> tute railway passenger rate bill which is is understood, will be in the nature of a compromise. Only two members of the senate committee, Senators Ogg and Williams, attended the meeting, while the full membership of nine on the house committee was on hand.

The meeting was an executive affair and the members were sworn to secrecy on all but the result of the vote. The general opinion is that the compromise will be a different basis of fare grading. Under the existing law all railroads whose gross earnings are more than \$1,200 a mile are compelled to come under the 2-cent passenger fare rule.

May Help Smaller Roads.

It is expected the committee will send out a bill changing this from \$1,200 a mile in gross earnings to \$1.500 or perhaps even \$2,000. This would bring the more profitable lines under the 2-cent rate and give those paying less money the 2 1-2-cent fare rule.

The bill introduced by Senator George Barnes of Flint, requiring all rehicles to carry lights, was finally assed in committee of the whole.

Miners Make Good Soldiers. Lord Kitchener, it appears, has in the course of his service become deep ly impressed with the value of the Northumbrian miner as a military asset. 

(By Associated Press.) Berlin, March 19 .- The German merchant who recently is the author of the declaration that the whole of the Soudan, including the Khartoum district is in the hands of the Dervishes, relates the details of an engage-

ment last December at Fashoda in which a British general and officers and 2,000 men lost their lives. The merchant relates a story of alleged uprising at Suasimi in November in which, he says, an Australian camp near the pyramids was attacked and 200 Australians killed and many more taken prisoners by the Dervishes.

Eighty thousand is said to be the force of Dervishes that overflowed the entire provine of Assouan and destroyed the tracks of the Cairo-Assouan line. On December first the savages destroyed the Cairo-Alexandria line.

Thousands of tribesmen responded to the general appeal of the Dervishes and on December first, a force of 40,-000 marched to Fashoda where a British army was stationed. Of the native troops under Gen. Halley, all but 2,000 deserted to the tribesmen. leaving that number, who lost their aves in the attack on the city.






