Certain inks it is impossible to produce, at any price.

Not a department of any printing plant in Escanaba has escaped increased prices in equipment and materials. For instance: Rags used for washing up presses increased 40 per cent; rollers advanced 50 per cent; stitching wire almost unobtainable.

Such startling revelations of rising costs in the operation of printing plants everywhere lead the thoughtful buyer to consider conditions as they exist.

Present: Mayor MacKillican, Ald. Wickert, Tolan, Noreus, Sheahan, Swan, Hodson, Pryal, Follo, Wood, Johnson and Smith—11.

Absent: Ald. Cuthbert, Stratton and Smith—3.

Ald. Swan presented the following resignation:

Escanaba, Mich., April 6, 1916. To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council of the City of Escanaba.

Gentlemen: I beg leave to herewith submit my resignation as Alderman from the Fourth Ward of this city, in which capacity I have served the city during the past five years.

I wish to embrace this opportunity to extend to you and to the other city officials whom I have come in contact during this time, my sincere appreciation of the many kind courtesies extended to me and the gentlemanly consideration shown in the transaction of the city business in the performance of our mutual duties. I assure you it has been a pleasure to have been associated with you in the handling of the municipal affairs, and in leaving your honorable body to assume other duties.

I will always be glad to co-operate with you with a view of the best interests of the city and its taxpayers and citizens.

Ald. Pryal, seconded by Ald. North, moved that the resignation be accepted.

Ayes unanimous. The following petition was read: State of Michigan.

To the Board of City Canvassers of Escanaba, Michigan and to the Common Council of Said City of Escanaba.

Your Petitioner, William H. Yockey, respectfully represents that he was a candidate for the office of City Treasurer of the city of Escanaba, Michigan, at the regular April election held in said city on Monday, the 3rd day of April, A. D. 1916, and that he was voted for at said election, and that the inspectors of election in all the several wards in said city counted and returned the votes cast for the various candidates for said office at said election and that it appears by the statements of election returned by the inspectors of the several wards of the said city that your petitioner was not elected for said office and did not receive the plurality of all the votes cast at said election for said office, but on the contrary, one of the opponents of your petitioner, Arthur Mayou, was in the fact of the election statements so made by the inspectors as above stated, elected to said office and received a plurality of the votes at said election for said office; and that your petitioner therefore conceives himself aggrieved thereof, on account of error, fraud and mistake in the canvass of the votes by the Board of Election Inspectors in the Third Ward of said city and in the returns thereof made by said inspectors of election for the said ward by the statements of election of said inspectors; that the errors, frauds and mistakes complained of as near as may be stated and which occurred in the said Third Ward of the said city are as follows:

1. That the inspectors of Election in the said Third Ward, erroneously, fraudulently and mistakenly failed, refused and neglected to count for your petitioner numerous ballots which were cast at said election in said Third Ward in favor of your petitioner and which should have been counted for your petitioner.

2. That the inspectors of Election in the said Third Ward of said city erroneously, fraudulently and mistakenly failed, refused and neglected to canvass and return numerous ballots which were cast at said election in favor of your petitioner, and which should have been canvassed and returned for your petitioner.

3. That the aggregate number of the ballots cast at said election in said Third Ward in favor of your petitioner which the Board of Election Commissioners as aforesaid, refused and neglected to count, canvass and return in favor of your petitioner was upward of sixty-three (63) votes, which if they had been properly counted, canvassed and returned by said Election Board in favor of your petitioner, would have given your petitioner a substantial plurality of all the votes cast at said election for said office in said city of Escanaba.

4. That the inspectors of Election of the said Third Ward counted numerous ballots for the opponent of your petitioner, Arthur Mayou, which said ballots should have been counted for your petitioner, it would have resulted in a plurality of the votes cast in said Third Ward and city in favor of your petitioner as candidate for said office.

5. That the said inspectors of Elec-

(By Associated Press) Portland, Ore., April 13.—The 40 Oregon delegates to the biennial session of the General Federation of Women's Clubs in New York May 22 will be instructed to vote for Mrs. Josiah Evans Cowles of Los Angeles for the federation presidency. Other western delegates are expected to vote for her, also.

**GOTCH TRYING COMEBACK STUNT**

Circus Engagement a Preliminary to Another Match.

**HAS HIS EYE ON STECHER.**

Young Nebraskan Wrestler is Responsible For the Re-entry of the World's Champion Grappler into Mat Game—Stecher Meeting All Comers.

Will Gotch be defeated? Yes, if he keeps at it long enough. It may be Stecher, or it may be some other American grappler, or it may be a wrestler from a foreign land who will turn the trick. That defeat will come to the world's champion if he keeps on wrestling is inevitable.

Jeffries fought one fight too many. So did John L. Sullivan. Likewise Hat Nelson. Fame and fortune seem to be coveted by all champions, but they cannot retain lasting glory and keep up their earning power. The lure of the money, sooner or later will win, and they will acquiesce in a final attempt to come back.

**Lure of the Dollars Strong.**  
Gotch for several years fought against re-entering the arena. He could not add much to his fame won by defeat of the world's greatest wrestlers, but the lure of the dollars was too enticing. Gotch saw a chance to pick up a small fortune with a circus if he could round into condition successfully to defend his title again.

Three years ago Gotch was supposed to have fought his last battle. "Never again," said the world's champion as he tossed his last togs to Ashell, his trainer. "I'm through," continued the champion. "No more of that glory stuff for me. Back to the dear old

farm near Humboldt. That's my program. I'm going to raise beef instead of pin it to the padded canvas."

Hardly three years have passed. Nebraska, a rival state of Iowa, produces a prospective champion, Gotch's friends urge him to come out and defend his title. Stecher keeps on winning. He pins Hussane and Cutler and Plesina and other celebrities of the mat world in impressive style. He slams Americans to the mat in whirlwind order, dazzling the fans by his surprising performance.

After being importuned and quizzed and humiliated from all sides the world's champion begins to take light workouts in his garage at Humboldt. Then an owner of a circus shows up in Iowa and lays before the world's champion a contract. It calls for more than \$1,000 a week to appear in daily workouts, meeting all comers.

"I'll accept," says Gotch. "There's no use in fighting it off. I might as well go out and get the money, and if I get in shape I'll let Mr. Stecher know he has been in a match."

**Champion Resumes Training.**

In Santa Monica, Cal., the world's champion is training daily—not for the circus alone, but with Stecher as an objective.

That Gotch will meet Stecher is inevitable. That he may be defeated follows precedents of long standing. Every champion must battle in his last match, and if Gotch keeps on one is bound to be his last.

There are those who think Stecher will easily defeat the champion. They point to his many victories and his decisive defeat of Cutler and Americus, to say nothing of the rough and ready Hussane.

Others are just as sure Gotch will add another victim to his long list. They point to his versatility and draw attention to Stecher's using the body scissors with which to take all his matches.

Stecher's superior grip in the legs and hands is offset, think others, by Gotch's ability to hold a combination when once he fastens it on an opponent.

Stecher looks every whit a champion and is emulating the example of the champion in meeting all comers, irrespective of consequences. Stecher is traveling into many states of the Union, meeting any man the promoters sign to oppose him.

Raleigh Baum Suggested as Manager—Financial Support All That is Lacking

If the fans of the city are sufficiently interested in baseball to furnish financial support, Escanaba will have a team in the field this summer whether the proposed Wisconsin-Michigan League is organized or not.

Baseball enthusiasts are going ahead with plans for an independent team for the year. It is suggested that if the Wis-Mich league materializes, the organization formed for an independent team can be swung into the league, while if the six team circuit falls through, the independent team will be ready for the season anyway.

Lineup is Proposed

Many other cities of this region are putting strong teams into the field, and there would be no lack of strong opposition. Material in the city for a team looks good, although the proposed lineup is as yet only tentative. Kraus, Garland and Dodge would form a good trio to handle the pitching, with Murray Boyle and "Red" Murray as candidates for the mask position. Swanson at first, Olmsted at second, D robin at short, and Aronson at third are suggested as an infield combination. Flath, Baum and Hink are listed as the outfielders in present plans.

Evidence at present indicates that Raleigh Baum, who made good in three seasons of league team management, will manage the Escanaba organization, and it is proposed to start practice by May.

Want Money Support

All that is necessary to put through the plans to a successful culmination is financial support. Whether this obstacle can be overcome and ways and means to overcome it, will be discussed at a meeting which baseball promoters expect to call soon.

RAISE IN 'GAS' PRICE DUE TO HEAVY DEMAND

Chemist Says Production Has Fallen and Demand Risen—Price Raise Natural

The question of why gasoline prices have doubled in a short time, at present the subject of a Congressional investigation, is treated in an interview with Dr. Walter F. Bittman, chemical expert of the U. S. Bureau of Mines, published in the Fuel Oil Journal. Dr. Bittman says:

"There are three chief factors responsible for the sudden increase in the price of gasoline; all obvious and capable of approximate measurement. "First: The Cushing pool's production has, in a very brief time, fallen from about 300,000 to 100,000 bbls. a day. That lops off about 70,000,000 bbls. per year of the best gasoline-producing oil.

"Second: The exports of gasoline have increased from about 100,000,000 gals. to about 300,000,000 gals. a year. Our annual exports are now actually greater than the domestic consumption was only a few years ago.

"Third: The immensely increased consumption. Let me illustrate this. So recently as 1910 there were 350,000 automobiles in the country. Now there are 2,250,000. Automobiles are being added at the rate of 4,000 a day. If their average life is four years, it means that there is a cumulative increase in the demand for gasoline to keep them running, equal to the addition of 3,500 new ones daily. Every new automobile gets its tank filled when it begins its career; at an average of only 10 gals. to the car, the new ones alone require 40,000 gals. of new consumption every day; and it never stops.

"It isn't necessary to suggest what must happen in such conditions as these. The price goes up simply because there is demand that will take the whole output at the price fixed."

(Continued from page one) does not demand the immediate withdrawal of the troops, but invites the United States to begin negotiations to that effect. Americans in Fight. San Antonio, Texas, April 13.—Advices received at department headquarters at Fort Sam Houston state that the American forces have been in an encounter with either Mexican military forces or the civil population of Parral. No details are available. The Americans entered the town with the intention of marching through en route southward. An exchange of shots followed. The inference is that the Americans continued to march through the town. They were probably the troops under Major Tompkins. Gutierrez minimized the affair, saying that the Americans appeared suddenly and unheralded, and that the Mexicans were alarmed.

Want Formal Agreement.

Mexico City, April 13.—The Mexican note asking that the American troops be taken out of Mexican territory and the pursuit of Villar be left to the Mexican Constitutional army contains 5,000 words. In it the de facto government contends that as the American troops crossed without permission, they should be withdrawn until proper formal negotiations can be made between the two governments. It is affirmed that the previous note emphasized the fact that permission for reciprocal crossing of the frontier was granted only in the event of a repetition of raids similar to that made by Villa at Columbus.

Wilson Cancels Engagement

Washington, April 13.—The German note on the Sussex and other submarine cases has been received at the state department and was being decided today. It will probably be laid before President Wilson and Secretary Lansing before night. In view of the pressing nature of the situation in Germany and Mexico, President Wilson has abandoned his plan to go to New York tomorrow and has cancelled his engagement to speak before the Young Men's Democratic Club there Saturday.

Villa Near Urbinas

Torreón, Mexico, April 13.—Francisco Villa is believed here to be near or at Urbinas ranch at Las Nievas, south of Rosario in the state of Durango. Reports say that he is heading down the Nazas river in the direction of the Contreras and Ceniceros bandits.

No Attack at Guaymas.

Washington, April 13.—Dispatches to the navy department from Admiral Winslow, in command of the Pacific fleet, make no mention of the reported bandit raid on Americans near Guaymas.
