ORDINANCE NO. 191. An Ordinance Fixing the Salaries of the Different Officers of the City of Escanaba for the Year 1913-1914. The City of Escanaba Ordains: Sec. 1. That the salaries of the following City Officers for their term of office, whose term of office begins on the second Monday of April 1913, and ends on the second Monday of April 1914; and those whose term of office begins on the first Monday of May 1913, and ends on the first Monday of May 1914, shall be as follows: Mayor, \$500.00 per annum. City Clerk, \$1200.00 per annum. City Treasurer, \$890.00 per annum. City Attorney, \$890.00 per annum. City Health Officer, \$500.00 per annum. ...

Linemen and Pipemen in Fire Department—Third year in service \$720.00 per annum. Linemen and Pipemen in Fire Department—Fourth year in service, \$810.00 per annum. Sec. 2. COMES TO RESCUE OF THE MARINE DOGFISH

Commissioner of Fisheries in Indiana Thinks Dogfish One of Finest for Eating. A great many Escanaba fishermen who use dogfish minnows for bait during the season little realize that by some the dogfish is looked upon as one of the finest fish in the world for eating and that when properly prepared are a very delectable dish. Commissioner of Fisheries George W. Miles of Indiana, has come to the defense of what he calls "the humble dogfish" in a long article, which is copied verbatim in the twentieth biennial report of the Michigan Fish Commission. The waters of the various lakes in this country abound with dogfish but they have always been scorned by the sportsmen who could see no glory in its pursuit. The Indians always ate the dogfish and made use of them almost to the exclusion of all other fish. This was probably due to the fact that it was the easiest to secure and would bite at any kind of bait, alive or dead, being naturally a very stupid fish. The fact that Indians also cooked dogs and relished them also had something to do with the natural prejudice that has arisen against the dogfish.

The dogfish has an air bladder that is divided into cells, and is a half-developed lung. At intervals it ascends to the surface of the water, gulps down a mouthful of air as a turtle does and descends again. If hindered from arising when the time comes to take in a fresh supply of air, the fish struggles violently, like a mammal about to drown; but it can expel air beneath the surface. This characteristic indicates that lungs were first developed in fishes from modifications of their air bladders. Mr. Miles states in his article that he has never seen a colored man in the south or a white man in the north who has eaten of the flesh of the dogfish that has been properly dressed and cooked, and admitted the flavor of it to be as fine as that of a bass or a pickerel, which later it must resemble. If the dogfish were as popular as some of the other varieties which are sought, the lakes and streams in this vicinity could be planted with them and in a few years would be well stocked. The dogfish propagate very rapidly and are very hardy. Many people who have tasted dogfish have condemned it because of the fact that it had a "mossy" taste. This unnatural flavor is due to the fact that the fish has not been properly prepared. To properly prepare a dogfish for the table, it should first be skinned, the skin being very tough and prevents the flesh from being cooked beneath it. The easiest way is to skin from the tail toward the head. The head and tail should be removed and the ribs separated from the backbone, both being cut out. The flesh is solid and firm and is of a reddish color. It should be coated with flour or cornmeal and cooked in hot grease much the same as doughnuts are, and nearly as brown. David Starr Jordan had much to do with creating the disfavor in which the dogfish is held and Mr. Miles states that he is sure that the eminent scientist never tasted dogfish when properly prepared or he would never have condemned the fish as unfit to eat. Mr. Miles thinks that in time the dogfish will be planted in as great numbers as trout are at the present time and will be just as much sought after by sportsmen all over the country. In some places the dogfish is called a "lawyer," as he says "because they bite at everything and are good for nothing when caught."

ORDINANCE NO. 192

An Ordinance to Authorize the issuing of Eleven Thousand (\$11,000) Dollars of Refunding Bonds of the City of Escanaba, Michigan.
 WHEREAS, Two Thousand (\$2,000) Dollars of the Refunding Bonds of the City of Escanaba issued dated June 1st, 1903, shall become due on June 1st, 1913; and
 WHEREAS, Nine Thousand (\$9,000) Dollars of the Refunding Bonds of the City of Escanaba issued dated June 1st, 1908, shall become due and payable June 1st, 1913; and
 WHEREAS, There are no funds in the City Treasury which can be used to pay said bonds so due and outstanding, and it is deemed necessary and advisable by the Council of the City of Escanaba to extend the time of payment of said bonds so due and payable, aggregating Eleven Thousand (\$11,000) Dollars and to issue new bonds of the City in place of said bonds, in such manner as to merely change, but not to increase the indebtedness of said City, NOW, THEREFORE;
 The City of Escanaba, Michigan, Ordains:
 Sec. 1. That there shall be and there is hereby ordered and directed to be issued the negotiable coupon bonds of the City of Escanaba, Michigan, to the amount of Eleven Thousand (\$11,000) Dollars to be known as Refunding Bonds, for the purpose of extending the time of payment of a like amount of outstanding bonds of said City due as hereinabove recited, in such a manner as to merely change, but not increase the indebtedness of said City; said new bonds shall be twenty-two (22) in number, numbered from one (1) to twenty-two (22) inclusive, of the denomination of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars each; said bonds to be dated June 1st, 1913, and become due and payable as follows: Bonds numbered one, two, three and four (1-2-3 & 4) shall become due and payable May 31st, 1918; bonds numbered five, six, seven and eight (5-6-7 & 8) shall become due and payable May 31st, 1919; bonds numbered nine, ten, eleven and twelve (9-10-11 & 12) shall become due and payable May 31st, 1920; bonds numbered thirteen, fourteen, fifteen and sixteen (13-14-15 & 16) shall become due and payable May 31st, 1922; bonds numbered seventeen, eighteen, nineteen and twenty (17-18-19 & 20) shall become due and payable May 31st, 1923; bonds numbered twenty-one and twenty-two (21 & 22) shall become due and payable May 31st, 1924; and bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the Thirty-first day of May and the 30th day of November in each year, which interest payments shall be evidenced by proper coupons attached to each bond and both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of the City Treasurer of the City of Escanaba.
 Sec. 2. That each of said Refund-

ing Bonds and the coupons thereto attached shall be issued in substantially the following form, to-wit:

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That the City of Escanaba, in the County of Delta and State of Michigan, is justly indebted and for value received hereby promises to pay the bearer on the Thirty-first day of May, A. D., the principal sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars and interest thereon from the date hereof until paid at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the Thirty-first day of May and the 30th day of November in each year upon presentation and surrender of the annexed interest coupons as they severally become due. Both principal and interest hereof are payable at the office of the City Treasurer of the City of Escanaba, Michigan.
 This bond is one of a series of twenty-two (22) bonds of like date, tenor and amount, numbered from one (1) to twenty-two (22) inclusive, aggregating Eleven Thousand (\$11,000) Dollars issued for the purpose of extending the time of payment of a like amount of the outstanding bonds of said City now due, in such manner as merely to change, but not increase the indebtedness of said City, pursuant to and in full compliance with the provisions of Section 3313 of the Compiled Laws of Michigan of 1897 and all laws amendatory thereof or supplemental thereto, and pursuant to an ordinance duly passed by the City Council of said City for that purpose. This bond and the interest thereon is payable out of the interest and sinking fund of said City.

IT IS HEREBY RECITED, AND CERTIFIED That all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond, have been properly had, done and performed in regular and due form and time as required by law; that the former bonds falling due, for the extension of the time of payment of which this bond is issued, were valid and binding obligations on said City; that a like amount of the bonds of said City so due have been cancelled by the issuance hereof and that the indebtedness of said City is not increased hereby and that the total indebtedness of said City, including the amount of this bond, does not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitations thereon.

FLINT'S LETTER

For the first ten days this month exports of copper have exceeded thirty million pounds. Our own domestic deliveries last month, nearly eighty million pounds were the largest, with one exception in the history of the country which clearly shows that the demand is going on the production, not only here but abroad. There is no indication at present of any concerted action to curtail the production so that it is very difficult to understand how anyone can take anything but a favorable view of the future of the copper industry.

A dispatch from Ely, Nev. says that Giroux is shipping one thousand tons of ore to the smelter each day and that if the Nevada consolidated could give them more than one unit they could increase their shipments materially. The copper stock market has been so dull lately that the majority of traders have switched over to the Tonapops, which have been quite active for the last month.
