The Physiotype.

This is an English invention for making pictures by impression of leaves, ferns, lace, feathers and various other objects. It depends upon the chemical action of a fine powder. The object of which a representation is to be made is placed upon white paper and pressed, either by the hand or by other means. When the object is removed no impression is visible on the paper, but upon sprinkling the powder over the paper the picture at once appears, sharply defined, and remains permanent. Sections of wood and designs of coins and medals can thus be represented, and the prints can be transferred to lithographic stone, zinc or aluminium, thus producing records from which any number of copies can be taken.—Chicago Record-Herald

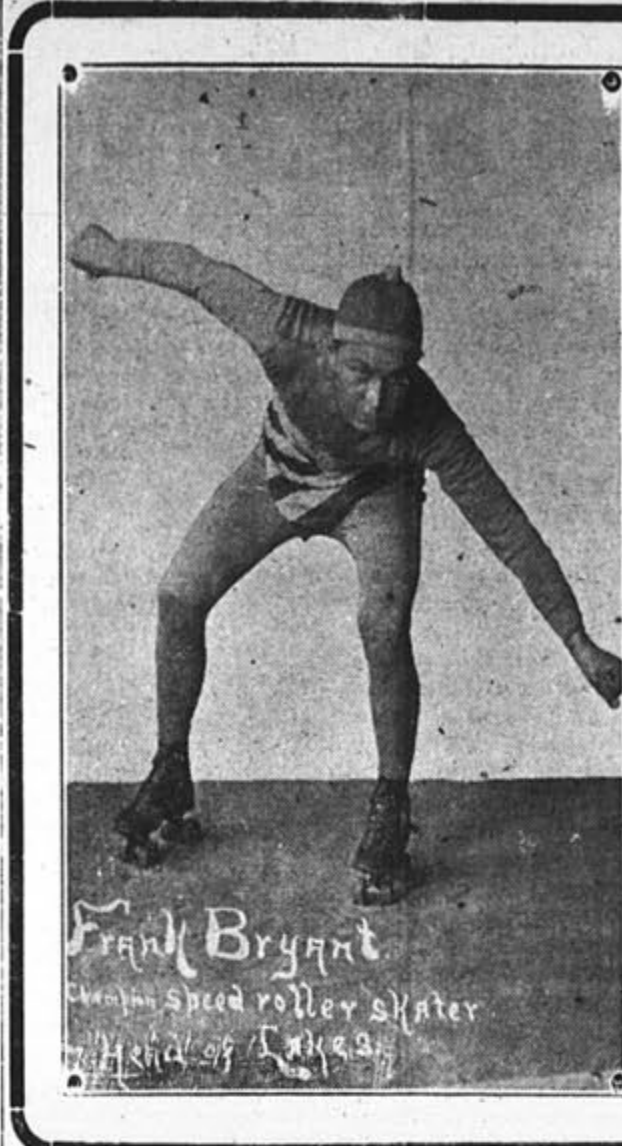

MILD WINTER IS A GODSEND TO MANY

(Continued from page one.) There was a real coal shortage, with some of the manufacturing plants shutting down temporarily, and coal coming into Escanaba being sold at a price which had not been seen here before. Now there appears to be a surfeit of coal in the city and the movement of freight is said to be comparatively easy.

"Coal consumers certainly have cause to be thankful that the weather thus far has not been a repetition of that of last year," said a local coal dealer. "I don't know what we should have done, but it is a fact that in Escanaba had any zero weather now that of 1912, consumers would have been compelled to pay from \$1 to \$1.50 per ton more for coal than they have been paying. Just think of it—Montreal has had only one day of zero weather this winter and Minneapolis and St. Paul have fared similarly in the matter of temperature."

"The year began with an anthracite shortage of 6,500,000 tons," this man said, "and it doesn't require much figuring to determine what this would have meant to Escanaba and other cities, had the weather this winter been anything like that of last."

There are some men in Escanaba who are very much disgruntled at the vagaries of the weather. These are coal brokers or speculators who took a "flier" on the probability of another severe winter, and who placed good-sized orders at fancy prices in anticipation of making a cleaning if the thermometer got low enough. Some of these, it is said, find it impossible to unload except at a loss and in addition they are paying railroad demurrage charges because they haven't any storage facilities.

Local coal dealers estimate that the Escanaba family which consumed ten tons of coal during last winter to date have used only about half that quantity this year.
