"On February 21, before my company had taken part in any engagement about Verdun its compliment was 200 men and 24 officers. All met death within the next week but one officer and one man.'

Carl A. Johnson of this city has just been granted a patent on an improvement for a base burning coal stove that experts say will revolutionize the construction of coal stoves

The device has occupied Mr. Johnson's attention for the past four years and he has brought it to a point of perfection where its commercial success is practically assured. Simple in design and construction it will not be difficult to manufacture and aithough Mr. Johnson has not fully developed his plans for the manufacture of the implement in quantities, it is highly probably that th emanufacturing will be done in this city.

The device can be installed in a stove in 10 minutes by any one will give 50 per cent more heat from the same amount of fuel, keeping a steady hot clean fire with the drafts closed. The ash pit and base of the stove are kept continually hot thereby superheating the air in the ash pit to such a high degree that when this air comes in contact with the gasses they are ignited and consumed; throwing off extra heat which without this deice would pass out through the chimney and be wasted. It is a known fact that with the ordinary stoves and heat ing plants nearly 50 per cent of the fuel is wasted in unburnt coal and

Any one using a coal stove knows how long it takes to get a coal fire started in the morning. With this device installed the fire will start like wood fire throwing out heat in a few minutes.





FORCED FROM PETS Aged Woman Gives Up Twenty

Years' Struggle.

Since Passing Scriptural Age Limit, Her Life Has Borne Out Biblical Promise of Labor and Sorrow.

St. Paul.-After a twenty years' struggle to remain independent, Mrs. Delia Maxwell, eighty-eight years old, was taken to the City hospital to live out the remainder of her life. Officials of the Wilder charities found her ill in a desolate basement at State and Eaton streets and took her away in

Three Angora cats, which, with their progenitors, have been Mrs. Maxwell's lifelong companions, were left with neighbors, and she was told that she might have them near her in her new

For four years charity workers have tried to get Mrs. Maxwell to go to some institution where she might live comfortably, but she persistently refused to listen to such proposals for hold the spotlight for the succeeding lear she would be separated from her pets.

At intervals she would be lost sight of, to be discovered later in some secluded basement or tenement, hiding herself and her feline companions. With each rediscovery of the aged woman a new effort would be made to induce her to enter a charitable home. When she refused, fuel and food would be brought. But, once discovered, her place of abode was soon changed.

Since passing the three-score-and-ten scriptural age limit, Mrs. Maxwell's life had borne out the biblical promise of being filled with labor and sorrow. About twenty years ago her husband, who was a bookkeeper in one of the city offices, died. Their life was comfortable, but the husband's salary had given little opportunity to save and he left but a small estate.

Mrs. Maxwell invested her little in- atlon. heritance in a horse and tiny farm in one of the suburbs. She planned to live by marketing and keeping blooded cats and chickens. But shortly after this one of her legs was broken. It was badly set and left her a permanent cripple. She stayed on the farm fifteen years, gradually getting into debt. Then her horse died. She had become so feeble she had to give up her farm. She sold it for little more than enough to pay her debts and came to town, planning to earn as much as possible with her chickens and cats. The Loving Kindness branch of the Sunshine society discovered her soon after she returned to town. She was in need. The branch provided for her since that time, when she could be found. The Wilder and Associated charities helped. The board of control saw that she was supplied with coal.

BIRD ROOSTS.

Safety First as It Is Practiced by the Feathered Tribes.

One of the best ways to prepare for a long journey is to make a short one. So we find that many birds, before they embark on their great air voyage which is to take them from their summer to their winter home, first make daily trips between their sleeping quar ters and their feeding grounds. This is the habit of our robin. Rob-

ins raise two and sometimes three familles in one season. When the first family leaves the nest early in June it is taken by the father robin to some dense, leafy growth of young trees to pass the night. To this place they return every night. Many other robins, sometimes thousands of them, come to the same woods. Such resorts are known as robin roosts. In flying to and from them the young birds learn how to find their way.

Meanwhile mother robin is patiently sitting on her blue eggs, from which in about two weeks" time another little family will appear. In two weeks more they also will be large enough to leave the nest and can join their brothers and sisters in the roost.

Grackles, or crow blackbirds, have the same habit. But since they have only one family or brood both the parent birds go to the roost with their


