FEW COBBS BORN TO BLUSH UNSEEN

For Example, Watson Outbatted Kauff by Wide Margin.

SHORTEN IS ALSO SLIGHTED

Providence Center Fielder Some Pit Belter—Lelivelt Set the Pace Both With the Stick and in Field in American Association.

Ty Cobb won the battling championship of the American league, and Larry Doyle led the sluggers of the National league. They were out in front by a fair margin, with no one to dispute their claim, but a glance through the official baseball record will show that most leagues had their nominal leaders—men who played in a few games and smashed out a sufficient number of hits to boost their average above that of those who fought through the long campaign for the pennant. In several instances these nominal leaders played in fifty games or more, acting as pinch hitters, and their claim for preference might be honored by many.

There was that modest, sensitive and blushing Benny Kauff. He clubbed the ball for an average of .344, but Watson, who started with the Tip Tops and finished the season with the Buffalo Blues, was ahead of him with an average of .396 compiled in twenty-nine games, in which he faced the pitcher forty-eight times and poled out nineteen hits. This was pretty heroic action by Watson, and the pity is that he did not get into the game more often. He might perchance have established a valid claim to supremacy.

Shorten, the center fielder of the Providence team, is entitled to consideration in the International league. He compiled the perfectly good average of .322, yet ranked only sixth. Chester Hoff, the left handed pitcher, went on a wild jamboree in his twenty-nine games, facing the pitcher sixty-nine times and getting himself twenty-eight hits. Charley Mullin, with Richmond part of the season, hit .371 in thirty-nine games, while Ed Barney, once with the Yankees and later with the Pirates, connected at a .335 clip in sixty-two games. Both of Toronto were right up there with a mark of .332 in ninety-seven games, and his claim is perhaps as valid as Shorten's, for a man could not carry a spurt through so many games for such an average.

Lelivelt is Some Batter. Jack Lelivelt, once with the Cleveland Naps, later with the New York Yankees and now with the Kansas City team of the American association, might have had his fallings, but he always could bat. He was a consistent .300 stickler in the majors, and he has shown no inclination to rest on his laurels in the circuits of minor classification. Playing through 152 games last year, Jack rolled up an average of .346 and was the actual leader, although Mayer, a team mate, clubbed .361 in seventeen games. Lelivelt played first base last year, and so cleverly that he led the league in fielding as well as hitting.

Jimmy Johnston, the outfielder of the Oakland team, who will be with the Superbas next summer, has about as strong a claim to supremacy in his league as any other man. Jimmy played in 206 games, was at bat 788 times and made 256 hits for the grand average of .348. He is placed behind Harry Wolter, once with the Yankees, who topped him by eleven points, but who played in fifty-six fewer games. Wolverton, Hellman and Brief, none of whom played in 100 games, also were ranked in front of the Superba to be, but only Wolter has any more valid claim to the championship than he.

The South Atlantic, the Virginia and the Canadian leagues boast of men who have clear title to the leadership. Chancey of Macon, in the South Atlantic league, stood out with a mark of .350; Thrasher, of the Norfolk team of the Virginia league, compiled an average of .348, while Burrill, of the Brantford team of the Canadian circuit, surveyed the world from the pinnacle of a .344 average.

Pirates May Grab Pirates. Sheldon Lejeune, with Sioux City, who was up with the Superbas several seasons ago and who may wear the livery of the Pirates next summer, certainly laid into the delivery of the pitchers of the Western league. Lejeune clouted away at the rate of .355, but was eighty points behind one Davis, a team mate, who took part in fewer than twenty games. Miller, of the Mobile club of the Southern association, had no trouble in arguing his case as champion batsman, but for all his .326 average he came in trailing Moleworth of Birmingham and McDowell, a team mate, neither of whom took part in thirty games.

The list might be extended until it would include all of the leagues operating under the national agreement, but a sufficient number of cases have been cited to show that comparatively few men who were acknowledged as leaders of their leagues actually finished at the top of the ladder.

Lear Beans Dodger, Declines Cigars. King Lear, the college twirler with the Cincinnati Reds, paid a visit to the Cincinnati in Muncie, Ind., where they were offering three cigars to any one hitting a negro with his head through a hole in the canvas. Lear beaned the black three times and knocked him out. The King, however, refused to smoke the cigars.

CATCH IS ACCIDENTAL, BUT KANE GETS CREDIT.

Del Howard says the hardest argument he ever had in his life was one day when he was a member of the Chicago Cubs and Johnny Kane was on the same team.

Here is how it happened: Evers did not want to play that day so Kane started at second. Tinker was put out of the game, and Kane was shoved over to short, and Evers had to go in at second base.

Kane was galloping all over the infield. He started toward second base to drive back the runner, who had a big lead. Reulbach did not notice that Kane had left his position and sent a fast one over the plate. Jack Miller caught it on the nose.

It whistled by Reulbach's ear, and Kane, who was standing on second base, simply stuck out his glove and robbed Miller of a hit.

It was Taft day at Chicago, and after the game Howard had an argument with hundreds of fans when he told them that Kane had figured in the play.

DENVER GOLFER USES DOG TO RESCUE BALLS

Apropos of the suggestion that dogs of the larger breeds might be used as caddies if supplied with a suitable harness with which to carry the clubs, a golfer of the Denver Country club told the boys of this experience the other day.

In his opinion the idea is impossible of execution, but he thinks that dogs can be used to great advantage in retrieving balls while the golfer stands in the same place and tries repeated practice shots.

He had an Irish terrier which he trained to retrieve golf balls and succeeded in bringing it to the point where he was able to play 120 shots an hour, all of which the dog would retrieve without a single lost ball.

GRAND NATIONAL MARCH 24.

Classic English Will Be Staged Over Gatwick Course This Year.

Followers of horse racing "over the sticks" in England have received further encouragement by the National Hunt stewards announcing the dates and places of the steeplechasing meetings for March, which include ten days' racing, as follows: Lingfield Park, March 3 and 4; Windsor, March 10 and 11; Colwall Park, March 14 and 15; Gatwick, March 24 and 25, and Hawthorn Hill, March 31 and April 1.

Public interest will be mainly centered on the Gatwick meeting, for on March 24 the blue ribbon of steeplechasing, the Grand National, will be decided. It will be run off over the same distance as the famous race at Aintree. The handicap will be made as usual by Mr. Topham, who has had no equal in putting horses together at Aintree for a number of years.

FIRST SACKER IS NEEDED.

Stallings Scans Field For Successor to Butch Schmidt.

Butch Schmidt has retired from baseball and George Stallings is hot on the trail of any first basemen who think they can negotiate the initial bag as Red did. He was a great asset of the Braves. He could bang the ball at opportune moments and he feided his position as well as any man in the big leagues.

Schmidt gives as a reason for quitting the need of paying attention to a meat market that he has opened in Boston. As a matter of fact, he is retiring because baby Schmidt yelled for "Dadda" all during the time that the ball playing father was on the road with the Braves.

GREAT PLAYERS FAIL AS PILOT

With Few Exceptions Star Performers Do Not Succeed as Managers.

Great ball players do not make great managers—not always. Occasionally a star of the volunteer ranks becomes a successful leader. McGraw, Jennings and Fielder Jones were wonderful ball players, and as managers they have won pennants.

But then again we have Napoleon Lajoie, Bob Wallace, Johnny Evers, Charley Nichols, Johnny Kling, Billy Dahlen, Fred Tenny and others who failed to shine as major league managers.

Hungarian Faces.

BAN ON PASSENGERS ON LAKE FREIGHTERS

Federal Law Will Put End to Courts-ies Enjoyed by Many in Recent Years

The federal government has put a ban on the practice of carrying passengers on lake steamers. During the height of the summer season few of the ore carriers that have quarters for passengers have left this port without their quarters fully occupied. The passengers have usually been officials and members of the families of officials, but the courtesies of the steamers have also been enjoyed from time to time by many other persons. A Cleveland dispatch says: "Cleveland marine interests see an end of the practice of carrying passengers on lake freighters in the recent order of the department of commerce requiring boats carrying passengers to be specially constructed. The order was given according to the provisions of the seaman's act. "A movement has been started nearly every spring to abolish the practice, but heretofore has failed to accomplish anything. This year, the vesselmen declare, they mean business and will enforce the provisions of the order to the letter. In previous years the laws have been so framed as to be evaded easily. The seaman's act and the order of the department of commerce are explicit. "They provide that any vessel carrying passengers for hire or otherwise, must have a certain number of water-tight bulkheads and that the vessel's construction in other respects must follow the rules laid down for regular passenger boats. It is understood that the rule will be strictly enforced by the local inspectors of steam vessels. "The rule also is interpreted to prohibit masters from permitting their wives to accompany them aboard ship. Protests against such an interpretation of the rule are expected to come from the shipmasters' association and its auxiliary. The vessel owners say they will leave it for the captains to decide whether they will carry their wives."

Many of the ore carriers are admirably equipped for carrying a limited number of passengers. The cabins are beautifully appointed and furnished, and the fare at the captain's table compares favorably with that on the passenger liners in the lake trade. The aggregate expense of this service has been large enough so that dispensing with it has been a subject of frequent discussion of late years. It is understood that there is no particular fault found by the fleet managers because the intervention of the government compels them to put a ban on all passenger traffic.

LESS CRIME IN NEW YORK; ANTI-GUN LAW CREDITED

Police Commissioner of New York Points to Better Record.

The effect of the Sullivan law and similar restrictive measures is noticeable in New York Police Commissioner Woods' report for 1915. A marked decrease in the number of felonies is shown. The Sullivan law prohibits having a pistol in one's possession, even in the home, without a permit. There were 246 murders in the city in 1915 as compared with 257 in 1914 and 289 in 1913. For 1915 arrests were made in 156 cases; 169 in 1914 and 167 in 1913. For all felonies the arrests numbered 23,171 as compared with 23,628 for the previous year. Commissioner Woods lays stress upon the number of convictions obtained during the year, the highest record ever obtained by the department, he reports. The convictions were placed at 161,121, or 73.94 per cent of the cases disposed of. In 1914 the percentage was 74.56, in 1913 73.67 and in 1912 71.52. Of the murders committed 123 were with firearms. The effect of the Sullivan law is particularly noticeable in this respect. In 1914 the murders by shooting numbered 154, and 158 for the previous year. Burglaries decreased progressively throughout the year. Grand larcenies decreased throughout the first three-quarters, but increased during the last quarter.

ABSORBS GERMAN GASES.

Sodium Thiosulphate Used by Allies to Circumvent Foes.
The armies of the allies are using sponges or gauze soaked with some solution to absorb the chlorine and bromine gases employed by the Germans in trench warfare. Ordinary "hypo," or sodium phosphate, is widely used for this purpose, and it gives generally good results except that the reaction between the hypo and chlorine or bromine liberates hydrochloric and sulphuric acid. These acids, the Scientific American says, can be successfully neutralized by adding sodium carbonate to the hypo solution, making the mixture as follows: Crystallized sodium carbonate (decahydrate), sixty parts; crystallized hypo (pentahydrate), fifty-two parts and water 100 parts. Drying of the solution can be prevented by the addition of glycerol.
