MARQUETTE FAVORED AS SITE FOR A U. P. HEALTH LABORATORY

If the state legislature passes the bill providing for a state laboratory in the upper peninsula, which has been recommended by the state board of health, Marquette will probably be the city chosen for the institution. Dr. Abrams, of Hancock, upper peninsula member of the board, is in favor of Marquette and is believed to voice the views of his associates.

"Marquette is the most central point in the peninsula for a laboratory," said Dr. Abrams yesterday, "and if the bill passes arrangements could be made to establish the laboratory at the normal school. The Michigan College of Mines offers advantages just as good, but a copper country town would not be centrally located."

"The board is of the opinion that should a laboratory be given the upper peninsula and quarters in a state institution be obtained, the cost of maintenance would not be more than \$3,000 a year, because it would not be necessary to erect a building, the expense of light, heat, janitor fees and the like would be eliminated and it would be possible to teach various subjects that students do not have the opportunity of taking up at present.

"Most of the upper peninsula laboratory work is now done in Madison and Chicago, especially that from the western end of the upper peninsula, because it is more convenient than to send the work to Lansing. An upper peninsula laboratory would make it possible to send samples for analysis one day, and receive a report the day following."

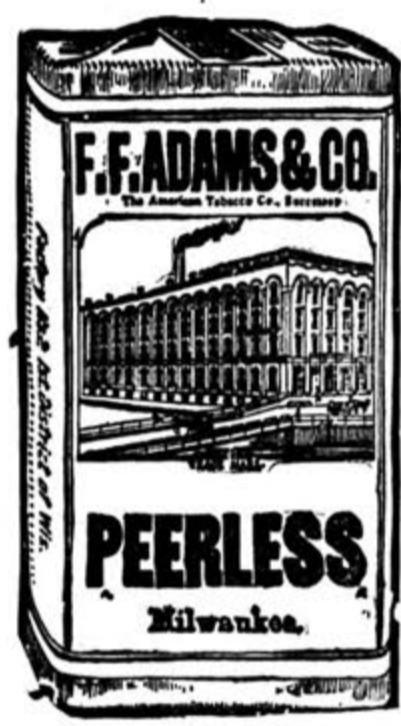

MENOMINEE SAYS SHE WILL NOT LOSE HER DIVISION OF MILITIA

Reports From Houghton and Calumet That Menominee Would Be Given Berth in U. P. Naval Militia Not Substantiated, Is Said

Menominee, March 10.—Reports from the northern end of the upper peninsula to the effect that Menominee's militia company is to be mustered out in a short time to make way for the installation of a naval reserve station here failed to receive credence from Capt. Oscar Falk of Company L.

The rumors were to the effect that the Fourth division of the Second Battalion, Michigan Naval Brigade was to be given a berth in Menominee.

Heard Nothing.

"I have heard nothing of it," said Capt. Falk, "and if there was anything to it, I think I would have been informed before this."

Officers of the Hancock Divisions were quoted in a Hancock paper recently as saying it was too early to discuss the question. Lieut. Ruppe was not disposed to discuss the subject and as Commander Grant T. Stephenson has gone to the Panama-Pacific exposition, it may be several weeks before anything definite is learned.

Divisions For Others.

GERMAN SUBMARINE RAN

London, March 10.—The German submarine, U-20 has been sent to the bottom according to a statement today by the British admiralty. The submarine was rammed by the British torpedo boat destroyer, Ariel. The members of the crew surrendered and were saved. The location of the sinking of the submarine was not revealed in the statement.

The captain and crew will be deprived of all special privileges, as in the case of the U-8 and will be held for trial in connection with the sinking of merchantmen. The U-20 was one of the larger types of German submarines, having a cruising radius of 2,000 miles. She was built in 1913. This makes seven German submarines lost since the start of the war.
