United States Secretary and Baron Zwiadenek Discuss Ancona Matter—Intimate Settlement Made

(By Associated Press.)

Washington, Dec. 21.—Full settlement in the Lusitania case which included reparation for the lives of Americans lost in the disaster has been postponed by the dismissal of the German military and naval attaches and by the interposition of the Ancona matter. Consideration of these facts has caused the officials in Berlin to decide that such a settlement as would be satisfactory to the United States would not meet with popular approval in Germany.

May Make Satisfactory Reply
Washington, Dec. 21.—Baron Erick Zwiadenek, charge d'affaires at the Austrian embassy here called on Secretary Lansing today and discussed the Ancona matter. It was authoritatively stated that the baron intimated to Secretary Lansing that if the second American note was less severe in tone the Austrian government would make a satisfactory reply to the United States.

U. S. Protests Blockade

Washington, Dec. 21.—Another protest against the presence of British cruisers close off New York and other American ports on the Atlantic has been made to Great Britain by the state department. The presence of the cruisers just outside the three mile limit is described as annoying and unwarranted interference with American commerce.

The purchase of the property is the start towards the building of a parochial school for St. Patrick's and which has been an aim of Fr. Barth's since coming to this locality. The parish council was authorized to make the purchase.

AGED MAN NEAR DEATH; OVERCOME BY ESCAPING FUMES OF COAL STOVE

TIMOTHY J. KILLIAN FOUND LYING UNCONSCIOUS IN ROOM AT 322 LUDINGTON STREET THIS MORNING — WAS ALONE IN ROOM AT TIME AND MIGHT HAVE DIED BUT FOR THE TIMELY VISIT OF CHARLES MAPES

TIMELY DISCOVERY SAVED HIS LIFE

Coal gas fumes, escaping from a small heater in the rooms at 322 Ludington street occupied by Timothy J. Killian, well known and aged resident of the city, was the cause of a near case of asphyxiation shortly before the noon hour today. The aged man was found lying on his bed in the room in a state of coma from the effects of the deadly gas, and would probably have died as he slept but for the timely arrival of Charles Mapes. Mapes immediately discovered the presence of the fumes and endeavoring to rouse the aged sleeper found him unconscious.

Calls Physician

Clearing the foul air from the room, Mapes called Dr. J. J. Walsh and the unconscious man was removed immediately to the home of a daughter, Mrs. J. J. Corcoran, Elmore street, where he lies late this afternoon, resting easily but without having regained consciousness. The condition of Mr. Killian when found indicated that within a short time he would have been suffocated by the fumes, it is said.

COUNTY TO GET A NEW TRUNK HIGHWAY

Work on Proposed Line From Gladstone North to County Border Will be Started

Delta county will have an additional trunk highway, which is the result of the efforts of the local county road commissioners and county engineer and the officials of Marquette county.

The new trunk will run from Gladstone city limits to the county line north, passing through Brampton, Perkins, Maple Ridge and Lathrop. The distance will be about 25 miles from Gladstone to the county line, where Marquette will take up the work and finish the road to Nezanne.

Adds to State Road

This additional trunk highway will give Delta county several more miles of state road and will prove to be a great convenience to the people living along it's line.

It was stated today by R. P. Mason, county engineer that the survey will probably be made soon after the first of the year.

CHARGES WITHDRAWAL OF BRITISH CAUSED BY TURK OFFENSIVE

ANNOUNCEMENT MADE YESTERDAY BY FRENCH AND BRITISH WAR OFFICES IS GIVEN THE LIE IN DESPATCH FROM BERLIN WHICH DECLARES TURKS' VIOLENT ATTACKS DISLODGED BRITISH FROM SUVA AND ANZAC

CLAIM BRITISH WERE DRIVEN INTO SEA

(By Associated Press.)

Berlin, Dec. 21.—(wireless to Sayville)—A Constantinople despatch says that the withdrawal of the British troops from Anzac and Suva Bay regions of the Gallipoli peninsula came as the result of a violent offensive by the Turkish forces who inflicted heavy losses on the British and drove them into the sea. According to the Constantinople report the Turks began an offensive at all points of the Dardanelles and the fighting was very violent.

The Turks began their attacks at Anafarta (Suva Bay) and at Burnu (Anzac). The enemy launched counter attacks at Sed-u-Behr but were repulsed. Turkish artillery inflicted heavy losses on the enemy at all points.

Turkish soldiers have waited for this movement for months and showed the greatest enthusiasm. Finally the Turks defeated the enemy at Burnu.

Only Three Men Wounded

London, Dec. 21.—When the British forces withdrew from Suva Bay and Anzac on the western shore of the Gallipoli peninsula, their total casualties were three men wounded according to an official statement this afternoon.

FIRE DAMAGES MILL; START IN GLUE ROOM

Stegath Planing Mill Attacked by Flames Early Last Night—Defective Wiring Believed Cause

Starting from defective wiring, it is believed, flames attacked the Stegath planing mill on the upper end of Ludington street early last night and before it was brought under control by the firemen did damage of approximately \$2,500, the main loss being due to damaged lumber stock and machinery. The flames started in the glue room on the upper floor and before it was discovered had secured a strong headway. Employees of the company, found the fire burning fiercely and called the department which turned three streams into the building, containing the fire to the place where it originated. Insurance was carried on both building and contents.

Just a week after a jury had acquitted him of the charge of shooting his brother Adolph, Oscar Johnson, the Ishpeming man recently released from a murder charge in the Marquette circuit court, was adjudged insane and has been committed to Newberry, according to the Mining Journal of today.

Ralph Dodge of A. C. Named to Succeed W. L. Davidson at High School

Ralph A. Dodge of East Lansing was last night chosen as the successor of W. L. Davidson who resigned his position on the high school faculty to go to Milwaukee to take charge of the Boy Scouts.

Mr. Dodge comes here highly recommended. Prof. W. H. French of the Michigan Agricultural College, of which Mr. Dodge is a graduate, says "He is a capital man for your high school."

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RUSSIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE REPORTED OFF COAST OF BULGARIA

GREAT FLEET OF TRANSPORTS SAID TO BE OPPOSITE VARNA —RUSS GUNS BOMBARD CITY

TURKS AND BULGARS MAY CROSS BORDER

GERMANIC ALLIES MASSING TROOPS AT GREEK BORDER AND MAY FOLLOW ALLIES OVER LINE

ABUNDANCE OF FOOD IN TURKEY; CAN AID GERMANY

Turkish Officer, Arriving in Berlin Tells Associated Press Transportation Troubles Only Bar Now

Amsterdam, Dec. 21.—The newspaper Maasbode says it learns from Oudenzaal, Holland, that owing to the increase in the number of war prisoners who escape into Holland, the entire Dutch-German frontier will be closed by barbed wire fences.

London, Dec. 21.—The British steamer Huntsley, formerly a German ship and the British steamer Beledford, of Glasgow were sunk today. The crew of the Bedford was saved but nothing has been heard of the Huntsley's crew.

London, Dec. 21.—Premier Asquith stated in the House of Commons today that Lt. Gen. Sir H. Robertson has been recalled from France to become chief of staff in London.

London, Dec. 21.—The arrival of Russian expeditionary force off the coast of Bulgaria is reported by the Athens correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph company. The despatch says:

"A Russian cruiser and two torpedo boats which are conveying sixteen transports laden with soldiers have arrived off the Bulgarian coast and are bombarding Varna vigorously."

The Bulgarian port of Varna is on the Black Sea south of the Rumanian border and is an important railroad terminus. This city and Burgas, fifty miles further south are the principal seaports of Bulgaria on the Black Sea. On several occasions since the start of the Teuton drive in Serbia it has been reported that Russians would attempt an invasion of Bulgaria from the sea and it was said that great bodies of Russian troops were being concentrated at Odessa for this purpose. Previous despatches on Russian naval activities off Varna presumably were not borne out by later developments.

GERMANS SWITCH OBJECTIVE

London, Dec. 21.—The Albanian port of Durazzo is said to be the latest objective of the central powers operating in the southwest, and strong forces are said to have been rushed towards the Albanian coast to offset any attempts by the Italians.

NO NEED FOR SCALLOPING
Many Other Ways by Which Centerpieces

Fringe is another possibility, as are the many novelty cotton and linen braids which one can find in any art needlework department.

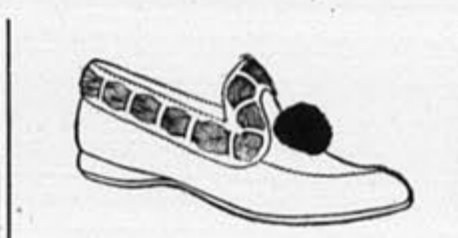

Dec. 21, 1914.

HOME-MADE CANDLE SHADES

Really a Simple Matter and "Something Different" From Those One Can Buy.

"I want some silk candle shades, Marie. Can I make them at home myself? I can't seem to find any in the shops that are just what I want and within my price."

"Surely you can make them," answered Marie reassuringly, "and the beauty about making one's own candle shades is that it is then possible to get the exact color wanted. It does seem difficult nowadays, when so many things are on display in the stores, to find something that some one else hasn't thought about."

"But how shall I get the frames for the shades?" asked Marjorie.
"Oh, I would buy the frames," assured Marie. "You can get those easily in any department store."

"Then shirr or plait about the frames a piece of thin silk; that is, thin enough for the light to shine through and make a little glowing halo of color about the candlestick. Edge and top the edges of this shade with narrow tarnished gilt braid or galoon, and at the bottom of the shade put an edging of slightly fringed or fringed silk lace or fringe or gilt."

"A little curving line of unbroken festooning, composed of tiny silk roses and green foliage, about the shades adds to their attractiveness. The shirred silk used on the shades is simply a straight strip of silk a little wider than the shade is high from top to bottom and long enough to go twice or one and a half times about the shade before it is shirred."

GET BEST OF CARE

Interned German Sailors Are Allowed Many Privileges.

Have Little Farm, Keep Poultry and Get Beer From City—Buy Baseball Equipment and Try to Learn the Game.

Norfolk, Va. — Perhaps nowhere else in the world, not even in their own country, could the welfare and personal comfort of 655 Germans be better looked after than in the case of this number of the kaiser's subjects now interned at the Norfolk navy yard on the auxiliary cruisers Eitel Friedrich and Kronprinz Wilhelm. They are allowed more privileges than are American sailors.

While recent orders of the navy department have for the time being put a stop to the liberty formerly granted the crews of the two ships, they are still accorded every courtesy to make their stay on shipboard as pleasant as possible. The government has even permitted the officers to have their wives and children on board, a privilege that is not accorded officers on American warships nor, so far as American naval officers know, to those of any other nation.

Secretary Daniels some months ago issued an order banning wines, beer or any other intoxicants from American warships. The sailors on the Eitel Friedrich and Kronprinz Wilhelm are allowed beer, wines or anything else they want. The Germans are provided with the best of things to eat. Of course they pay for it, they appear to be plentifully supplied with coin of the realm.

The navy department permitted the Germans to cultivate a tract of land near the pier where their ships are moored, and this miniature farm is really a greater attraction for visitors than are the former sea raiders themselves. The interned Germans are an industrious lot. When they were allowed unrestricted liberty they spent considerable time working their garden and in making various little trinkets for friends and to send home. When they were not working they were walking the streets of Norfolk, rowing in the harbor or swimming in the surf at the various seaside resorts.

Their garden is filled with potatoes, cabbages, tomatoes and other "truck." They also have quite a number of fowl—geese, chickens and a few ducks. Geese appear to be the favorite fowl of the Germans, and goose dinners are on the bill of fare on both ships almost every Sunday.

The Germans have provided unique and attractive little homes for their fowl. In America a place where chickens roost is called a "henhouse." The Germans call them "homes." A number of these "homes" have been erected on the land loaned to the Germans, each "home" is provided with a chimney and has a pathway leading to the door. The chimney is of no use because there is no fire. Not more than four chickens roost in one house. The Germans built the homes up of scrap lumber, wooden boxes and barrel tops. They are painted red and then striped in white paint to represent bricks. They are clean and attractive.

Captain Thierichens of the Eitel Friedrich and Captain Thierfelder of the Kronprinz Wilhelm were seen recently standing on the pier at which their ships were moored watching a number of men from both ships trying to learn baseball. Over \$200 was spent in buying baseball equipment and several men of the interned ships showed every promise of mastering the game.

Captain Thierichens apparently takes more interest in things American than does Captain Thierfelder, who appears to be downhearted; he says he would rather be fighting than remain here with nothing to do. Captain Thierichens takes things as they come. He, too, says he would like to be able to fight for his country, but he believes that he and his men made a gallant record while they were raiding the sea for ships of the enemy. He laughs at American jokes and encourages his men to enjoy life while they can. He furnishes them with news from the war front by pasting brief items on a bulletin board. He permits his men to have games on the ships. He allowed them to have entertainments and to invite friends until six officers from the Kronprinz Wilhelm violated their patrol and went to sea in the yacht Eclipse.

Doctor Krugernack, one of the officers missing from the Wilhelm, is said to have wept bitterly every time he received a letter from home or wrote one of his relatives.

"He lost brothers and cousins in the war," Captain Thierfelder told a friend who had noticed the doctor weeping.

Captain Thierichens, who, according to American naval officers, is a sincere and able commander, disapproves of the German officers violating their parole.

"A German officer never breaks his word," he said. "I gave my word for all my men, and those who violate my confidence will be punished if they are caught."

CASE FOR THE NIGHTDRESS

Dainty and Useful, This Pretty Receptacle Will Be Found to Repay Time Spent Upon It.

A very dainty and useful nightdress case is easily and quickly made from three gentlemen's hem-stitched handkerchiefs and some pretty ribbon. It washes easily and irons up like new, and makes an inexpensive and very nice present.

First of all, it is well to decorate the flap part of the case, and this is really the only work connected with it. Slots are made inside the hem-stitched border of the handkerchief; to do this, simply slit the handkerchief



at regular intervals round so that ribbon can be threaded through; the slits should be about an inch and a half long, though, of course, this will depend upon the width of the ribbon used, and are buttonholed round with linen thread.

In the center embroider an initial letter, which may be put on by means of a transfer and embroidered in silk or thread. The initial to look really effective should be padded before it is embroidered. To make up the case, sew three sides of two handkerchiefs together, then to the top of the back handkerchief sew on the flap. Now run the ribbon chosen through the slots and tie in the bow at the left hand corner.

An everyday case can be made in exactly the same way, using light colored handkerchiefs instead of the pure white; they do not soil so quickly as the white.

ECONOMY IN SPEECH.

All of us, down in our hearts, have an enduring admiration for the man of few words. In some ways, perhaps justly, perhaps unjustly, we have come to associate taciturnity with strength of character. The "still mouth and true hand" which the old German saw has it, "go through the whole land," have been linked in many a song and many a story, in many an episode of life. Brief and pithy sayings almost always bear great weight and, conversely, action

without much speech takes on for us an added value. The man whom one thinks of as a man of action is seldom considered in connection with a facility of speech. How much of this theory is true and how much is mere moonshine is too elusive a subject to be tackled seriously. Possibly the reason that the human mind conjoins paucity of speech with an abundance of action lies in the very overwhelming quality of action, as opposed to mere words. Words generally can have no bearing, save as they are translated, directly or indirectly, into action. Hence, when the deed is done, the saying passes from the memory of witnesses; the contrast of bulking act and nebulous speech is too plain to permit of much attention for the latter.

J. R. Wright and O. F. Smith, at Manila, have spent more than a year in investigating the amount of radium in the air and in the soil under differing conditions. The effect of weather conditions on the rate of exhalation to the radioactivity of soil gas at different depths were also investigated. Rainfall and wind movement seem to be the principal meteorological controls, the amount of emanation in the air being greatest when these factors are at a premium, and vice versa. A decided diurnal variation is found to exist, the emanation content being considerably greater by night than by day. The rate at which radium emanation is exhaled from the surface of the ground shows a decided decrease after periods of heavy rain.

EARLY TRAGEDY IS RECALLED

Stone Tablet Tells Story of Pioneer Days in What is Now South Dakota.

Pierre, S. D.—The State Museum has received from W. E. Lyman of Spearfish a stone tablet found on the mountain above Spearfish by Louis Theon in March, 1887. It is a flat sandstone slab about ten inches square, upon which is scratched the following inscription:

"Came to these hills in 1823, seven of us, De La Compt, Ezra Kind, G. W. Wood, E. Brown, R. Kent, William King, Indian Crow. All dead but me Ezra Kind, killed by Ind beyond high hill, got our gold June, 1834. Got all of the gold we could carry on our pony, all got by the Indians. I have lost my gun and nothing to eat and Indians hunting me."

MUST "PADDLER OWN KANUE"

Recruiting Sergeant Takes Head of Warning, but Balks on the Instructions.

Pittsburgh, Pa.—Fearing that his runaway son would carry out an often expressed desire to enlist in the United States marine corps, Morris Kanue of Leopold, W. Va., has written to the local recruiting office of the "sea soldiers" as follows:

"U. S. Marine Corps, Pittsburgh, Pa.: I hereby warn you not to employ or hire my son, Anthony Kanue, as a submarine of the navy. He has run away from home and I think he has gone to Pittsburgh to enlist. He is only seventeen years old, in proof of which I am only thirty-nine myself. If he comes there whale him within an inch of his life and send him back to me.

"His father, MORRIS KANUE," Sergt. Michael DeBoo, in charge of the Pittsburgh recruiting office of the United States marine corps, has assured the anxious parent that the boy will not be enlisted should he apply, but that "whaling" him is out of the question, and the father should "paddle his own Kanue."

striking effects of the present war, and before it is ended it is felt that Japan must be prepared to receive much more of the influence causing unexpected transformations in various forms.

"The war in Europe has already caused not a few unexpected tendencies, among which the new attitude of the military authorities is certainly the most conspicuous. The influence of the war may extend to other quarters, and Japan in her endeavor to assist Russia and her allies may ultimately reap the benefit of realizing a remarkable progress in her manufacturing capacities when the war is ended. However, this is looking only at the bright side, and it will be well for the people to be prepared for whatever emergencies may be brought up by the greatest of the wars ever fought by the nations."

Railway Workers For France.

Another way of helping the allies is pointed out by the Japan Times in these lines:

"It is reported that the railway board has recently received overtures from the French government for the supply of Japanese railway engineers and drivers because of the scarcity of railway and tramway drivers in France, where almost all men between twenty and fifty years of age have been sent to the front. The terms proposed are said to be 180 yen (\$30) a month salary and extra allowance of 60 yen a month, the period of contract being five years. The traveling expenses are to be borne by the French government. The authorities are not yet determined as to whether the overtures be accepted or not.

"The number of engineers and drivers required is not given, but as there are about 4,226 engineers and firemen in the service of the Japanese government railways at present some of the number could be sent to France. Besides these there are many reserve engineers who would be glad to accept the offer in view of the high salary offered.

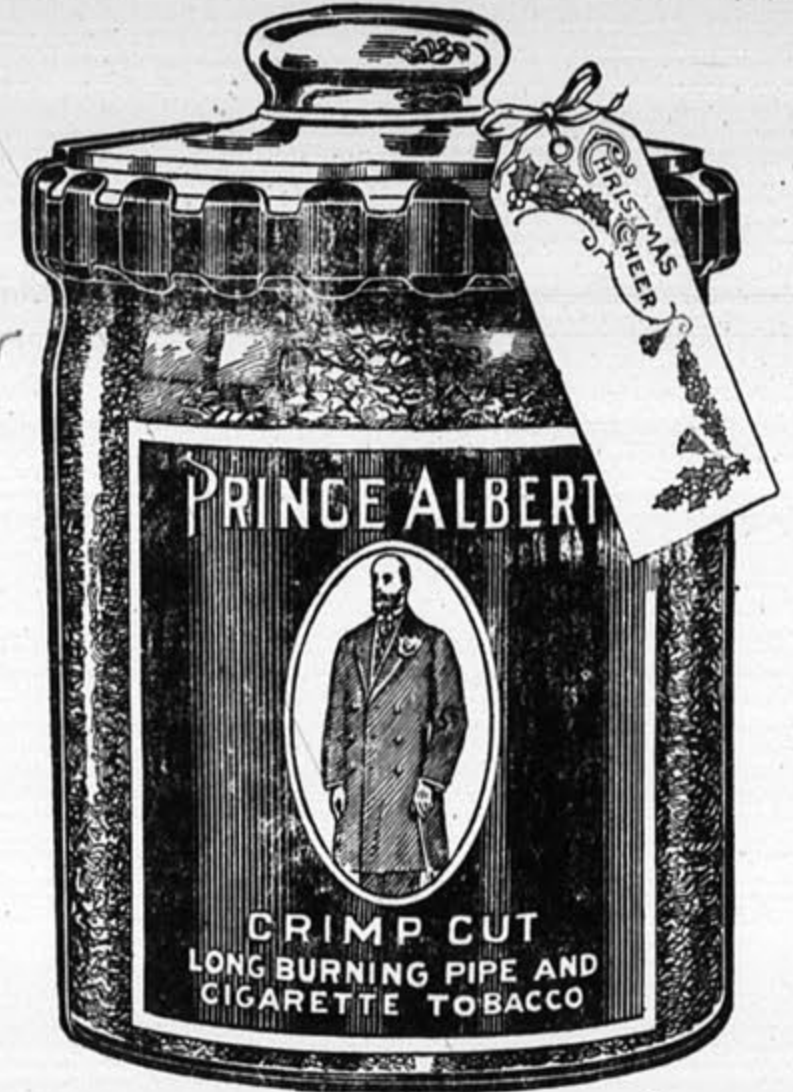
"The Tokyo city electric bureau can also supply some 1,000 drivers from its reserve force. Among the drivers in the employ of the city electric bureau there are a number of graduates of private universities, middle schools or other institutions who can be recommended for the service proposed. A monthly salary of 180 yen, with an extra allowance of 60 yen a month, is far better treatment than given to junior high officials of the government fresh from the universities or field officers of the army or professors of the higher schools."

It has also been suggested that Japan may assist the allies financially. She has 400,000,000 yen (nearly \$200,000,000) of gold in London and would place that at the disposal of Great Britain on satisfactory terms.

JAPAN RUSHING AID TO THE ALLIES

Sacrifices Secrecy In Eagerness to Help England.

RAILWAY MEN GO TO FRANCE

Ammunition Plants Working at Top Speed, and Most of Their Product is Shipped to Russia—Financial Help is Also Being Considered by Tokyo Bankers.

The work of organizing for the increased manufacture of war supplies, especially for Russia, is proceeding in Japan. At first the military authorities were quite averse to permitting the manufacture of munitions by private factories, but they are now ready to utilize every possible means, public and private, for giving practical assistance to the allies as much as possible and as speedily as possible, says

a Tokyo correspondent of the Chicago Daily News.

Therefore it is no surprise to read in the Jiji Shimpo that a contract has been made between a firm in Vladivostok and an Osaka merchant for certain war materials of the value of 17,000,000 yen (about \$8,500,000), to be supplied by the end of next May.

Feared Revealing of Secrets.

The following is quoted from the Japan Times:

"The army authorities were known to be purposing to monopolize the manufacture of arms and ammunition. For that purpose they were strongly opposed to the existence of private factories for manufacturing war materials. This opposition was chiefly based upon the necessity of keeping military secrets to themselves.

"Now, however, a great change has come over their attitude in this respect. They are now found to be encouraging private enterprise to meet the Russian demand. They have already shown themselves willing to help private undertakings with their experience in the manufacture of war materials. Military experts have been ordered to assist private concerns.

"It is really remarkable that such a change has come over the attitude of the military authorities, who are generally identified with conservatism and exclusiveness of the first order. This is considered to be one of the most

If an offensive movement towards Salonika is put under way by the Bulgarian forces, it is hardly likely that Greece will interfere, as she must grant the same rights to the pursuers of the allies as she does to the entente troops.

New Drives Planned? While the Bulgarians and Turks are massing troops at the border of Greek Macedonia, the allies are ceaselessly landing troops at Salonika, but several months is believed necessary before any movement could be gotten under way.

Paris reports Germany planning two strokes, one at Calais and the other at Egypt in an effort to end the struggle. German guns have been busy on the west front but there is no other evidence of the expected offensive.

HAS PLENTY OF FOOD Berlin, Dec. 21.—"Turkey has plenty of food and other material of all kinds which she can supply Germany if she needs it," said a Turkish official today as he arrived in Berlin, talking to the Associated Press correspond-

dent. "It is only a question of transportation which is rapidly being overcome," he said.

ADOPTS CREDIT MEASURE London, Dec. 21.—The reichstag today adopted the credit loan of ten million marks asked by the government. The socialist minority of 19 members opposed it, according to a Reuter's despatch from Berlin, forwarded from Amsterdam.

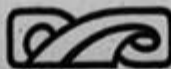
