DEFEATED THOMAS ST. JACQUES AT YESTERDAY'S PRIMARY BY 41 VOTES

John Bergman is Republican Nominee For Alderman in the Sixth Ward

William H. Yockey defeated Thomas St. Jacques for the Republican nomination for city treasurer, while John G. Bergman was nominated on the Republican ticket for alderman in the sixth ward, with Alex H. Johnson second and Dr. A. S. Winn third. These were the only contests of the primary. of yesterday.

The total vote cast by Republican ballot was 529 while the Non-Partisan total was 198. There were no contests for any of the Non-Partisan nominations, hence the vote was extra

For treasurer W. H. Yockey received 285 votes while Thomas St. Jacques received 244 votes. For alderman in the sixth ward John G. Bergman received 68 votes, Alex H. Johnson, 52 votes and Dr. A. S. Winn 20.

In several instances there appeared on the ballots the names of persons written in by the voters. The act of 1915 requires that where a name does not appear on the printed ballot at any primary election it shall not ap harness. pear on the ballot at fae general election unless that person shall have re ceived five per cent of the vote cast by that party. This did not occur in any instance at yesterday's primary.

TELLS CHAIRMAN FLOOD OF MIL-ITARY COMMITTEE HE WANTS NO COMPROMISE

Indicates That Vote of Confidence is Not What He Seeks For

Washington, D. C. March 2.-Presi dent Wilson today told Chairman Flood of the house committee on military affairs, that he would consent to no compromise on the armed ship controversy and said he desired an immediate vote on a resolution warning Americans off armed belligerent ves-

Chairman Flood said on his return from White House that his committee would prepare such a resolution as the President indicated and would submit it for immediate vote

The President has indicated that he would accept no compromise proposition, such as a vote of confidence, in his foreign policy. Such an action, he maintains, might be construed in the President lacks the support of con ress and his own party in his demands for a full observance of international

The Moewe, it is said, was taken by the cruisers to the Island of Prinidad. 

## UNCLE SAM IS EYE DOCTOR TO

Public Health Service Doing Great® Work Among Purest Blooded Americans.

TRACHOMA IN THE MOUNTAINS

Curing of Sore Eyes on an Enormous Scale is Humanitarian Task Being Performed in Kentucky,

Virginia and West Virginia. Washington.-In a way-a very different way—the United States public health service is doing the very thing which Mark Twain's irresistible "Colonel Sellers" proposed to do with his "matchless, incomparable and altogether marvelous eye-water."

The colonel's plea for his eye-water, very much paraphrased, ran some-

"One million people in the United States have sore eyes, one million, sir! And now come I, with nature's most potent balsam-dew of earliest morn, plus distillations of the rarest herbs of field and forest-which, upon dropping one drop in the eye, soothes and cools, and which, upon repetition until the entire bottle is used, forever banishes pains and sches of every description. We will sell 10,000 bottles the first year at \$2 a. bottle-10,000 people cured of sore eyes, \$20,000! We will sell 20,000 bottles the second year -20,000 pairs of eyes made whole, 20,000 grateful hearts, \$40,000! The third year we will sell, etc."

The public health service is not pushing its own or anybody's eye-water. and is not advancing its own or anybody's money-making scheme. But its most picturesque work has to do with the curing of sore eyes on an enormous scale. If direct parallel lies with the visionary scheme of Colonel Sellers, it is in the number of grateful hearts which thank this federal agency for restored vision.

This humanitarian work is being done among the purest-blooded white eers of Kentucky, Virginia and West Virginia. Down in these mountains, in small, isolated towns, far from railroads, are five little government hospitals which treat victims of sore eyes on a scale as large as that of many of the numerous city hospitals devoted to this specialty.

Trachoma in the Mountains.

The chief cause of "sore eyes" in the mountains is trachoma. Possibly Mark Twain knew the prevalence of this affliction in the mountain sections of the South and Middle West and hence knew of the acute need for turns. some such wonderful concoction as Colonel Sellers' eye-water. Very likely, the great humorist drew his inspiration from this knowledge.

Strange to say, however, the widespread existence of trachoma within the borders of the United States waited many years for official "discovery." For a long time, the experts talked of trachoma as an exotic disease. On the theory that it came from abroad and the chief danger to the American public lay in the admission of infected immigrants, trachoma was made one of the quarantinable diseases.

Every applicant for entry into the United States is carefully examined for traces of trachoma and thousands of otherwise good citizen-material have been turned back to their native lands from our ports because they had

The "discovery" came a little more than three years ago, when Dr. J. A. Stuckey of Lexington, Ky., called the attention of federal authorities to the numerous cases of trachoma in the Kentucky mountains. Surgeon John McMullen, who had experience with trachoma patients at the New York and Philadelphia immigration stations, conducted an investigation. Of 4,000 mountaineers examined, it was found that 500 had trachoma. In consequence the hospitals were established; three in Kentucky, one in Virginia and one in West Virginia; at Jackson, London and Hindman, Ky., and at Coeburn, and assisted the local doctors mate-Va., and Welch, W. Va. These hospitals had more than 1,700 cases and performed 193 eye operations last Oc-

Effect in the Mountains.

Trachoma is a disease of the eyelids. Granulated or sandy lids, it is often called. It leads to serious inflammation and blindness. It is both communicable and curable.

Among the mountaineers the work of curing the actual cases is proceeding rapidly; but more important is the task of teaching the mountain populamore sanitary living arrangements. Their cabin homes are overcrowded; they use common wash basins and common towels; the mother is apt to wipe the eyes of the child with an

spron upon which she wipes her own. These people have lived much as they do now for 150 years, and, except for communicable diseases, such as trachoma, they are a healthy class. To effect change among them, in view of their isolation and decidedly settled opinions, has been a large undertak-

The public health service is working a change among them, however Frequent meetings are neld in schoolhouses and churches, at which stereopticon slides are exhibited showing the precise means by which trachoms

and other diseases, including typhold, spread. This campaign of education Las made rapid headway and, as cures multiply, the faith of the mountain public in Uncle Sam's teaching is in-

Only a few years ago the sort of vis-ltor from the United States government who was familiar in the Kentucky mountains carried a Winchester. He was looking for secret whisky stills and was venturing upon a dangerous errand among a very hostile people. The good samaritan from the public health office, upon his errand of love and charity, has now become as thoroughly an established character in this rugged region as the internal revenue agent used to be. Probably no other influence has served more effectively to bring the outside world into close and friendly relations with the mountaineers.

Sixty Miles for Treatment.

"That these people realize and appreciate what we are trying to do for them," said the medical officer in charge of the trachoma work at the headquarters of the public health service in Washington recently, "was impressed upon me by an incident which occurred when I was at the Hindman hospital not long since:

"An old man brought in his son who was badly afflicted with trachoms. It was decided that an operation was necessary, but the boy overheard us tell his father this. The lad slipped out and ran away, home. It was 20 miles across the mountains. The father and son had walked this 20 miles to the hospital.

"The father at once walked back found his son and repeated the long foot journey into Hindman the next day, where the operation was performed and the boy cured. That meant a 60-mile trip on foot-hard, rough going all the way-by the parent to force his son to take advantage of the opportunity offered by the government.

"When we see these things we know our work is well worth doing."

The appeal of such incidents to the hearts of a simple, natural and kindly people is manifest. There was the case of a mother of four children, none of whom she had ever seen. The vision of both eyes was so far impaired by trachoma that in bright sunlight she could not recognize anyone. Following brief treatment at one of the mountain hospitals she returned to her family and saw her children for the first time.

40 miles across the mountains for treatment. Though blind for years, his vision was restored and he returned home without escort.

As stated, there is no miracle cure about it; no use of marvelous eye-water, no mystery whatever. Eliminating medical terms, it is largely a business of rolling back and sandpapering the inside of the eyelids. After that comes thorough cleansing, continued regularly by the patient. The work of the government sur geons in the mountains is not limited to trachoma. Not long ago one unreceived an unexpected visitor. So, the second day following, a federal health officer accompanied the schoolteacher on the ride into Hindman. In a sense, the surgeon went armed, but not with rifle and ammunition. A packhorse bore his arms-a very ordinary looking box containing a field laboratory especially designed for emergency war against typhoid.

He had serums for those already ill rially in treating those already sick. What was more important, he had the means of locating the cause of the epidemic. This, after patient investigation, he finally discovered.

A typical mountain stream, cold and clear as crystal, runs through the center of the town. Some three miles up this stream the federal surgeon found the home of a "chronic typhoid case."

In Hindman the stream flowed near a well used by the pupils of the school. The water from the stream, bearing typhoid germs, had seeped through tion to avoid infection by adopting crevices in a limestone formation into the well.

What advantage or disadvantage is there in having sixteen cams on the cam shaft of an eight cylinder motor? And why do some use sixteen came and others eight?

There is no special disadvantage. Whether there are sixteen or eight cams in an eight cylinder V engine depends entirely upon the design of the motor. You cannot arbitrarily change from the use of eight to sixteen or vice versa. Where the cylinders are directly opposite one another and the valves are in the V, then only one cam shaft with eight cams can be used. If the cylinders are offset so that the side by side method of connecting rod attachment can be used. there must be an individual cam for each valve, or sixteen altogether. As

compared with the cam shaft with eight cams, the type with sixteen is not quite so simple, but that is not anything for the car owner to trouble about one way or the other. It is a matter of manufacture. On the other hand, the connecting rod lower end construction is slightly more complicated where the cam shaft with eight cams is used, so that one design about balances the other in advantages or disadvantages.

Is there any way of determining what gear ratio on final drive would prove most satisfactory?

The gear ratio which will prove most satisfactory depends upon what speed you wish to get out of the car with certain size wheels. Suppose you want the car to show a maximum speed of forty-five miles per hour when the motor is operating at its maximum speed and power. Then, knowing the wheel size, you can use a gear reduction which will give this result.

I have had three new cars burned up and would like to have the following question answered: Would the gears in cars burned have to be case hardened over or could they be used as they are? If they need case hardening, where could I get it done?

The gears in these cars are probably all right. As they are all inclosed. the heat would have to go through the housings before reaching them, and it is not likely that they have lost their hardness. Any mechanic who is experienced can determine their condition by filing them slightly. A soft piece of metal will reveal itself to a good file. Case hardening is done in many plants, nearly every city of any size having factories where such work is carried on. It would probably be just as cheap, however, to replace the gears as to trouble with such rehardening of damaged ones, and, besides, I there would be considerable expense attached to it. In any case it would be advisable to use the gears as they are, later replacing any of them that might prove to have been damaged.

Would an explosion whistle which screws in place of priming cup have any effect on the operation of the mo-

Such whistles usually cause the cylinder to be inoperative when the whistle is being used.

It is necessary to choke the carburetor even in warm weather in order to start my motor. The motor is in good condition and never misfires when warmed up. Can you tell me the trou-

In most motors it is not necessary to close the air valve during the warmer weather, but in some this is necessary all the time unless the motor is cranked for about thirty seconds. It may be that your carburetor is so adjusted that an unusually lean mixture is fed at low engine speeds, and for this reason we suggest that you open the needle valve a little more or decrease the

> I have a four cylinder motor, the ignition for which is furnished by a low tension magneto. The compression in all four cylinders seems to be good, but Leave orders at 324 So. by opening the pet cooks one at a time the explosion in two of the cylinders is weaker than in the other two. Can you tell me what I can do to correct this?

Since the compression in each cylinder is good, there remains but the igni-The mixture, if right for two cylinders, ought to be right for the others, provided the manifold gaskets are intact and do not leak air. 'The electrodes are probably slightly disarranged or the igniter springs weak. Would advise your cleaning all the electrodes, replacing worn parts where necessary, also retiming in order to obtain synchronous ignition of the charges. The springs which separate the electrodes at the breakaway should be sufficiently strong to cause an abrupt break. The duration of contact of the electrodes should be long enough to permit the current to rise to its maximum and produce a heavy spark at the break.


Can you tell me the cause of a sharp metallic clank being emitted from the top of the steering column on my car when striking a sharp bump?

There is probably end play in your steering column, and this can be taken up by removing the necessary number of shims at the base of the steering gear case. The trouble possibly might he the worm and worm wheel. If there is too much play between them this can be remedied by taking up the slack through the turning of the eccentric bushing with which the worm wheel support is fitted.

What is the reason that the generator does not register on my meter until I reach about fifteen miles per hour, and I am unable to make it run fast enough to make it register fourteen, which should be at the rate of twenty miles per hour. We have changed genera tors, but it has had no effect. Could this be in the wiring of the generator?



## NO CHANCE TO SALVE THE RAIDER EMDEN

Stern is Completely Hidden and Greater Part of Boat Was Pounded to Bits

Melbourne, Australia, March 2.-It is announced that nothing more can be done towards salving either the remains of the German sea-raider Emden or any trophies from her except such as may be cast ashore. About a year ago visits paid to North Keeling Island resulted in some of the guns and other gear of the German cruiser being removed, part of which were handed over to the Commonwealth Government. At the end of October. 1915, it was decided to send the Gunboat Protector to Cocos to report as to the possibility of salving the ship, and to remove any gear stin on board that might be of interest or value. It was found that the stern half of the Emden had completely disappeared, and a very heavy surf was still breaking over what remained. The Protector waited a week, in the hopes of getting a chance to board the Emden; but this was never for an instant pos-

In general, they fear the Bulgars more than they do the Germans. "The Germans are calculating; the Bulgars are wild beasts," they say.

#### Under Enemies' Feet.

All along that calvary between Belgrade and Monastir are hidden the earthly possessions of these peopleboxes, salted meat, barrels of sirup, coal and flour. They have chosen the beaten track on purpose, because the more frequented a road is the less likely are the invaders to search the earth under it, and such hiding places are easiest found-pext With their peasants' memories they will remember the exact spot They have not hidden a single treasure under their homes or churches. Some have chosen the middle of the desolate market place, between two trees or the very edge of the muddy, unpaved street or near a horse pond, because all who enter that village or town will use that pond, and not one man will think to dig the trodden soil around it for hidden treasure, be it francs or flour. More often they chose open country, on their own little farms, in some ditch marked by a big stone or on which the shadow falls first at sun-

"We Shall Find Them Again." "Now the snow has come and covered it all up. But in April the snow will melt, and we shall find our things again," they say, with the quiet cheer fulness of the Slav.

Many families have left some member behind to let the invaders sweep over them like waves of a tempestuous sea, leaving them where they found them, and most of those who Herman Roberge left this afternoon men will be wanted to rejoin that army that is gathering again in Alhidden treasure and may be trusted not to touch it till the family comes back. 
