



Serious Defects in American Education Revealed by Foreign Trade Council

New Orleans, Jan. 28.-Serious de

fects in American education were revealed-in the results of a questionnaire submitted by the National Foreign Trade Council's Committee on Education for Foreign Trade to 500 corporations, firms and individuals engaged in foreign trade, with view to determining the efficacy of American education of the .young men for oversea commerce, according to a report today to the Third National Foreign Trade Convention by Wallace D. Simmons, President of the Simmons Hardware Company, St. Louis, Chairman of the Committee. The most pertinent conclusion of the report is as follows.

"The inquiry instituted by the Committee reveals a widespread dissatisfaction, not merely with the special training for foreign trade, but with the more fundamental teaching in our schools, both elementary and Calumet & Hecla...... 551 out more frequently than any other." The Committee quotes James J.

"The greatest difficulty this company experiences in securing competent employes is the radical deficiency in thorough education in the elementary branches. High school grad uates who come to us with a good record and recommendations are unable frequently to write a letter in make simple arithmetical computations, either quickly or accurately. From this experience two conclusions as to the efficiency of current educational methods may be drawn: First, pupils know a little of many things, but no one thing thoroughly. Second, too much thought appears to be given to the best subjects for study and not enough to the training of the mind in accuracy. It is upon the correction of these defects, especially in elementary education, that attention should be concentrated."

The report of the Committee on Education for Foreign Trade adds: "If this criticism is as fully justifi-

ed as so many seem to feel, it is obviously of the greatest importance and must be thoroughly considered in any program of education which! any education program which shall equip our coming generation to appear to advantage in competition with the representatives of other nations in which such work has been thoroughly done for many years."
