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LANSING DESPACHES 2nd NOTE TO VIENNA

VILLA SEEKS ASYLUM IN UNITED STATES; TO GIVE UP LONG FIGHT

TROUBLE MAKER IN MEXICAN MIDDLE ASKS PRIVILEGE OF CROSSING AMERICAN BORDER—PEACE TERMS BETWEEN VILLAISTS AND DE FACTO GOVERNMENT BEING SIGNED AT NOON TODAY

ELIMINATED FROM MEXICAN AFFAIRS

(By Associated Press.)
El Paso, Dec. 20.—Agreements were being reached and papers signed at noon today whereby the Villa supporters will conclude terms of peace with the Carranza defacto government. Villa is reported to be in Juarez. The signing of the peace agreement eliminates Villa from Mexican affairs.
El Paso, Texas, Dec. 20.—Final arrangements for General Francisco Villa to enter the United States, ending his participation in Mexican affairs were to be made at noon today here, according to information from a reliable source. Preparations were begun towards this end upon receipt of advice from Secretary Lansing which stated that it was decided Villa will be accorded as asylum in this country as a political refugee.

GREEKS AND BULGARS REPORTED IN FIGHT; SEVERAL ARE KILLED

Detachments of Bulgar and Hellenic Soldiers Reported to Have Clashed

(By Associated Press.)
Paris, Dec. 20.—Fighting between small detachments of Greek and Bulgarian soldiers is reported today in despatches from Brindisi, Italy, to the Havas agency. It is said that several Greek officers and soldiers were killed and wounded, and that the Greek government was rushing reinforcements to the aid of the small detachment where the fighting occurred.

CHARNEL SHIP, EASTLAND SOLD FOR \$46,000 TODAY

Chicago, Dec. 20.—The steamer Eastland which turned turtle in the Chicago river, July 24, causing the death of 812 persons was sold at auction today to Captain Evers of the Illinois Naval Reserves for \$46,000. Capt. Evers announced the ship will be used for training members of the reserves after certain changes have been made in the vessel to assure that it will be perfectly seaworthy.

NO DYES, PRINT PAPER TO BE NATURAL COLOR

White Stock For Newspaper Printing Near Exhaustion—Cannot Procure Bleach Stuff

Owing to the fact that very few of the big Wisconsin paper mills are able to secure dye stuffs and bleaches in sufficient quantities, it is announced that print paper (used in printing newspapers) will, after the first of the year be of a cream tint. This is called the natural tint of the paper. It is stated that there is no telling how long the little supply of bleach and dye stuff will last, when all the mills will be compelled to make the "natural" stock.

NEW AMERICAN NOTE BE DELIVERED TO VIENNA FOREIGN OFFICE TUES.

LANSING MAKES FORMAL ANNOUNCEMENT OF FORWARDING OF SUPPLEMENTARY COMMUNICATION ON THE ANCONA MATTER—SECOND EPISTLE IS SAID TO BE FIRM AND STRONG IN THE STATEMENT OF DISAVOWAL DEMANDS AND REQUESTS FOR INDEMNITY.

IS REITERATION OF FORMER DEMANDS

(By Associated Press.)
Washington, Dec. 20.—Secretary Lansing announced today that the second American note to Austria-Hungary on the Ancona matter had gone forward and should reach Vienna tomorrow evening. It is said to be a virtual reiteration of the former demands. The text of the note will be issued for publication in afternoon papers of Wednesday.
Yesterday, Secretary Lansing and other state department officials refused to divulge any information concerning the communication. From other reliable sources, however, came a strong intimation that the final draft had been completed and forwarded by the secretary.

NO DISCUSSIONS FOR U. S.

The United States is represented as being determined not to enter into any discussion of such details; this government being primarily concerned with the principles and the violation of law and neutral rights involved.
The note, it is said, broadly intimates that the final word has been said by the United States. Upon the attitude of the Vienna foreign office the status of relations between the two countries depends.
Note 500 Words Long
Washington, Dec. 20.—The Ancona note is about 500 words long and although characterized as firm in tone is said to be less sharp in tenor of its demands. The note is said to be based squarely on the Austrian admiral's own version of the sinking of the Ancona.

KINNEY WOULD ESCAPE PAYMENT OF \$30,000

Aged Iron River Mine Owner Asks High Court to Set Aside Recent Verdict of \$30,000

Appealing to the United States court of appeals, asking that the verdict of \$30,000 in favor of Mrs. Ida McNabb, prepossessing widow known here, be set aside, John H. Kinney, the aged mine owner and alleged gay Lothario is seeking to evade the payment of the judgement.
Kinney's appeal was filed in the district court by Attorneys F. J. Hogan and Miss Harriet Freedy. Arguments for the reversal were heard last week and the matter adjourned until the first Monday in January, after the case had been taken under advisement. The judgement, in the contention of Attorney Hogan, represents "the perpetration of a great injustice."

Escanabans have been interested in the case ever since its inception several years ago. The contract which formed the basis of the love suit was said to have been executed at the Ludington hotel here. A year ago, Miss Freedy took depositions in the case, for her client, in Escanaba.

Man Beats Wife, Gets Ninety Days

Escanaban Gave Wife But Five Dollars in Three Weeks For Support of the Family

"Goodby, children, your papa's going to jail. Goodby wife, I'm going." "Go on, I'll get along and be better off without you." was the answer as she refused his proffered hand.
For he had just heard Judge C. D. McEwen say "ninety days." The judge was not inclined to be lenient because the man was an old offender.

Two weeks ago he came home, drunk and abusive. The wife had patiently awaited him and was keeping his supper warm for him. Without any provocation, according to the wife, he seized her and choked her, throwing her on the floor. The three children were in the room, screaming for the father to stop.
The testimony of the wife revealed the fact that he had only given her \$5 in three weeks for the support of the family and that he had spent the remainder of his wages in saloons.
The name of the family is being withheld for obvious reasons. The case is reported to have been the outgrowth of a number of such affairs with the incarcerated husband the aggressor.

SIMPLE RITES MARK WEDDING OF WILSON—NO MILITARY POMP

ONLY NEAR RELATIVES OF COUPLE ARE PRESENT AT CEREMONY—PRESIDENT IN EVENING ATTIRE

Washington, Dec. 20.—According to announced plans, President Wilson and Mrs. Norman Galt, widow of one of Washington's successful business men, were married here early Saturday evening at the home of the bride.
The Rev. Herbert Scott Smith, rector of St. Margaret's Episcopal church in which the bride is a communicant, was chosen to read the marriage ritual, with a benediction by Rev. James H. Taylor, pastor of the Fifth Presbyterian church of which the President is one of the elders.
The ceremony was as devoid of display as if the bridegroom still were professional rather than the highest political honors.
In the little group of less than thirty persons present at the ceremony there were less than a half dozen who did not possess blood ties of closest kinship with either the bride or bridegroom. Not a name in the company is known beyond the confines of the circle which surrounds the average American family of comfortable means.
There was none of the military pomp and the flash of uniforms which is wont to mark the life at the white house—it was conspicuously absent.
The president, always a dignified figure, wore evening attire with all the modish accessories. The wedding was held in the large drawing room of the Galt home. Promptly on the hour the president and his bride appeared before the altar. Neither was attendance requested to be present. Members of the woman's club who are interested in the work the committee is endeavoring to do are also urged to be in attendance at this time as matters of extreme importance are slated for action.

AUTO ACCIDENT FATAL TO WIFE OF FORMER ST. STEPHEN'S RECTOR

MRS. F. W. GREENE, WIFE OF REV. GREENE, FORMERLY AT HEAD OF ESCANABA EPISCOPAL CHURCH STRUCK BY MACHINE NEAR HOME IN ABERDEEN, WASH., SUCCUMBED TO INJURIES—DISRUPTS PLANS FOR XMAS REUNION.

DETAILS OF ACCIDENT NOT RECEIVED

Mrs. F. W. Greene, wife of Rev. F. W. Greene, formerly rector of St. Stephen's Episcopal church of this city was killed in Aberdeen, Washington, yesterday by being struck by an automobile. This news without any further particulars was received in a telegram which reached here this morning.
The Greens left this city about ten years ago for the west, after having spent fifteen years in this city. The family were exceedingly popular with not only the people of their church, but made friends throughout the city, all of whom will be grieved to learn of Mrs. Greene's death.
There are seven children in the family most of them grown up and it had been arranged to have a big family reunion on Christmas day.
Many former residents of this city are now living in or near Aberdeen and had received invitations to join the family in celebrating Christmas. Particulars of the accident were wired for by The Mirror, but no answer was received up to time of going to press.

ALLEGED BOMB PLOTTER BARES MORE EVIDENCE

Fredrick Metzler Tells U. S. Officials That Von Papen Was Given Reports on Results

New York, Dec. 20.—Fredrick Metzler held in connection with the alleged plot to embarrass the allies by plotting to destroy or hinder the shipment of munitions, made a full statement today to the authorities regarding the actions of Koenig, another of the men held in connection with the plots.
Koenig had twenty-five agents working for him in New York alone, Metzler said. He told that the results of the work were reported to Capt. Von Papen by Koenig.

Springfield, Ill., Dec. 20.—Al O. Edwards, custodian of the old Soldiers Home here and the last person left alive who is known to have witnessed the marriage of Abraham Lincoln is dead. Edwards was a nephew of Mrs. Lincoln and was present at the wedding of the martyred president.

WILSON AND BRIDE AT QUIET MT. RESORT

President and Mrs. Wilson Give up Golf Today to Read Congratulatory Missives

Hot Springs, Va., Dec. 20.—President Wilson and his bride abandoned their earlier plans of playing golf today to read the great number of missives from the many friends of the couple in the United States. Since reaching here they have remained in such deep seclusion that only members of their party have seen them. However, they are planning an automobile trip. Plans for a Christmas celebration at the cozy mountain hotel are also being made. A big Christmas tree will be provided and a musical program will be given. It is expected that members of the family will come down for the event.

VIOLENT ATTACKS MADE

Some indication of the long expected German offensive in Flanders where the Germans are said to have been massing troops for several weeks is contained in British and French officials reports which states that under a cloud of gas, the Germans attacked the French and British lines. These attacks are said to have failed completely, so completely that very few of the attackers returned to their lines. They opened the attack early in the morning. Later in the day the Germans displayed unusual activity, directing heavy bombardments near Ypres and at the French positions near Messines. Mine explosions were frequent before the trenches at Armentieres and the German troops tried unsuccessfully to occupy the craters formed by the blasts. Along the western front intermittent artillery duels have been going on with the French guns at St. Mihiel developing great intensity of fire.
The position of Greece is still regarded with keen anxiety by both the entente and the central powers.

TREACHERY IS CHARGED

Berlin, Dec. 20.—(Wireless to Sayville)—The official Austrian report of Dec. 19, made public here today contains the following passage regarding the Montenegrin campaign: "Montenegrins at some places held up their hands, and waving flags advanced until near the Austrian lines. There they suddenly threw hand grenades into the Austrian lines. This treachery found suitable treatment on the part of the Austrians. It will always be met with the same treatment." MONITORS SHELL COAST Berlin, Dec. 20.—(via London)—Entente monitors yesterday shelled German positions at Westende on the Belgian coast, but were driven away by land batteries, says an official statement at the German army headquarters today.

The Farmer's Auto.
Several hundred thousand American farmers have invested or will invest in automobiles this fall. And every such investment will add to the attractiveness of rural life and do its share in keeping boys and girls on the farms.

With an automobile, the neighborhood is quadrupled in size. Visits to town or to friends are made easy. General gathering at focal points are stimulated and made more frequent. There is a better exchange of ideas, easier co-operation, pleasanter life. There is likewise a most enormous increase of interest in good roads.

Every farmer who buys an auto becomes forthwith a champion of better highways. One experience of getting stalled in the mud when out for a pleasure drive is enough to convert the most stubborn opponent of "new-fangled notions."—Chicago Journal.

Trailers for Ambulances.
Instead of continuing to convert passenger automobiles into ambulances, as in the beginning of the war, the British military authorities now use almost exclusively trailers, which are attached to the touring cars by means of ordinary drawbars. An anchorage for such trailers is attached to every touring car in military service, at very small expense, so that any one of the cars can instantly pick up an ambulance and convey it to the hospital at the rear. The trailer has been of great service to the hospital corps and is now manufactured in quantity by the inventor. The first car of this type was made in November last, and thoroughly tested before being submitted to the war office.—Scientific American.

Stops Gear Noises.
Sometimes, when a new timing gear or other gear is inserted in an engine, it makes considerable noise in meshing with the old gears. Often this noise is very distracting to a careful driver. This can be corrected to some

extent by the careful use of coarse emery mixed with thick grease. Work it into the teeth as the engine is rotated and be very careful that none of the emery gets into the working bearings. It will soon cut down the teeth to a smooth fit. Wash the gears off with great care with coal oil when the job is done. Use a grease gun to spray coal oil over the gears to remove the emery.

New Cretonne Cushions.
There are some interesting new cushions for cretonne chairs that are made with a little apron attachment in front that hangs down from eight inches to a foot over the front of the chair. They are made of stenciled linen or cretonne, and the little flap is edged with linen fringe about an inch wide. They are a novelty and very attractive.

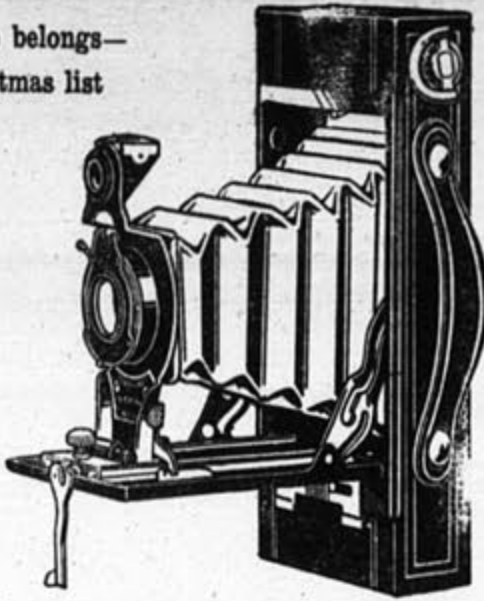

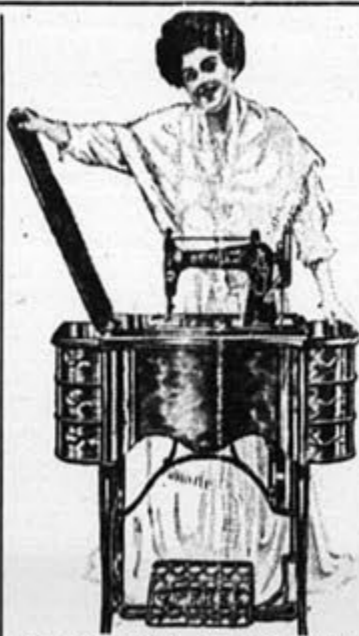
