MEXICANS FIRE ON TROOPS AT PARRAL

(By Associated Press)

San Antonio, Texas, April 13.-Until General Funston receives orders from Washington, the search for Villa will be carried on vigorously. The anxiety manifest at headquarters for two days because of the movements of de facto troops in northern Mexico was more evident today.

Information at hand indicates that in the event of open hostilities between de facto forces and those of General Pershing, the troops from Sonora were in such a position as to menace the American line of communication.

Washington, April 15. - General Carranza, in a note which arrived at his embassy here early today, for presentation to Secretary Lansing, asks for the withdrawal of American troops from aiexico. The Carranza ambassador expects to present the note at the state department some time today. It raises a new issue in a situation already much complicated, the outcome of which officials are reticent to predict until they have gone over the communication carefully and considered what reply the United States will make.

in onicial quarters it was stated that the American troops will not be withdrawn at this time, at least, and wh question is being discussed with Carranza the pursuit or Villa bandits will be rushed with vigor.

Secretary Baker, of the war department, said that he was anable to comment on the Carranza note because it raised a question of administration policies entirely under the jurisdiction of the president and the state department.

Says Object Accomplished.

Although Carranza raised several side issues, administration officials after their first view of the communication regarded the principal contention as being that the object of the punitive expedition had been accomplished so far as it can be, and that the Villa bands have been dispersed,

Some officials confessed that the note occasioned them no surprise. 


