





NCIL PROCEEDINGS

(Official) Escanaba, Mich., Oct. 7, 1913. Regular meeting of the Council of the City of Escanaba was held in the Council Chambers on the named date.

Present—Mayor Chatfield, Ald. Noreus, Wickert, Fryal, Smith, and Buchholz—4. Absent—Ald. O'Hanley, Garity, Swann, Fryal, Folio and Smith, seconded by Ald. Wickert, moved that the minutes of the meeting be approved with editing.

Motion carried by the following vote: Ayes—Ald. Sheahan, Wickert, Fryal, Garity and Buchholz—5. Ald. Noreus and Cuthbert—2. Communication from the Board of Public Works relative to the error in the City Engineer's authority to connect the sewer of the Laing Hospital with the water sewer was read.

Noreus, supported by Ald. Fryal, moved that the communication be tabled. Motion carried. Following communication was read: Escanaba, Mich., Oct. 6, 1913. Mayor and Common Council, City.

Present: Board of Public Works to which was referred the personal injury claim filed by Leslie Schmitt, report the upon investigation find that the city is not liable, therefore would recommend that be not paid.

Peter Olson, President Cuthbert, supported by Ald. Wickert, moved that the communication be accepted. Motion unanimous. Cuthbert, supported by Ald. Wickert, moved that the City Engineer be directed to make the necessary connections on the present sewer of the city.

Lyons appeared before the Council and requested that they pay an assessment which was assessed against her property. Smith, supported by Ald. Noreus, moved that the matter be referred to a committee of three and the committee to be appointed by the Mayor.

City Treasurer, C. E. Conahan, submitted his monthly reports for the months of July, August and September, 1913. Ald. Smith, supported by Ald. Noreus, moved that the report be accepted and placed on file. Motion carried.

Justice Emil Glaser, Justice C. D. McEwen and Chief of Police, Andrew Iverson, submitted their monthly reports for the month of September. Ald. Sheahan, seconded by Ald. Wickert, moved that the reports be accepted and placed on file. Motion carried.

Escanaba, Mich., Oct. 5, 1913. To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council, City. Gentlemen: I hereby respectfully report that I have served notice to the owners of the following described lots to construct sidewalks pursuant to the ordinance of the City of Escanaba, relating thereto, to-wit: So. 100 foot of Lot Four (4), Block Twenty-three (23) of Campbell's Second Addition, corner Fannie and Third streets. Lot Four (4), Block Eleven (11), of the Smith-Dunlap Addition, and on North Birch street. Also Lot Eight (8), Block Eighty-one (81) of Proprietor's Addition on Ludington street near the corner of Fannie street and said owners have not complied with the provisions of said notice.

Respectfully, Carl E. Anderson, Street Commissioner. Ald. Smith, seconded by Ald. Wickert, moved that the communication be accepted and that the Street Commissioner be directed to install the above mentioned sidewalks. Motion carried.

and have heard all objections, to said special assessment; THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That said special assessment rolls be and the same are confirmed, and that said rolls be certified by the City Clerk to the City Assessor to be spread upon the general tax roll. RESOLVED, That it is hereby determined by the Common Council of the City of Escanaba, that a sanitary sewer be constructed in the City of Escanaba, to-wit: Commencing at the manhole on Escanaba Avenue between Birch and Rose Streets, thence running north through the alley of Block ten and eleven (10 & 11) of the Smith-Dunlap Addition, to the manhole at the north end of the alley of said Block eleven (11). That the estimated cost of said improvement is the sum of Three hundred ninety-nine (\$399.00) dollars, and that 80 per cent of the cost of said improvement shall be paid by special assessment and the remainder shall be paid from the general sewer fund. The following described lands are hereby designated as a special sewer district upon which the special assessment shall be levied, to-wit: Lots one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten, eleven, twelve, thirteen and fourteen (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 & 14) of Block ten (10), and Lots one, two, three, four, five, thirteen, fourteen, fifteen, sixteen and seventeen (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 13, 14, 15, 16 & 17) of Block eleven (11), all of the Smith-Dunlap Addition to the City of Escanaba.

D., 1913, be designated for hearing objections to said improvements and to the confirmation of said assessment roll.

O'Hanley, Noreus, Cuthbert, Sheahan, Wickert, Fryal, Smith, Garity and Buchholz—9. RESOLVED, That the City Treasurer is hereby directed to report to the City Assessor a description of all lots and premises as are contained in the Special Assessment Rolls and the amounts due of said descriptions, and which have not been paid or placed on any previous Tax Roll. The City Assessor is hereby directed to place said sums so reported to him by the treasurer upon the general tax roll. The Street and Special Assessment Rolls herein referred to are the following, to-wit: Hartnett Avenue, Bay Street, North Charlotte Street, North Mary Street, South Georgia Street, North Birch Street, Sinclair Street and Ford River Switch Road; and also the amounts due and assessed against certain premises for scavenger work done on said premises and for constructing certain sidewalks in front of certain premises and which have not been paid.

Ald. Garity, supported by Ald. Cuthbert, moved that the resolution be adopted. Motion carried by the following vote: Ayes—Ald. O'Hanley, Noreus, Cuthbert, Sheahan, Wickert, Fryal, Smith, Garity and Buchholz—9. WHEREAS, The ordinance of the City of Escanaba, regulating the Police Department provides that the Park Policeman of this City shall not be hired except during the months of June, July, August and September, unless ordered by the Common Council;

AND WHEREAS One of the regular Police force is now employed as what is known as "Motor Cycle Policeman," leaving our police force insufficient to patrol said City. BE IT RESOLVED, That the said Park Policeman be employed by the City of Escanaba hereafter or during such times as the Common Council may deem proper, regularly every month.

ROAD COMMISSIONERS OUTLINE EXTENSIVE PROGRAM FOR YEAR

(Continued from Page One.) Schedule B shows the other work recommended by this Board for the year 1914 amounting in total to \$188,400.00. Eventually about three bridges must be built across the Escanaba River and one or two across the Ford River, and for this reason it is proposed to make a start by building one across the Escanaba River.

Schedule C shows the moneys expended this year to September 30, 1913. The Board have under their jurisdiction 195 1-2 miles of County roads, as follows: Adopted but not opened up 14 miles. Macadam, 31 miles. Gravel, 6 miles. Earth 122 1-2 miles. Sand, 22 miles. Total 195 1-2 miles.

It will be noticed that we have 152 1-3 miles of dirt roads, much of which is not properly graded, and it is the opinion of this Board that these dirt roads should be properly graded as soon as possible to bring down the cost of maintenance. Experience has shown that after a dirt road is properly graded and drained about \$60.00 a mile per year will keep the road in fine condition, and in fact improve it from year to year, while triple this amount on an improperly graded and drained road does not keep it in passable condition in wet weather. We therefore urge that the work of improving these dirt roads be not slighted.

During the past season we have completed the grading on the Schaeffer road which owing to the hilly character of the country necessitated the moving of considerable material. The road is now in fine condition.

sitating hauling material from the knolls to raise the roadway throughout nearly the entire length and it was necessary to construct large drains leading the water away from the road. The survey of the remaining portion will be completed at state expense this fall.

Lathrop Road Grading the entire length of the Lathrop road has been under way and considerable improvement resulted, but it will be necessary to ditch and raise the roadway in many places and find outlets for the water, and in some places the road will have to be surfaced.

Beaver Road. Beaver Road. This road is well on to completion and would have been finished this fall, but it was found necessary to institute condemnation proceedings to obtain right of way on the east end, a distance of about 1 1/4 miles. Three steel and concrete bridges are built on this road.

Cornell Road. Cornell road has been adopted from the Manistique trunk at Wells to the county line and bids asked to open up 2 miles, linking portions already built. Contract is let to build 352 1/2 feet of macadam, connecting macadam already built near Groos.

Ford River Road. Ford River Road. In conformity with the resolution of your honorable body this road will be adopted as a county road as soon as surveys can be made.

Portage Road. Portage Road. The only work done on this has been to complete a drain started last year which will take care of the water heretofore flooding a portion of the east end. Considerable work is needed on the east end to make a good roadway to connect with the Peninsula road.

Peninsula Road. Peninsula Road. This was surveyed this spring and cleared and grubbed by local contracts which proved very satisfactory, the work being let in short sections giving local people a chance to bid on same. Bids were asked for covering the grading and ditching. Three bids received, the highest of which was \$7496 and the lowest \$5868 with provisions for extra compensation under certain conditions. These were all rejected by the Board as being too high, and the engineer instructed to complete the road by day labor.

Much Money Saved. This was done and the road is practically completed and acknowledged to be a first-class job. The cost is to date, on the work specified in the bids \$3079.98, and a total of \$3500 will more than complete it. This will be a saving of \$2368 at least and probably considerable more in view of the provision for extra compensation in the bid. In addition to these 6 miles we adopted 5 miles more making a connection with the Manistique trunk near Engeln, and are now improving a bad section of same to make a complete road from the trunk line junction to Stonington.

Manistique Trunk. On the Manistique trunk—Bay Shore division some new concrete culverts were built and new concrete heads for several of the ones remaining were found necessary. Five piers were also built to catch the sand drifts and it is evident that they are going to be of great benefit by making a beach in front of the road and then preventing the washing out of the roadway.

Marquette Trunk. We graded the north 6 miles of the Marquette trunk, this portion being on line, and will not be changed by the state survey. This portion was mostly through a bad swamp, necessitating hauling material from the knolls to raise the roadway throughout nearly the entire length and it was necessary to construct large drains leading the water away from the road.

Garden Road. Garden Road. Beyond some temporary work in the worst sections it has been impossible to do any work on this road. The state trunk act only went into effect the first of July, and two months were spent on the survey as far as Isabella.
