FIERCE STORM SWEEPS OVER NORTH SECTION OF THE U. S.

(Continued from page one.) do so until the wind goes down. Two deaths have been reported.

Pittsburg, Nov. 10.—This city is floundering through a foot of snow and the storm, now twenty-four hours old is still raging with no apparent signs of blowing itself out. There is but one lone Western Union telegraph wire between here and Chicago, the wires of the Postal company having been put out of business yesterday. The city presents a picturesque entanglement of broken trees, telephone and telegraph wires, and stalled street cars. It will take months to repair the damage.

Worst Lake Storm
Detroit, Nov. 10.—The disastrous blizzard which swept Lake Michigan has subsided here just a little. Reports from all parts of the state indicate that the weather has been severe in all sections. Most every port is filled with steamers that have scurried in to get out of the worst November storm in the history of lake navigation.

Blown Off Steamer
LaCrosse, Wis., Nov. 10.—One death resulted from the gale of yesterday and today. Edward Wells was blown from the deck of the steamer Eleanor and was drowned.

Vessels Are Late
Duluth, Minn., Nov. 10.—Vessels are arriving ten to twenty hours late and report terrible weather upon Lake Superior. The temperature here is but ten degrees above zero.

70 Mile An Hour Gale
Buffalo, Nov. 10.—The worst section of the blizzard struck here today when the velocity attained by the wind reached 70 miles an hour. Snow, sleet and ice covers the city and all business is more or less crippled. All trains are late from one to ten hours.

Chicago, Nov. 10.—The telephone and telegraph companies are the ones that will probably be the heaviest losses by the wind storm. It was estimated today by a prominent official of one of the telegraph companies that the total damage to telephone and telegraph business will reach a million dollars.

WEATHER CONDITIONS

The storm is now centered near Lake Ontario, and has increased in depth and intensity and caused high winds with snow throughout the Lake region since Saturday morning. Gales up to 68 miles an hour are now reported from Lake Huron, the lower Lakes and the New England coast. Moderately high pressure covers the Western Mississippi Valley and generally fair prevails thence west nearly to the Pacific coast. Freezing weather covers all the country east of the Rocky Mountains, except the coast states, but no unusually low temperatures are reported. It is about zero however, over Alberta and Ontario, and the northwest winds this afternoon and tonight. The snow will continue this afternoon and tonight, followed by cloudy and slightly warmer weather Tuesday.

Somersault by Aeroplane.

Captain Aubry of the French army accomplished a complete somersault while aboard an aeroplane high above the earth. 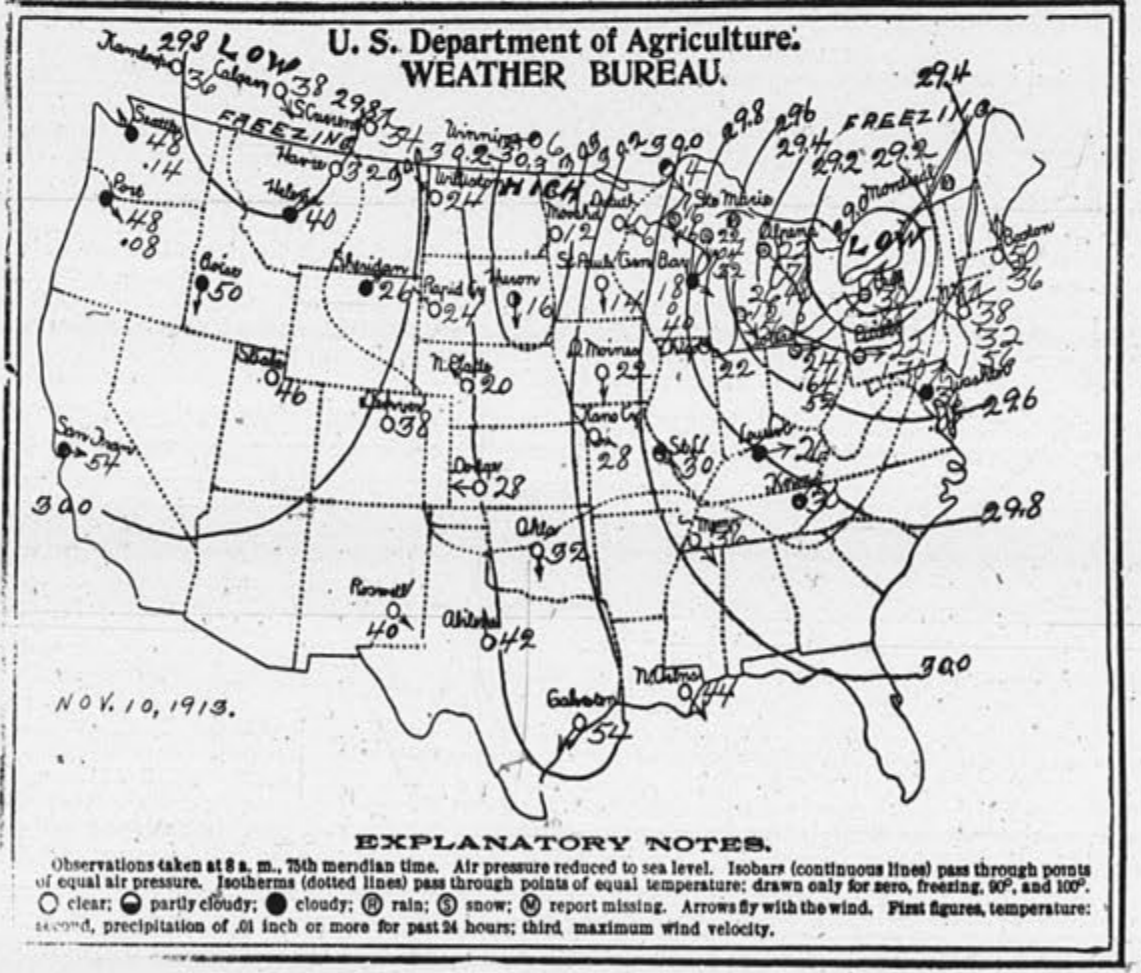

HE IS NOT ALWAYS MODEST

Co-Called Self-Made Man Sometimes Overestimates Himself, Asserts Minister.

Rev. Harry Emerson Fosdick voiced the pent-up conviction of many thoughtful men when he said to his Yale audience that the self-made man is not the greatest creation in the world. There are many truly self-made men whom we honor, and who carry their honors with becoming modesty. Such men recognize the fact that, though they get the credit for their own success, they owe it much to their conceit that everybody wishes they had wholly let out the contract to somebody else. These are usually the ones who in fact owe most and credit least to others for their success.

In the analysis we find that Mr. Fosdick's conclusion is correct. There is no such thing as a self-made man. There are some men who owe success much to circumstances and very little to their own endeavor. There are on the other hand men who have won their place by adding self-sacrifice and hard work to circumstances less favorable than those on which the others rose. In men of both sorts modesty is becoming.

It is not infrequent that the small man achieves what is commonly accepted as success. He is the one who prates about his self-making, who is particularly obnoxious and deserves this abuse. There are not so many of him, but the few go a long way to make a noise like a multitude. He is cocksure that, since he deems he has achieved what he set out to achieve, his opinion on matters and things is the final authority.

By sheer force of that pertinacity and will force by which he has arrived—as he thinks—he will often face down in argument the man who has a better reason. He assumes to be a correct type of self-made man. He may, indeed, do much good, and stand as an example of what effectively applied will power can do, but he needs to be reckoned for what he is worth. And what he is really worth is much less than is commonly supposed.

WHEN LIES ARE EXCUSABLE

Instances Given of Times When the Truth is Not Expected or Wanted.

Few people, I fancy, would say, after deliberation, that no lie was ever justified. To be sure, I once heard a serious young man protest that Shakespeare had damned Desdemona by allowing her at her last gasp to exculpate Othello. I have also known people who objected vehemently to the late Mark Twain because he said so many things that were not so. But there are occasions when lies are taken for granted, even by the law.

A man on trial for his life is supposed to tell the truth, but not if it will incriminate him. A wife is not dragged to the witness stand against her will—no one would legitimately expect anything but perjury from her. I do not see much difference between legally permitting a man to say "Not Guilty" when he is guilty, and legally permitting him to lie. Is there any solitary maiden who would not willingly give the midnight marauder to understand that her husband was just coming down the stairs, armed to the teeth? A man is not supposed, except by an extinct type of Puritan, to "give away" the woman who has made sacrifices for him; and even the extinct type of Puritan would hardly expect you to tell your hostess that her dinner party had been dull. From this heterogeneous group of examples, one may infer that there are lies and lies; and while it is never permissible to lie, it is sometimes quite unpermissible to do anything else.

FURNITURE FOR THE SEASONS

Adjustable Upholstered Seats and Pillows Make Wicker Sets Good the Year Round.

To have separate sets of sofas and chairs for summer and winter is beyond the means of many householders. Moreover, few modern homes have storage space sufficient to accommodate an entire suite of temporarily unused furniture. Consequently the recent fashion of buying a set of really handsome and durable wicker sets and then having attachable seats and pillows to fit the various changes, is rapidly gaining favor. These cushions, whether of plush, brocade or merely printed material, are easily put away when the season for using upholstery rolls round again. A set of attachable upholstery consists of seats for six chairs and one settee, a long, round pillow and two huge, square pillows. If a housewife knows anything whatever of the mattress-making art she can get up a set of these cushions and pillows at comparatively small expense.

Luxemburg's Soldiers.

The grand duchy of Luxemburg, which recently, because of the strong-minded young woman who rules the little country, has occupied considerable space in the newspapers, has an army, including musicians, numbering 250 men. The soldiers of Luxemburg are sumptuously lodged. Each one has his room with hot and cold water, all the conveniences of a hotel and flowers at the window. The trade of soldier in the grand duchy is not for war but for administrative uses. For this reason the recruits are, most carefully selected. They are required to be handsome young fellows whose height is not to be below five feet six inches. Recently a candidate presented himself who received full admiration of the jury of admission. Handsome and well made, he measured not less than five feet ten inches, but the new soldier disturbed all the regulations of the army. It was found necessary to have a uniform made for him, linen of special size and his bed had to be lengthened.

War Minister "Moved On."

Colonel Seely, the head of England's army, was among the spectators at the recent army maneuvers, and was entirely unrecognized. He was in a gray tweed cap, and looked the most unassuming of men.
Once the village policeman, who was busy asking little urchins and their round-eyed sisters to stand back, passed his arm in front of the minister for war, who meekly gave way. He seemed to enjoy the sight thoroughly, and ran from point to point with much energy. He had arrived in a big car, which did not even carry one of the little flags which indicate an official or a privileged spectator.

Industrial Wealth Grows.

The growth of factories is remarkable in the state of New South Wales, Australia. During last year goods to the value of over \$300,000,000 were manufactured; 115,000 hands were employed and paid nearly \$60,000,000 in wages. The position of manufacturers is now so strong that notwithstanding possibilities of bad seasons, people are no longer dependent upon the weather for their prosperity. A decade ago the average yearly income of every industrial employe in New South Wales was \$315, while at present it is over \$500.

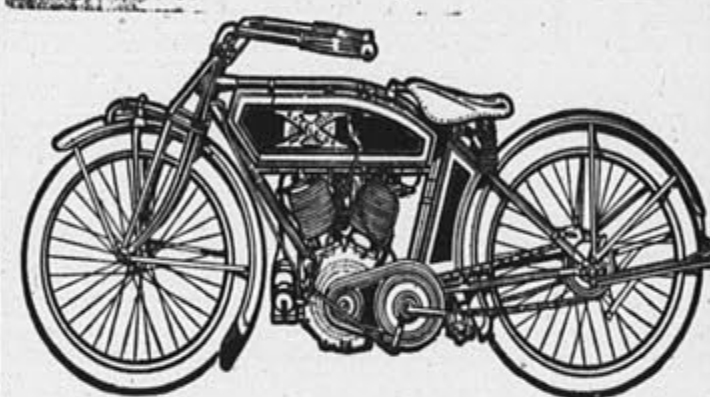

Twenty Pound Parcels to be Admitted in the Second Zone

The parcel post department of the postal system has announced another innovation. It is the admission to the second zone of 20 pound parcels as the maximum weight limit. This covers a radius of 100 miles around.

The parcel post has increased by bounds in favor of every person who has had occasion to use this method of sending packages. Although in operation a little less than a year, the business of the postoffice throughout the country has been doubled, tripled and quadrupled in many instances.

Great Christmas Rush

The approach of the Christmas season will see the parcel post system utilized to the limit, and as everyone knows how the local postoffice has been crowded in years with the ordinary Christmas business, persons are wondering how they will get through the coming season with the expected rush, which will include the additional parcel post business, as well as the regular mail packages.

May Increase Weight Limit

An increase in the weight of parcel post packages to 100 pounds is a possibility of the near future it is predicted. The increase in business

which followed the advance in weight of packages has led department heads to believe that the item will be more effective to the lie and will attract more business the weight of 100 pounds is established.

Merchants Want the Increased

Department stores which use parcel post system for delivering small packages would gladly take advantage of increased weight limit delivering goods. In fact it is said that hundreds of merchants are barred from using the system nature of the goods they would take it up at once.
