set for August 2 and 3.

Funds for carrying on the expense of the organization will be provided by dues, which were fixed at \$20 a year for cities, and \$10 a year for villages.

Discussion on Votes

The question of the vote to be allowed each municipality in voting at conventions caused some discussion, but was finally settled by deciding that each municipality will get one vote on electing officers or deciding places of meeting, but on other questions every delegate will get a vote.

A resolution was passed at the close of the meeting expressing the thanks of the delegates to the Escanaba men who provided for their entertainment, after which the attendees adjourned to the Delta Hotel, where a banquet was served.

In opening the official session of the convention at 4:00 o'clock yesterday afternoon, Mayor Begole of Marquette spoke as follows:

Mayor Begole's Address

"The meeting that we are holding in Escanaba today, in response to the invitation of Mayor Handy of Sault Ste. Marie, is for the purpose of organizing an Upper Peninsula Municipal League. The effort that he is making to bring the cities of Cloverland closer together is the natural result of our geographical location and our environments. I want to say that it is the earnest desire of each and

every one of us to learn something from his neighbors. Something that we may take home with us and apply to the needs of our own city.

"On account of our geographical location and the great distances between here and the cities of the lower peninsula, many of us are unable to attend the meetings of the Michigan Municipal League, which are always held in the lower part of the state. Again, we differ from our southern brothers in the matter on environment. Our problems here are not the same.

Conditions Different Here

"Many of us come from mining districts where conditions are so different from those in lower Michigan that our needs are not well understood by the men of Battle Creek, Ann Arbor and Grand Rapids.

"I would be less than candid did I not confess to the sincere conviction that we have in Cloverland the choicest portion of the best state in the Union, inhabited by the best people, living under the best government on earth. I shall value the opportunity and utilize the privilege of emphasizing and maintaining in every possible way and upon every appropriate occasion these views. My sentiments toward Cloverland are those of intense pride in its present and infinite hope for its future.

Welcome Suggestions

"There is no mayor on the Upper Peninsula of Michigan who properly appreciates the office which he holds and his duties to the people whom he represents, but welcomes advice and invites suggestions. There is no ob-

jection to criticism if it be honest, honorable and just. No man has any right to accept an office under a municipal government or in fact any government unless he be able and willing to stand up under criticism and shoulder responsibility. I believe the people of our urban communities of Cloverland are doing more thinking for themselves than they have ever done before, and I hope that they will never hesitate to express their views and offer advice to their city officials.

"The benefits that will insure to each of us by meeting together once a year and exchanging our ideas on city management will be manifestly large. Ishpening will explain its methods of street building, Iron Mountain will tell us about its garbage incinerator, Menominee will show us how it acquired its city water works, Negaunee and Escanaba will demonstrate the advantage of a full time health officer, and Marquette, of course will expatiate on commission government. Like a small boy with a new whistle, we show it and blow it on all occasions.

"I want to express my appreciation of the public spiritedness of Mayor Handy, who has arranged this meeting and the hospitality of Mayor MacKillican in inviting us to meet in his city for the purpose of organizing. I wish to assure all present of my hearty co-operation in making the Upper Peninsula Municipal League a success."

Mayor Handy Speaks

S. H. Handy, the originator of the idea of the Soo, was honored by his colleagues by being named as president of the organization. With a most fitting address he opened the business session. In part Mayor Handy who has conceived the idea to be one for the ultimate good for the peninsula at large, said: "If this organization is perfected we must work—we can not spend about an hour, probably once a year reading a few papers and the remainder of the time in automobiles riding about the city or in love feast banquets. Many, many times in my seven years of official life in Sault Ste. Marie have I longed for a consultation with an official from another city who had perhaps undergone a similar experience. How very great it would be for us all to meet once a year and exchange ideas for the betterment and the welfare of our own Cloverland."

WELL WATER BEST FOR MENOMINEE--M'DONALD

R. E. McDonald, who presented the water plant cost estimates to the meeting here on Monday night, spoke to the Menominee water board on Tuesday night in regard to well water versus filtered bay water. Of his talk the Menominee Herald-Leader says: "R. E. McDonald, member of the engineering firm of Burns and McDonald of Kansas City told the members of the water board yesterday that the city of Menominee would make no mistake by installing a well water supply system for the city.

"The engineer appeared before the board on his way from Escanaba where his firm has drawn plans for a municipal water plant following the adoption by the water company there of an arbitrary attitude in regard to the sale of the plant to the city.

Takes No Action.

"The water board at yesterday's meeting, which was informal, took no action on the question of well water or a filtered supply, and no decision on this will be reached by the board until a thorough investigation it was indicated. The board members invited Mr. McDonald to present his figure for drawing up plans and supervision of a filtration plant, should the board decide to take the filtration plant rather than go into the ground for Menominee's water supply.

PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY ELECTION

To the Qualified Electors of the City of Escanaba, State of Michigan: Notice is hereby given that the April Presidential Primary Election will be held on Monday, April 3, A. D. 1916, at the place of holding the Annual City Election in the several Wards of the said City, due legal notice of which place has been given.

At which election the qualified voters of the several political parties shall have the opportunity of expressing their preference as to nominees of their respective parties for the office of President of the United States, in accordance with Act 9, Public Acts of the First Extra Session of 1912, as amended by Act 219, Public Acts of 1916. Some of the provisions of said Act are briefly as follows:

The names of any candidate for the office of president will be printed on the official primary ballot, upon petition of their political supporters in Michigan, which petition must be signed by not less than 100 of the qualified voters of such political party, said petition to be filed on or before the first day of March, 1916; the names to be alternated on the ballot in accordance with the provisions of the State Primary Election Laws, the ballot to be in the following form:

Official Primary Election Ballot.

..... Party April 3, 1916.

To vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, mark an (X) in the square in front of the name of the person whom you wish to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, write his name on the blank space provided for. Vote only for one person.

Separate ballots for each political party are to be provided. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes in the State at said election, shall be declared to be the candidate and the choice of such political party for this State.

National Committeemen Primary.

Notice is further hereby given, that at the time and place of holding the April Presidential Primary Election, as herein above designated, a separate and distinct Primary Election will be held for the nomination of the member of the National Committee of the various political parties of this State, in accordance with Act 392, Public Act of 1913.

The name of any candidate for the office of national committeeman shall be printed on the official primary ballot solely upon the petition of their political supporters in Michigan, which petition shall be signed by not less than one hundred of the qualified voters of such political party, and said petition shall be filed with the Secretary of State on or before twelve o'clock noon, March first, nineteen hundred sixteen, the names to be alternated on the ballot in accordance with the provisions of the State Primary Law.

On the first Monday in April, 1916, there shall be held a Primary Nominating Election in every voting precinct of this State, at which the qualified voters including those

who shall be qualified on the first day of April, A. D. 1916, of the several political parties shall have the opportunity on separate ballots provided for that purpose to express their preference for the members of the National Committee of their respective party.

The official ballot shall be as follows:

To vote for one (1) person whose name appears on the ballot mark an (X) in the square in front of one of the names of the persons for whom you wish to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, write his name in the blank space provided for. Vote only for one (1) person.

The candidate receiving the highest number of votes in the State at said election shall be declared to be the candidate and the choice of such political party for the office of National committeeman.

Concerning Registration.

The Board of Primary Election inspectors, will register the name of any person who shall on that day appear and make oath or affirmation to the effect he is a qualified elector in such ward or election district, or when they personally know him to be such. Any person registered on primary day as above prescribed, shall be entitled to vote at the succeeding election without other registration.

Any qualified elector may be registered and be eligible to vote at any primary election if he shall appear in person before the City Clerk and take the oath required as to qualifications for registration, and request that his name be registered. Blanks for this form of registration can be obtained at the City Clerk's office.

No enrollment is required under the present Primary Law, but each elector must be duly registered and a qualified voter.

Also any qualified elector whose name is not on the registration book in the precinct, can have his name registered on the regular registration day for the annual spring election.

the constitution was given him. He said, however, that in the copy of the constitution which he himself owned, the parts referring to water rights were separate, and said he would find the clause when he went home and send it to Mr. Ryall.

More fireworks occurred when Mayor MacKillean opened fire on Alderman Smith, who was in the audience, concerning the latter's criticism of the administration. The mayor charged that Mr. Smith in an article in the Medborgaren had revealed the doings of a closed meeting. Mr. Smith replied that the article in question was on the press at 1:00 o'clock, while the meeting was not held till 8:00 o'clock that night.

Two trucks left Ascencion for Casas Grandes on Monday have not been seen since, say the reports, and the two drivers and four guards are missing.

Further information indicates that Herra with his men is between the San Pedro river and the foothill of the Sierra Madras mountains in Chihuahua.

Columbus, March 23.—No word of Lieutenant Gorrell, the missing aviator, is contained in the dispatches received here today.

New York, March 23.—In a telegram to President Wilson today the Aero Club of America offered the services of two high power aeroplanes for service in Mexico. The club says that the machines excel in every way the present army equipment. The club says it has a list of 19 trained aviators who are willing to volunteer for service in Mexico.

Arms Are Smuggled
New York, March 23.—The schooner La Providencia, which went ashore on the Mexican coast last week, was engaged in smuggling arms and ammunition for Villa and other factions fighting Carranza, according to the de facto consul. The owner and other persons found on board were arrested by the constitutionalist authorities.

RUSS HELD IN DRIVE IN EAST, SAYS BERLIN

New Offensive Fails to Produce Gain—Two Vessels Are Reported Sunk

Berlin, Mar. 23.—The Russians, in spite of their great offensive on the eastern front have made no advance, says today's report from German army headquarters.

Two Ships Sunk
London, March 23.—The Norwegian bark Lindfield, 2300 tons, has been sunk. Thirty members of her crew were rescued.

London, March 23.—Lloyd's reports that the French bark Bougainville, of 2200 tons, has been sunk. Twenty-three members of the crew were picked up.

Steamers Declared Prizes
London, March 23.—The Hamburg-American line steamers Prinz Adalbert and Kron Prinzessin Cecilie, which were seized in Falmouth at the outbreak of the war, were condemned by a prize court today as prizes of war.

Swedish Socialists Jailed
Stockholm, Mar. 23.—Three Socialist editors were arrested here today charged with high treason for passing a resolution at a conference of Swedish Socialist organizations that a general strike and revolt should be started in case Sweden enters the war. The arrests followed demands made by Royalist newspapers that the leaders of the Socialist organization be punished for the resolution.
