Two more fire disasters occured are reported today from the South and the Southwest, with enormous property damage. Augusta, Ga., was swept by a fire which caused a loss of \$5,000,000, while Nashville, Tenn., was damaged to the extent of \$1,500,-000. One death is reported from

Augusta, March 23.-One of the most serious of the series of fires which have caused millions of dollars worth of damage in the South and Southwest swept through ten business blocks of Augusta and twenty adjacent residences blocks early today, and before the flames had been brought under control did damage estimated at \$5,000,000. No lives are reported lost

East Nashville in Ruins

WE CANNOT AFFORD IT

From the preponderance of evidence that has been submitted to The Daily Mirror, this city cannot afford local option at the present time.

While the loss of licenses would increase the taxes to every one to a considerable extent, it is not that reason alone that would make local option bad at this time.

Aside from being unable to pay the increased taxes brought about by the loss of liquor license, there would be many people who would not be able to pay taxes at all.

Local option would not mean the mere fact of closing the saloons. It would bring hardship to a number of people who are good citizens and who have paid taxes for years.

Everyone is willing to admit that local option does not stop drinking. It only closes the saloons. Liquor is shipped from this county to dry counties and would be shipping to this county from other counties if local option carries.

Local optionists are sincere in the campaign they are making to take the liquor away from those to whom it is a curse, but The Mirror does not feel like making a large number of good citizens suffer to protect a few booze fighters, who would probably get their regular "souse," anyhow.

There is a matter of justice entering into the controversy and that is this: Owners of saloons' in general and breweries in particular engaged in the business in good faith, as being recognized by the United States government. State wide prohibition would give them several months to adjust themselves, but local option closes them up in a few days!

There would be no chance to dispose of their stocks and the owners of the buildings occupied by saloons would have no chance to plan for new tenants.

if local option would stop the use of all intoxicating beverages we would be for it, but it does not at least it HAS NOT in any locality up to the present time.

State wide prohibition has been successful to a certain extent in some sections and a glaring failure in others, but in all cases it is better than local option.

if local option would stop the liquor traffic and not work great hardship to a large number of property owners in this city there would be something to it, always providing that the men engaged in the business were given time enough to adjust themselves, but as the time is not given them and as we would still have liquor shipped in. The Mirror cannot endorse the policy of local option.

Judge Wadhams of New York General Sessions Finds Delinquents' Eyes at Fault.

"Bad eyes make bad men," said Judge Wadhams in an address to the Society of Medical Jurisprudence last "The man who cannot see straight cannot think straight, and cannot act correctly. When the nervous functions become deranged the morals also are affected.


