INCOME TAX LAW IS SOON TO BE APPLIED THROUGHOUT THE U.S.

INTERNAL REVENUE COLLECTOR FOR FOURTH DISTRICT SER-VES NOTICE ON- UPPER PENINSULA

\$3,000 FOR BACH., \$4,000 FOR BENEDICT

More Than Three Thousand Persons in This Section Will be Affected by the New Law

The attention of collectors of internal revenue is now being directed by the treasury department at Washington to the administration of the personal income tax feature of the new tariff law.

George Clapperton, of Grand Rapids, revenue collector for the fourth district of Michigan, writes that at least 3.000 persons in the apper peninsula, will, according to his estimates, be subject to this new tax, and that a much larger number will naturally be called on for reports under the law. It will be necessary for citizens amendable to the law relating to personal income now to give attention to their income tax accounts. They should not it still and wait for the tax collector to come around. The first burden, Mr. Clapperton points out, rests with the citizen himself, and a penalty is attached to his failure to report his

In figuring net income the amount of \$3,000, is exempt for a single man and \$4,000 for a married man, In addition to this, fixed exemption he will have a right to claim additional exemptions, as follows.

Necessary expenses of carrying on siness, not including personal, living or family expenses.

Interest paid out on indebtedness. National, state, county, school or municipal taxes paid within the year. Trade losses, or storm or fire losses, not covered by insurance,



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


