Session of Naturalization Court is Today

Over 50 applicants for U. S. citizenship will appear before the July session of naturalization court. Today was the last day for filing applications and at noon 46 applicants had been registered. A number of applicants who were held over at the last time will also appear.

The number to be heard at the July session is under the average for Delta county. Usually a presidential election year brings out a large number of applicants, and 65 or 70 prospective citizens is the usual number to appear for examination.

The naturalization law which went into effect in 1906 provides that applicants who have taken out first papers must apply for their second papers within seven years after the date of the first ones. Persons who arrived in this country since 1906 must file a certificate of arrival when they apply for citizenship papers.

3,927 RECRUITS FOR ARMY ARE TAKEN

War Department Gives Figures, Show ing Acceptance of One in Six Appl icants

(By Associated Press)

Washington, April 15 .- To strength en further the federalization of the National Guard, the Senate today, by a vote of 33 to 23, whended the army organization bill to require national guardsmen to take an oath to obey the orders of the president as well as the governor of their state.

The amendment was presented by Senator Wadsworth, who said that it originated in the National Guard itself. The chief purpose of the amendment is to place the National Guard soldiers primarily in the service of the United States and secondarily in the service of the state, said the senator.

Senator Borah caused a sensation by declaring that the \$8,000,000 annu-Natioanl Guard was "shamefully wasted" and some of it was "embezzled." 

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

PROHIBITIONISTS OPPOSE MOVEMENT

(By Associated Press)

Winnipeg, Can., April 15 .- A movement is under way among liquor dealers in Manitoba, which voted out its saloons at an election last month, to months of grace in order to dispose of stock on hand. Should the petiwill go "dry" until August 1.
