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
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PERVERSION OF BOOK TASTES.





"It is said that the impression prefermented and spirituous liquors. rails in certain quarters that such liquors may be handled, provided they are not intoxicating; and that such impression was deepened by the ruling of this Court in a local option case recently tried in this county.

"In the disposition of the case referred to nothing was said to justify such impression. Proof that the liquor in question in that case was intoxicating was held to be necessary, and the respondent was discharged for want of such proof. That ruling, however, resulted from the fact that the information charged the liquor to be, and the trial proceeded upon the theory that it was intoxicating. It was not held in that case that the people must prove the liquor to be intoxicating where it is not claimed to

"The open and notorious violation of any law cannot but have the effect tration of justice. "By what has been said no reflection upon officers is intended. On the contrary, it appears that the failure of the officers to arrest and prosecute for past offenses has not resulted from lack of good intentions. Nor is any future failure on the part of the officers expected.

"But so that all concerned may know that the Court is determined to make use of its full powers under the constitution and statutes to see that the local option, as well as all other laws are respected and observed in this county, advantage is taken of the present occasion to announce that, should the officers be obstructed, or for any other reason fail in the performance of their duties under the law a grand jury will be called to deal with the situation.
