MANY FED. STARS ON WAITING LIST

Good Players Are Left Idle by Settlement of Baseball War.

MINORS WILL GET SOME.

Most of Them Could Be Used to Strengthen Big League Teams—All Are Practically Free Agents—Herzog Landed Good Man in Loudon.

Scores of ball players, and some of them mighty good ones, agree with Sherman that war is not a pleasant thing. Despite the fact the war is over so far as baseball is concerned, there are scores of athletes, old and young, who have been left on the battlefield to starve. They had a gay and giddy time for two years, but few of them got away with any cash. They lived up to their earnings, and now they are broke. Many of them who jumped from organized baseball to the Federal league are through. Some of them are going back to the minors despite the fact they are just as good and in some instances a lot better than many who have remained in the big show.

Many on List of Unemployed. Joe Tinker, manager of the new Cubs, is worrying a lot over the predicament some of the players are in at present. Joe has personally placed most all of his surplus stock of Fed players and has helped some of the other teams to dispose of men, but there are scores of them still on the list of unemployed who will not find places, and the picking will be tough the coming season.

Manager Tinker realizes that it was his move when he jumped to the Federal league that made that organization. His leap acted like a bomb in the ranks of organized baseball. Players who had held back soon realized that if Tinker could take a chance they surely could, and as a result there were few ball players who were not willing to take the step if the money was slipped into their palms. Even the great Walter Johnson took the leap when Tinker went to Coffeyville, Kan., and handed him a big check. The speed marvel reconsidered his action a few months later when Manager Griffith of Washington shed real tears in the presence of Walter in his plea to return home. These tears washed away the glorious future Tinker had pictured for the Idaho wonder, and he signed again with Washington, and it is known that he did not get anywhere near the \$17,500 Tinker offered him at the suggestion of President Weechman.

Cobb on Verge of Leap. Ty Cobb will probably want to deny it, but President Weechman is said to have had him on the verge of taking the big leap at one time. Ty got to the point where he scratched his head and said the offer was almost too good to turn down, but he would not desert the ranks of the Detroit Tigers. There were a lot of stars like Speaker, Crawford and Jackson who were nibbling at the bait, but failed to get hooked.

Many fans are now wondering what is to come of such men as Otto Knabe, manager of Baltimore Feds; George Stovall, manager of Kansas City Feds; Rebel Oakes, manager of Pittsburgh Feds; Bill McKechnie, manager of Newark Feds; Harry Lord, manager of Buffalo team. Most of these managers have contracts running another year, and they will no doubt get their money. They may find berths somewhere else, but the outlook is as blue as indigo. Then look over the volunteers in the ranks. There are scores of good ball players, but the big clubs will not take them. One of the main reasons is the fact that their contracts call for too much money. The big managers will not pay it. Manager Tinker is one who wonders why some of the weak teams in the National and American leagues do not grab some of the Fed stars.

Would Strengthen Many Clubs. "I can see a score of good players unsigned and practically free agents—that is, some of them, who would strengthen more than half a dozen clubs," said Manager Tinker. "I cannot see why Al Wickland was allowed to slip back to the minors. He has gone to Indianapolis. There are few better fielders in the big leagues today than Wickland, and he will never stay down. There is nothing Al lacks. I had him once and know his ability. I let him go because Pittsburgh wanted him, paid a good price for him and I had Flack and Zwilling, both left handed hitters. I wanted a right hander and kept Mann.

"Everybody seemed to overlook Bill Loudon until Manager Herzog got a tip. Loudon led the second and third basemen in the Federal league last year and also played a good game at short. He was shifted around a lot. He is a corking second sacker and will play third about as well. He will be of great help to the Reds.

"Somebody overlooked a chance to get a good first sacker in Konetchy until Stallings got the hunch. I wish Kony had gone to the American league, as he is liable to break up a game at any time."
