(By Associated Press.) Topolobampo, Mexico, Dec. 11.—(By radio to San Diego, Cal.)—Yaqui Indians are now on the warpath and are raiding American settlements in the Yaqui valley according to reports reaching here from Guaymas. The Richardson Construction company, owning large tracts of land in the district have sent appeals, asking for protection for the American colony which is entirely without protection where the Indians are reported raiding farms and houses driving stock away and burning homes and barns. They are reported to be moving towards the experimental station.

WILSON SEES AMERICA AS A POWER IN PEACE COURTS OF THE WORLD

Declares in Address to Business Men This Will Come if U. S. Hold Self-Possession

(By Associated Press.) Columbus, Ohio, Dec. 11.—President Wilson addressed the chamber of commerce Friday and declared that if the United States preserved its self-possession in the present crisis it will have great influence in reconstructing the peaceful courts of the world and in bringing the nation together again. Preparedness by business men to mobilize the nation's business resources as a means of defense was urged by the president. He told them it was impossible to separate business and life. He dwelt upon the need of ships to carry the nation's commerce. Wilson praised the new banking laws and criticized the policy of protection.

CREW OF GREEK SHIP ATTACKED TWICE BY "SUB" IN SAME DAY

THEIR VESSEL SUNK IN FIRST ATTACK, WERE FORCED INTO BOATS WHEN RESCUING SHIP SANK

(By Associated Press.) London, Dec. 11.—The crew of the Greek steamer L'Goularis, which was destroyed by a German submarine, according to a report Thursday, had two experiences with torpedoes the same day, according to a report Thursday had two experiences with torpedoes the same day, according to an official statement forwarded from Athens today. The survivors took to their boats when the ship was sunk. They were taken in tow by the submarine and towed for several miles when the submarine cast off the lines and disappeared. This occurred about 150 miles west of Alexandria. Later an English steamer picked them up and was shortly afterwards torpedoed and sunk. The crews of both ships were later landed.

All is Ready for Dedication of St. Joseph's

LIEBBKNECHT IS AGAIN TARGET FOR MILITARY PROCEEDINGS BY GOVT

FAMOUS GERMAN SOCIALIST LEADER BE PROSECUTED UNDER SANCTION OF REICHSTAG

(By Associated Press.) Paris, Dec. 11.—German military authorities have begun fresh proceedings against Carl Liebknecht, socialist member of the reichstag, according to the correspondent of a Paris paper on the Swiss frontier. His prosecution has been sanctioned by the reichstag.

News despatches sent out last spring said that Herr Liebknecht had been ordered to place himself under the discipline of the military and he was not allowed to write articles and was not to attend public gatherings with the exception of the reichstag, an dthe Landtag. It was late found that members of the reichstag could not be abridged in this manner as the restrictions were withdrawn.

RARE JEWELS, VALUED AT \$50,000 STOLEN FROM ART INSTITUTE

LAVERNE NOYES COLLECTION TAKEN FROM CHICAGO MUSEUM OF ART TODAY

THIEF FAMILIAR WITH INSTITUTE

CLIMBED DOWN THROUGH SKYLIGHT, ELUDED THREE GUARDS AND ESCAPED WITH GEMS

(By Associated Press.) Chicago, Dec. 11.—Eluding three watchmen, a thief gained entrance to the Art Institute today and escaped with a collection of rare jewels valued at between \$35,000 and \$50,000. The collection was a gift of Laverne Noyes, Chicago manufacturer and art collector. The collection was made up of five pieces of ancient French make and comprised a necklace of diamonds and opals, a brooch and set of diamond earrings, a watch, buckle and pendant of opals. It was given to the Art Institute two years ago.

Jewels in Case at Midnight All of the jewels were in their case at the Institute at midnight when the guards made their rounds, but at 1 o'clock they were found to have been taken. The theft was evidently planned by some one familiar with the building and its collections. Entrance was gained through a skylight.

Two Great Anchor Line Elevators at Erie Burn—Loss \$750,000

(By Associated Press.) Erie, Pa. Dec. 11.—Two of the three Anchor Line elevators here, owned by the Pennsylvania railroad, was destroyed by fire early yesterday with 500,000 bushels of wheat, valued at \$750,000. The wheat was from Canada and was awaiting shipment to Great Britain and her allies. CASES AGAINST 105 IN ELECTION FRAUD DISMISSED TODAY

PROSECUTOR SAYS DOES NOT BELIEVE STATE HAS STRONG ENOUGH CASE AGAINST MEN

(By Associated Press.) Indianapolis, Dec. 11.—Charges against 105 of the remaining 118 defendants in the Marion county election fraud cases were dismissed today by Judge Elchhorn on motion of Prosecutor Rucker. The prosecutor said that in view of the showing made in the trial of the case against Mayor Rose, he did not believe the state had strong enough case against the others. The 13 remaining to be tried are mainly policemen and minor city officials.

CONSTANTINE'S GOVERNMENT MAKE ARRANGEMENTS FOR REDUCING THE STRENGTH OF ARMY

ENTENTE DECIDE TO CONTINUE FIGHT

ATCCHENER, GREY AND FRENCH OFFICIALS DETERMINE TO CONTINUE BALKAN CAMPAIGN

(BULLETINS)

Athens, Dec. 11.—The Greek government has made all arrangements for the demobilization of the troops and it is expected that a decree will be issued shortly.

Petrograd, Dec. 11.—Reports were received here today from Kiev that the Austrian and German troops were evacuating Lemberg, the capital of Galicia.

(By Associated Press.)

London, Dec. 11.—Latest report from the Balkans indicate the allies are falling back but without suffering the losses when the pursuing Bulgarians were attacking rear guard. Paris reports that the French have inflicted heavy losses on their pursuers.

The British public received a shock in a despatch from Salonika which stated that Guivaegeli had been occupied by two divisions of Germans. Later reports indicated they were not within range of the invaders' guns. Guivaegeli is on the Greek front near the Vardar river and commands the railroads to the north of Salonika. This city came into prominence as the headquarters of Dr. Donaldson during the typhus epidemic in Serbia. The diplomatic negotiations with Greece are not yet settled. In military circles it is considered of primary importance that Salonika be retained as a base for future entente operations. It is conceded that the allied troops are not numerous enough to cope with the Bulgarians and Germans who are estimated to have over a million men ready. The final day of Lord Derby's plan of recruiting finally no diminution in the number of applicants who besiege the offices.

ENTENTE OFFICIALS CONFER

Athens, Dec. 11.—The French minister had a second conference with King Constantine this morning. Subsequently the ministers of the entente called on Premier Skouloudis and it is learned on good authority that energetic representations were made to Greece to hasten her plans. A decisive move on the part of the Greek government is expected at any moment.

MILLION AT CALL

London, Dec. 11.—The Bulgarian premier, M. Radoslavoff stated in an interview that the central powers have over a million men at their disposal at any time. WILL CONTINUE FIGHT Paris, Dec. 11.—The French and British decided today to continue the Balkan campaign and agreed on military measures to assure the safety of the entente forces at Salonika. A semi-official report announces today that French and British troops are withdrawing from Serbia.

SETTLE IMPORTANT POINTS

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ACCOMPLISHING ECONOMY.

Much as has been said and written about economy, more can be said and thought with profit. That one has plenty today is no surety that there will be plenty tomorrow. Emergencies are always coming into everyone's life, and the wise man will endeavor to provide against the day of need. Many who know they should economize have no idea of how to go about it and do not give the subject the thought it demands. It is not so simple a matter. Every man should study out the subject for himself. What is economical for me may be an extravagance for you.

agance for you. Buying a cheap article is not economy if one has to renew it so often that it costs more than a good, substantial article that would have outlasted three or four of the cheap ones. Waste is one great factor in the high cost of living. Little leakages are not carefully watched, and a small leak will sink a ship. The Scotch say, "Ask thy purse what thou shouldst buy." One thing is necessary. That is never to spend more than one's income. No one should gauge his expenses by what another has done. The savings bank habit is a good one, for from saving comes having. One's never rich till he begins to keep ahead of his expenses. Carefulness of little things does not mean stinginess or meanness. Generosity is not opposed to economy. The practice of economy means more to be generous with.

The auto-irrigator is a new instrument for measuring water-attracting power of the soil, devised in connection with experiments by Prof. B. E. Livingston and Dr. L. A. Hawkins at Johns Hopkins university. It is essentially similar to Livingston's porous cup atometer, but the cup is buried in the soil instead of being exposed to the air. The experimenters have carried out a series of measurements upon potted plants irrigated automatically with this device. The rate of water loss from the irrigator is found to be highest somewhat later in the day than the time of maximum transpiration from the plants. The rate of loss from the irrigator then falls slowly, reaching its minimum in the early morning.

Although drops of falling rain are known to be almost spherical, they appear simply as streaks to the eye. This is because an indefinite number of images of the drop are impressed on the retina of the eye and, owing to persistence of vision—the retention of an image on the retina for a fraction of a second after the object has passed—the eye gets the impression of a streak. It is this that causes the spokes of a rapidly rotating wheel to appear blurred and that makes motion pictures possible.

### AUTOMOBILE QUERIES AND ANSWERS

Kindly give all the information possible as to how a six volt storage battery could be tested and charged and tools for doing same. I have a 110 volt direct current line. How many bulbs would have to be burned in connection with it?

About ten lamp sockets are fastened to a board and then connected in parallel. Carbon lamps of 110 volts are placed in the sockets. In series with the line is placed an ammeter, and across the line a voltmeter is connected. A suitable switch is placed anywhere in the circuit. The number of lamps to be operated depends upon the charging rate of the battery. Let us suppose that the initial charging rate is six amperes. Either six 100-watt lamps will approximate this figure or about five 100-watt lamps and three 50-watt lamps. The ammeter will read the number of amperes being drawn by the lamp bank, and, if the charging rate is initially six amperes and the meter reads seven, then too many lamps are in the circuit, and one at a time should be unscrewed until the meter reads six amperes.

Another method of charging at home is by the use of a water rheostat. This rheostat consists of a small barrel containing two lead plates and acidified or salt water. Each plate should be about one foot square and one-fourth inch thick. Such an arrangement may be used in a 110 volt circuit and the charging rate varied by the man in charge by bringing the plates closer together or separating them. In the latter case the resistance is made greater and in the former less. In attaching the battery to the circuit care should be taken to see that the positive of the line is connected to the positive of the battery. In charging by the gravity method you should consider that the specific gravity of the electrolyte varies as the temperature, and, if the gravity at 60 degrees F. is to be one and twenty-eight hundredths, if the temperature is 70 degrees a correction must be made. For every degree rise in temperature deduct .001 from the gravity of the liquid.

Would enlarging the valve openings or the fitting of a new cam shaft be desirable, in addition to lightening the reciprocating parts of my motor, in an effort to secure more power and better acceleration, as well as greater available maximum speed?

The fitting of larger valves will undoubtedly help to increase the power of your motor, and if you fit a new cam shaft the cams should be designed to hold the valves open a little longer than usual. It would be best to try the old cam shaft, and, if the results are not as expected, then a new shaft could be fitted. Lighter reciprocating

parts will increase the power, but do not use lighter connecting rods unless you know that the new rods will be strong enough to stand the stresses imposed.

Is the spark of a high tension magneto hotter and considered more reliable than the spark of a storage battery or generator ignition, or should a car be equipped with both when electrically equipped?

Whether a battery spark is hotter than a magneto spark depends entirely upon the systems you wish to compare. A battery system of one make may give a hotter spark under certain conditions than a magneto of given make operating under certain conditions. The single ignition system, using either a magneto alone or a battery in connection with a starting and lighting system, is fast coming into vogue. Quite a number of makers have already discarded magnetos and are using battery ignition, while others have substituted a high tension magneto for the battery system. A good magneto or a good battery system should make the choice of a dual

system more easy, but for a safe sake many use the latter.

Is there an instrument which registers the voltage through a high tension coil?

There are instruments made for recording high voltages such as pass through the line in a whiff of a coil, but the instrument is not practical for use in motor cars service. Such instruments are expensive and are made rather large. You will find high voltage recording meters in testing laboratories.

## SCREEN CONCEALS A COUCH
