It was said that members of the Cleveland team, against which St. Louis was playing when the manager of the latter spat upon Umpire Ferguson, will testify that the arbiter's decisions which angered Stovall might well arouse the ire of any player.

In baseball circles the report was credited that the manager will be suspended for a definite time, fined heavily, and then reinstated.

MANY ALIENS CAME TO STATE IN 1912

Five Per Cent of all Immigrants Arriving in America Settled in Michigan.

According to the annual report of the commissioner general of immigration for the year ending June 30, 1912, about five per cent of the number of aliens who entered this country during the twelve months' period settled in Michigan.

The report shows that during the fiscal year 1912, 173,173 aliens entered the United States, or 40,415 less than during 1911, a decrease of 5 per cent. The total number of rejected aliens were 16,057, as compared with 22,349 in 1911 or a decrease of 28 per cent. In addition the number of arrests made within the country was 2,546 as against 2,178 in 1911, or a decrease of twelve per cent.

The report shows that 16,290 immigrant aliens came from northern and western Europe during the past year, divided as follows: Belgium, 4169; Denmark, 6,191; France, 8,628; German empire, 27,788; Netherlands, 6,619; Norway, 8,675; Sweden, 12,688; Switzerland, 3,506; England, 40,408; Ireland, 25,879; Scotland, 14,578; Wales, 2,162. The total of these figures constitutes about 19 per cent of the entire immigration. On the other hand 570,130 or about 68 per cent of the immigration of the past year came from the Iberic or Slavonic countries of eastern and southern Europe and western Asia—157,134, or about 19 per cent from Italy; 162,359 or about 19 per cent from (principally southern) Russia, including Finland; 85,854, or about 11 per cent from Hungary; 21,449, or about 3 per cent from

France; 14,481, or about 2 per cent from Turkey in Europe and adjoining principalities; 12,788, or about 1.5 per cent from Turkey in Asia; 10,230, or about 1 per cent from Portugal; 6,327, or about 0.075 per cent from Spain; 4,447, or about .05 per cent from Bulgaria, Serbia and Montenegro, and 1,997, or about 0.25 per cent from Roumania.

Immigration from Asia other than the western part of that continent included in the above amounted to 8,661, constituted of 6,114 from Japan, 1,765 from China, 175 from India, and 607 from other Asia, which is 1 per cent of the total.

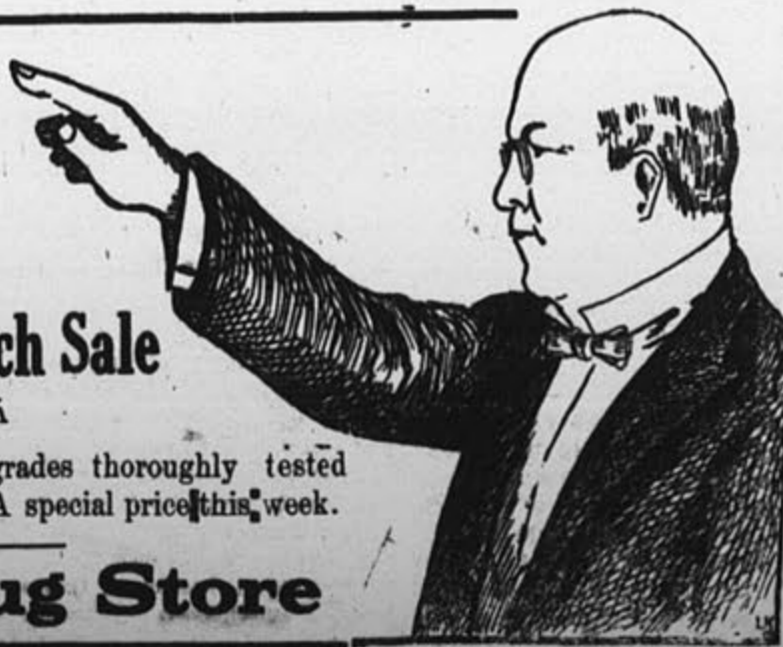

Postmaster General Burleson announced it was the purpose of President Wilson and himself to take into classified service all postmasters in the second and third class.

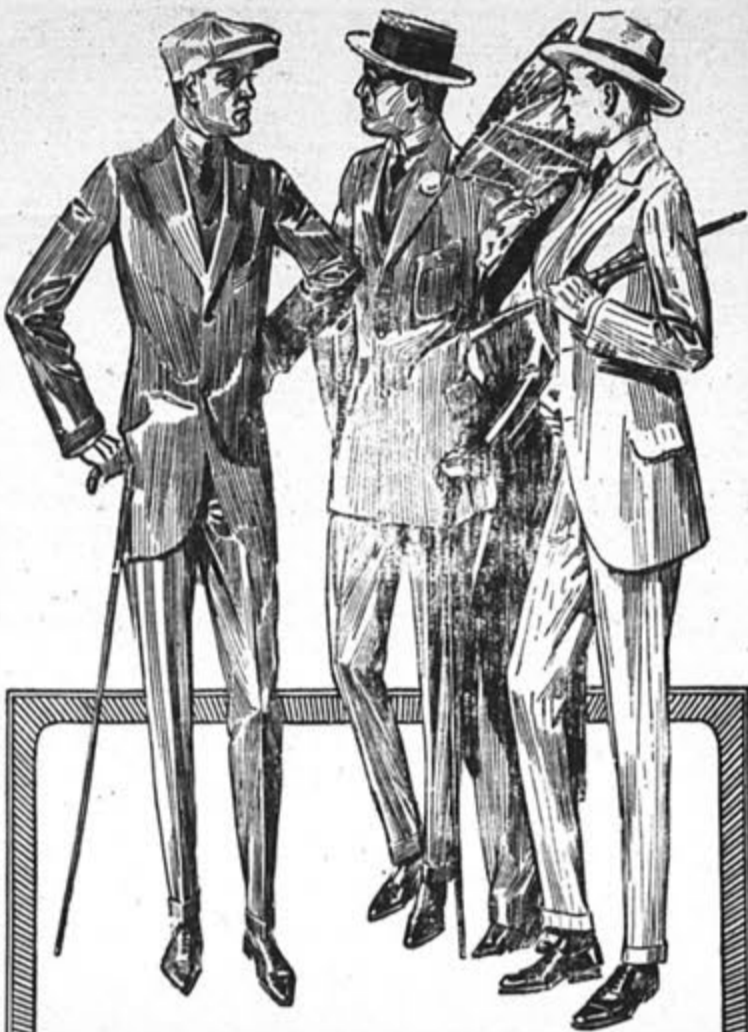

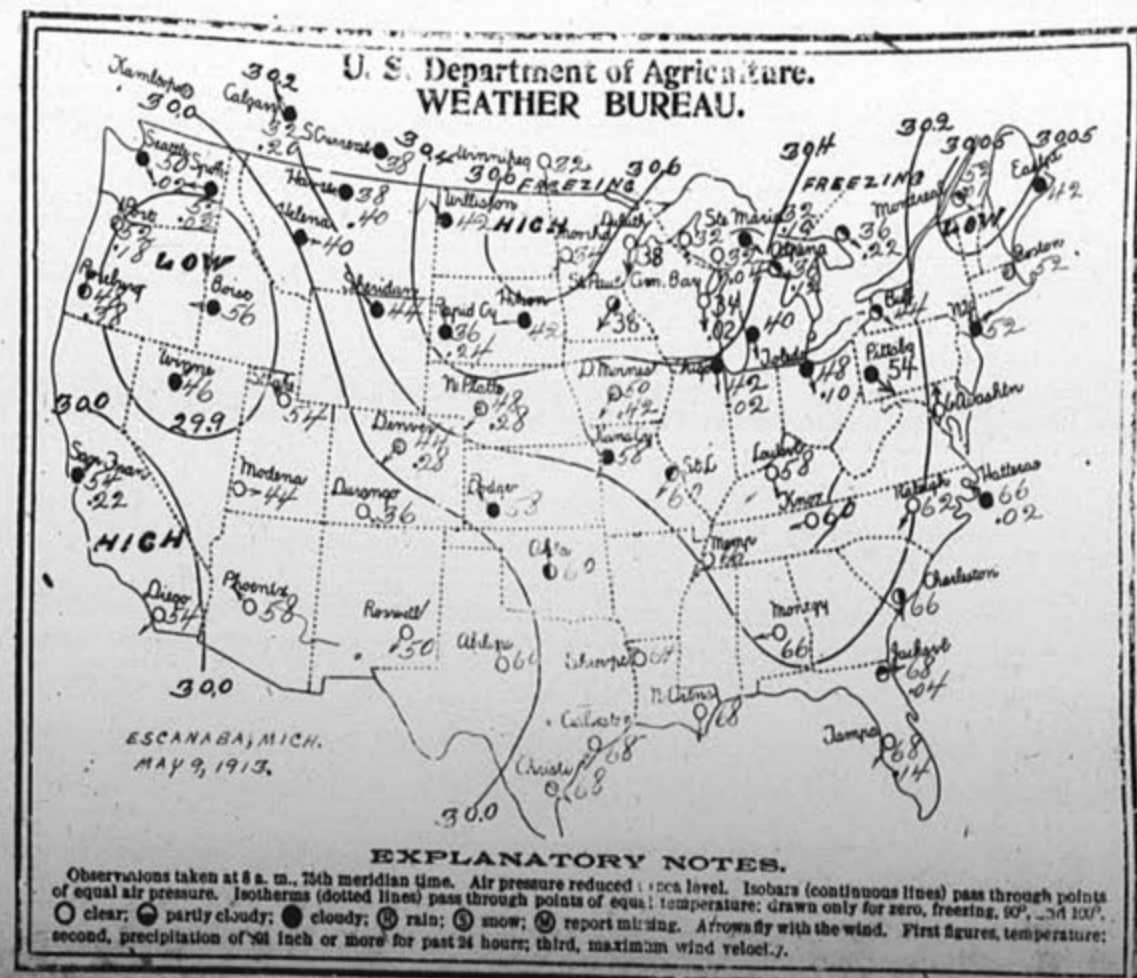

GREAT CURIOSITY SHOP

ETHNOLOGICAL SECTION OF THE NATIONAL MUSEUM.

Figures Are Lifelike, Modeled to Perfection From a Plastic Substance. Clothed in Proper Articles of Dress and Adornment.

The groups and single figures in the ethnological section of the National museum catch the fancy and hold the attention of more visitors than any other exhibits in that great curiosity shop. These figures are lifelike and life size. Modeled to perfection from a plastic substance, colored, clothed with such articles of dress and adornment as the people represented wear, they are surrounded by a setting peculiar and appropriate to the subjects. The figures do not as a rule stand at attention or in mummy postures, but are pictured as engaged in those occupations natural and usual with the people. The single figures are in big glass showcases, and the groups are enclosed in glass quarters as big as the show windows of shops. These exhibits remind one of the long popular "tableaux vivants," only these groups are not "vivants," but are decidedly more verisimilar and realistic than that form of show probably ever was. The exhibits are of a high educational value, and to overhear the comments of average Americans as they stand before the groups one realizes that the common run of people need information about strange folk.

In one of the halls are numerous groups of American Indians, commonly from five to seven in each group, and usually represented as engaged in their domestic work. Many of the women are pounding corn into meal or grinding it into meal by rubbing the kernels between flint stones. There will be one large, flat piece of flint inclined at about the same angle at which a washboard rests. The worker will have a round piece of flint, fashioned something like a rolling pin, and by rubbing the grains of corn, a handful at a time, between these stones, just as a woman washes clothes, she grinds the grain into a very coarse meal.

Among the exhibits are groups of Coocopa Indians from the Colorado river country in Mexico, Hopi Indians engaged in beautiful basketry, showing the leaves of the yucca in all stages of manufacture; a family group of seven Sioux with one woman pounding up strips of dried buffalo meat for a stew, one woman scraping the hair off a buffalo hide and two maidens making beaded moccasins. There is an Apache group with the figures dressed in barbaric elegance usual to the prosperous members of that tribe. A group of Navajo silver-smiths—four of them—are fashioning silver rings and bracelets by means of a curious bellows and crucible, a blow pipe, hammer and stamps. A group of Pueblo Indians is represented as making bread and cooking a meal, and the scene is not usually tantalizing to a white man's appetite. There is a group of Zunis represented as going through the ritual of "Creation," the Kaka, or sacred drama of these people. The Maya Indians of Guatemala are represented, and so, too, are the Tehuelche Indians of Patagonia, the Loucheux Indians of the Yukon-McKenzie country, and the Chilkats of the north Pacific region, and there is also a large group of Kiowa Indians which attracts a good deal of notice.

There is a picturesque Samoan household. A woman is pounding bark in the making of cloth and a girl is straining kava. Another woman is decorating bark cloth, while a man, with a spear is looking on. The women have garlands of flowers around their necks and their raiment, though scanty, is sufficient.

There is a family of negroes, small and very black people, who live in the out-of-the-way places in several of the Philippine islands. The explanatory card on this exhibit says that these people are small, but strong and hardy, of remarkable endurance, cheerful, intelligent, peaceable and moral, and that "they love music and dancing." There are three men, two women and a child in the group. Two of them are represented as making fire by friction with two strips of bamboo. Nearby is a Filipino group mainly engaged in making cotton cloth. There are three women, a girl and a man. Further on is a group of Igorots engaged mainly in the making of crude pottery.


