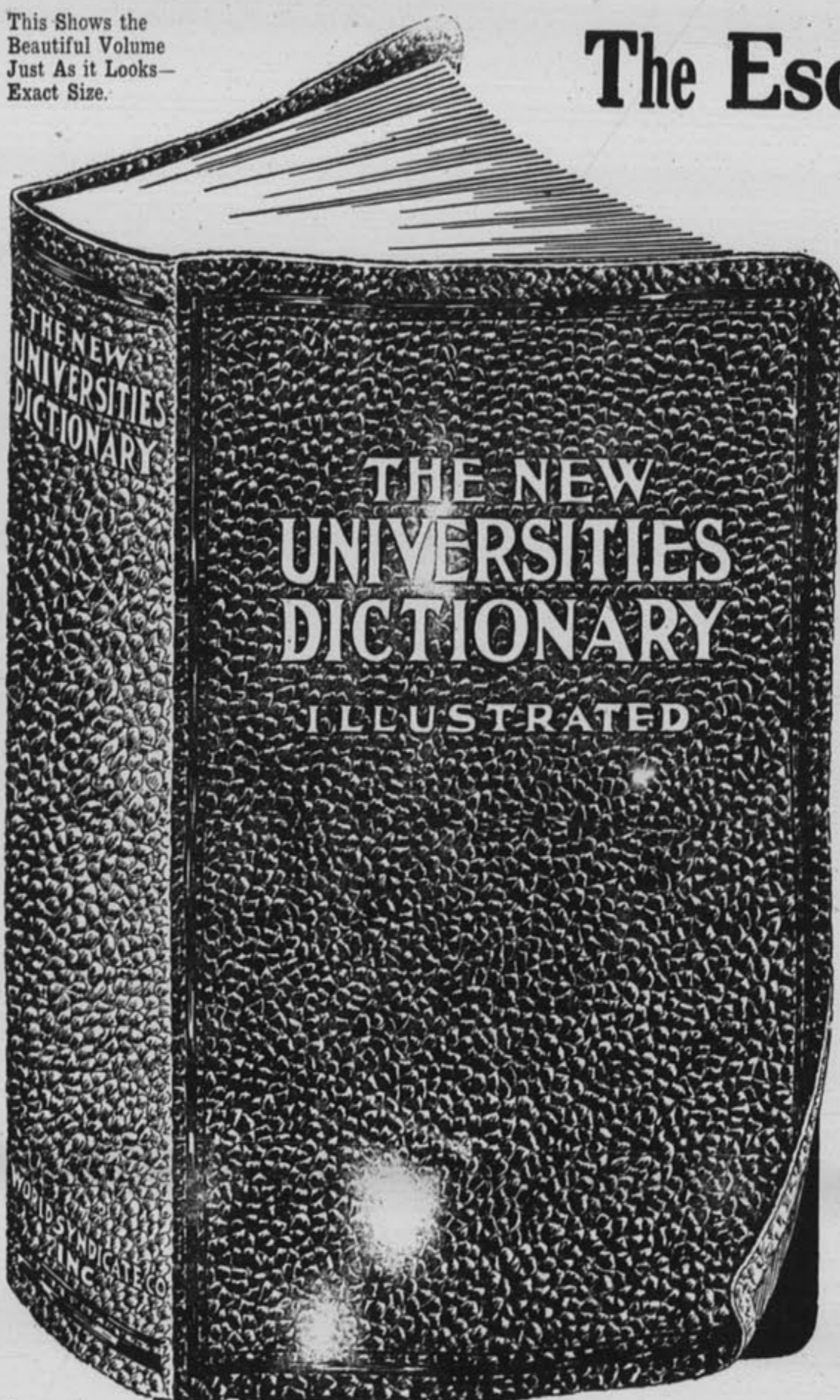

Goethals Expected to Resign After Canal Re-opening Today

(By United Press)

Panama, April 15.—Governor Geo. W. Goethals of the Canal Zone, who withdrew his resignation and hurried back here from Washington to clear the canal of the Gaillard cut landslides last September, is expected to reoffer his resignation to President Wilson if there is no promise of further trouble following the reopening of the canal today.

Colonel Harding, who has been acting governor during Goethals' absence in the United States, is expected to succeed Colonel Goethals as governor, when the time comes.

Goethals has not announced that he will reoffer his resignation, but his associates here feel sure he will because he asked to be retired under the army retirement rule before, thinking his work in completing the canal was done.

The earth movements blocking the canal began last September, about the time Goethals offered his resignation to President Wilson in Washington. At news of the trouble, which prevented the passage of the Atlantic fleet, which was to have attended the opening of the Panama-Pacific exposition, Goethals asked the president not to act on his resignation, and in October he hastened back to Panama.

The canal builder faced a task slightly less gigantic than the one he faced in "finishing the big project itself. Millions of tons of rock and earth have been torn from the collapsed excavations under Goethals' direction, employing bigger dredges and steam shovels than ever were used before.

Construction work at the terminals also has been completed in the meantime and when the big ships begin to pass through the canal today, it will be more advanced in equipment, more "polished" than it ever has been. It will be able to handle ships much more expeditiously than heretofore.

It is not considered improbable that there will be small slides from time to time, but no more big ones are looked for and what there may be are expected to diminish in size from year to year. There is believed to be no danger from earthquakes. Goethals says the defenses of the canal zone are adequate to repel any enemy.

WANTS REAL ESTATE MEN TO BE LICENSED

State Convention Hears Novel Proposal by Superintendent of Trespass Agents.

Lansing, Mich., April 15.—A state law, providing for the licensing of all real estate dealers and brokers, was advocated this week before the State Real Estate Dealers' convention by Glenn R. Munshaw, superintendent of trespass agents for the public domain commission.

Mr. Munshaw called upon the real estate men to back such a piece of legislation.

"The greatest trouble connected with real estate deals in Michigan today," said Mr. Munshaw, "is misrepresentation. Those who misrepresent not only give the state a black eye to outside investors, but at the same time make the work so

much the harder for the honest real estate dealer and land salesman."

He cited several cases of land deals in the northern part of the state which were unquestionably doubtful and told the dealers that although only a small percentage of land dealers did such work, they must eradicate those who did it.

Mr. Munshaw's plan is for a state commission to charge a nominal fee for licenses, much on the order of the present method of licensing insurance agents by the state insurance department.

(Continued from Page One) increasing the coast artillery corps at once to its maximum strength.

"Our coast defenses cost \$41,000,000 and are among the best in the world," he said, "but we now have enough men to man only one fourth of the guns."

"My amendment would give us enough to man one half of them. I think more men should be trained in the use of these guns, and hence I would not leave it to the president to make the increase, but would have Congress do it now."

3,927 Recruits Accepted

Washington, April 15.—The result of 20 days' recruiting for the 20,000 men recently authorized by Congress, as announced by the war department today showed 16,871 applications and the acceptance of 3,927 recruits. During the last nine days San Francisco led with 530 applications and 101 acceptances. Chicago was second with 447 applicants and 80 accepted, and New York came third with 400 applications and 59 acceptances.

SAILOR BOY CHANGES HANDS

Hancock, April 15.—Announcement was made yesterday of the purchase of the steamer Sallor Boy by Hancock parties from the Hart Transportation Co. of Sturgeon Bay.
