Washington, Jan. 29.-President Wilson returned today from New York where he fired the first gun of his premass of work which had piled up during his four days absence.

Before leaving New York the president left a message to all loyal Americans to prepare for a time when international relations will not appear so bright as they do at present, notwithstanding the fact that negotiations on international questions are now going on between the United States and four foreign governments.

# BELIEVED SUNK NEAR HULL; FIND LIFEBOAT

SMALL BOAT OF STEAMER APPAM FOUND-VESSEL IS WEEK OVERDUE FROM DAKAR

Premier Asquith Tells House of Commons British Losses Are Over Half Million

(By Associated Press.)

London, Jan. 28.-Grave fears are entertained here for the safety of the British steamer Appam, which left Dakar for Plymouth on Jan. 11 with 166 passengers and a crew of 134. A life boat with the name Appam on the stern was picked up by a fishing paid, including \$90,000 in secol-annual steamer near Hull yesterday, and it is feared that the vessel may have been torpedoed or may have struck a mine. The non appearance of any survivors at ports of the vicinity leads to the prising four quarterly payments of belief that if the vessel is sunk, the life loss was total.

Washington, Jan. 28 .- By a vote of 281 to 81 the house this afternoon passed the Shackleford bill authorizing an appropriation by the federal government of \$25,000,000 to aid the states in the building of public highways. The measure was chiefly opposed by members who believe all money available should be used for preparedness.

GOOD THINGS FOR WINTER.

For a chilly night what more grateful or appetizing odor could greet one than potato soup.

Potato Soup. - Cook three potatoes, three stalks of chopped celery and a quart of chicken stock together. Rub through a sieve when the vegetables are tender. Scald a pint of

milk with a slice of onion, a blade of mace and a bit of bay leaf; strain and add three tablespoonfuls each of butter and flour creamed together, cook five minutes. Combine mixtures, sea-

Spinach Omelet,-Make an omelet, using four eggs, four tablespoonfuls of milk, salt and pepper to taste. Have the omelet pan hot, put in a tablespoonful of butter, then turn in the egg mixture. As the egg sets lift with a knife around the edges. Fold the omelet and turn out on a bed of cooked, hot, seasoned spinach.

Mock Beef .- Cut hubbard squash in thick slices, removing the shell and the inner seeds and pith. Butter a deep stone baking dish. Arrange a layer of squash; dust with salt and layer of thinly sliced carrots, covering a thin layer of chopped parsley. Repeat with the alternate layers until the dish is full and then fill up two hours. Make a thick brown sauce cupful sugar, half cupful boiling waspoonful of Worcestershire sauce and arrange the cutlets on a platter with the brown gravy poured over it. Serve with potatoes and turning.

Tunny Fish Balls,-Pick the fish fine and add to the mashed potatoes while they are hot, taking two-thirds as much potato as fish. Add plenty of butter, salt and pepper and fry in deep fat. These cakes may be made thin and browned in a hot frying pan in a small amount of fat.



oils on the least, amount of use, and I have to clean spark plugs nearly every twenty-five to thirty miles. After running two or three miles, on stopping the car will buck and jump and then give an explosion. Can you suggest something to do? The car has but little power on a hill. The storage batteries test well.

We are inclined to believe that your trouble is caused by a carbon deposit because too much oil was used. It is customary slightly to overfeed a new car, and in a great number of instances the motor will require removal of its carbon in 300 miles. The fact that you must clean the spark plugs and the car has no power on hills is additional proof that carbon is the cause of your trouble. A heavily carbonized motor often will explode with the switch in off position.

Go to a good garage and have the carbon removed, and no doubt your roubles will cease.

Do good wire wheels ever get out of true? If so, how often do they require

Wire wheels can be thrown out of alignment in the same way as wooden wheels. Wheels, whether wood or wire, should be tested for alignment at least twice each year.

My car misfires under load, but if ! take a hill running fast it will not misfire. I have cleaned and adjusted the breaker points, also the spark plugs.

What can be the matter? This may be caused by poor carburetor adjustment for low and intermediate; also by some derangement in the igniting system whereby there is an insufficient spark sent to the plugs at low engine speeds. It is possible that you adjusted the interrupter points improperly or that you set the plug gaps too wide. Leaks about the cylinder plugs and inlet manifold may cause the trouble.

What makes it possible for one wheel to reverse while the other goes ahead. running on a wet pavement with the brakes applied?

The differential action will allow one wheel to revolve clockwise, while the other turns anti-clockwise, but with the brakes applied and holding well neither wheel should turn. In the case you mention the brakes evidently were slipping and thus permitted the wheels to turu.

Will a gasoline motor of either idea or six cylinders come to a standstill

If the compression in all of the cyl inders is good and the bearings free the pistons will not stop at dead cen ter. The compression resistance with prevent this.

What spring is best, three-quarte elliptic or the cantilever, for cars under 3 000 nounds?

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
