occurred at the mill of the Escanaba Lumber company which necessitated the stopping of operations for a short time and it was decided to dismiss the crew employed there and allow them to return with only the regular fire watchmen on duty. About 7 o'clock Sunday morning a blaze was discovered by one of the watchmen, and an alarm sent in. All the men in the neighborhood tnrned out to assist in fighting the flames, but after struggling with them for several hours, it was found that it would be impossible to get the fire under control and the firemen turned their attention to the tramways lead ing to the piles of finished lumber that were piled about the mill. All the tramways were torn down before the flames from the burning mill could creep along them to the lumber piles. The mill and tramways are a total wreck, and not having been covered very heavily by insurance, will constitute a financial loss to the owners. The greatest loss will come from the timber already cut this season which will have to be disposed of in some way or held over for several months until the mill is rebuilt. Rock River Conference Erects Stone to Memory of Man Who Organized First Methodist Church In Illinois.

Chicago.-The memory of Jesse Walker, the "Daniel Boone" of Methodism, organizer of the Methodist church in Illinois and first Methodist pastor in Chicago, was honored in a monument erected to him and his lamp of holiness. Only its face was wife by the Methodist Episcopal church and the Methodist Episcopal church, south, at Plainfield, this state, recently.

The monument was formally presented by Rev. W. M. Ewing of Plainfield, pastor of the Methodist church of that village. Master Everett Davis Weese, a great-great-grandson of Jesse Walker, unveiled the monument. The acceptance of the monument in behalf of the conference was made by Bishop J. H. Hamilton. The final chord of good feeling was touched by Bishop E. R. Hendrix of the Methodist church, South, who made the address.

Jesse Walker was born in Virginia in 1766 and he was a pioneer preacher in Missouri and Illinois during the first third of the last century. After he had started the Chicago church, which was one of the landmarks of the city for years, and after he had served as the first presiding elder in Illinois he went to St. Louis, where he continued his work. He died in Plainfield in 1835.

The monument is of Vermont granite. six feet high and occupies a conspicuous place in the little cemetery It was paid for by subscriptions of the mmebers of the conference.

Jesse Walker was a pioneer in every sense of the word and his was a striking personality of the church militant. Whenever a virgin field with especial difficulties was to be entered, he was the man the bishops of his church chose for the work.

His natural vigor was almost st perhuman. He did not appear to require food and rest as did other men.

THE OLD CAPITOL BUILD-ING.

The structure in Washington

City known as the "Old Capitol Building" has a memorable history. It was erected in 1800, and was originally designed as a tavern, or boarding house. On account of poor management the tavern was closed after a few years. During the War of 1812 the British captured Wash-Ington and burned several of the public buildings, including the Capitol. The government then purchased this tavern building for the use of congress, and here both houses met for several years. Within its walls two presidents were inaugurated, and In It John C. Calhoun dled. After the new Capitol building was completed the "Old Capitol" was abandoned by congress, and after that it was used for various purposes, hotel, boarding school, etc. in 1861 the government again took charge of it, and used it during the Civil war as a prison for captured southern soldlers.

Will Save Much Time and Trouble and Garments Will Be in Order When Required.

There is nothing on earth like system, and nowhere do you realize this more than in matters of dress. The tiny hole in your stocking that you might have mended in two minutes grows into an undarnable "run," the rip under the arm in your new blouse extends alarmingly; nothing that must be mended stays "where it is put." The remedy for all this is a regular mending day or a regular mending evening if you are a business woman As soon as a garment needs mending if it be only a button or a hook that must be replaced, put it aside unless it is so necessary that you must atend to the trouble at once, and when pending day rolls around do the required sewing You will be surprised to find how much lighter your work becomes when you can thus catch rents and tears at their start instead of at their disastrous finish. The other point to remember is to always have your sewing implements where you can get them and in perfect order. Do not wait until the very moment for mending to find that you are out of white thread or that your needles are rusty. When a thing needs repairing, repair it; when it needs replacing, replace it. It might even be well to have a "preparation" day to antedate the mending one.





ASSAULT AND BATTERY IS GIV. EN TRIAL THIS AFTERNOON IN JUDGE LINDEN'S COURT.

Parker it is pointed out was prohibited from visiting his wife's house except by permission from the latter, by a legal agreement drawn up between them some time ago. It is claimed that Parker violated this pact unbeknown to her last Friday, and when he appeared she said in her testimony that she felt trouble was immi-

The case was given to the jury at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon.
