### DEAD FOR 2 WEEKS

(By Associated Press)

Washington, April 17 .- Secretary Baker today received a dispatch from Naco saying that Villa had last been seen heading in the direction of the place where reports say he was buried. It is taken to mean that the reports of his death may be true.

El Paso, Texas, April 17.-A telegraphic dispatch was received by General Gavira, commander of the Juarez forces, from Cusibiriachie at 19:39 today saying that the body of Villa had not arrived there at this hour. -

El Paso, April 17. Confirmation of Mexican reports that Francisco Villa's body had been exhamed at San Francisco Boraja and was being brought to Chihuahua was still lacking at the headquarters of the de facto government at Juarez this morning. The Mexican telegraph lines lay silent during the early morning hours. Not a message regarding Villa was received ed during the night.

### Is Sure of Death

"I still feel reasonably certain that the megsage received over the Mexican lines that Villa's body, has been found is correct," said Andres Garzia Mexican consul here. "I shall make every effort to have the body brought to Juarez, where scores of Americans who knew him may make an identification which will be completely satisfactory to the American people. We should have some official information about Villa today."

### Defeated Federal Troops

O'er 4,000 men and eight generals of the federal army took refuge in the inited States and were interned after Villa's victory at Ojinaga. He followed this success by a desperate attack upon Torreon, a federal stronghold which he stormed, after a short elge, in a desperate hand to hand

The federal forces were still more decisively defeated at San Pedro de as Colonias where they lost thousands in killed, wounded and prisoners. Withost allowing them time to recover, he followed to Paredon, cut off the federal troop trains and captured large quantities of supplies. The remaining federals retreated to Saltillo but could not be made to face Vila's dreaded attack and that city was evacuated before his approach.

### Break With Carranza

This campaign cleared the federals out of the north of Mexico with the exception of Zacatecas city, and gave Viila virtual centrol of more than half of Mexico. He returned to Torreon and Chihuahua to rest and recruit in June, 1914, and at this time came the first open break between him and Carranza.

Maytorena already had left his standard and nearly all the generals and men of his command followed suit, accepting amnesty of Carranza and sur-

Villa sent his wife across the border and with but a few hundred men ought the mountains, again a bandit with a price upon his head. Looting ranches for horses and provisions, he cathered about him scattered members of his former army.

Hunted closely by the Carranze roops under General Luis Herrera, it vas rumored that he was approaching the border in the hope of escaping to the United States and justifying his course with the authorities at Wash-

Then came the most wildly daring act of his reckless career, the attack March 9, 1916 on the American town of Columbus, N. M. and its garrison of three troops of American Cavalry, resulting in the dispatch of United States soldiers into Mexico.







months it has been in session. President Wilson has urged Congress to complete its business in time for adjournment before the Conventions, but he has included in his program no measures looking to the protection of our markets from the commercial invaders of Europe and Asia. Suggestions to Communities for the Construction and Maintenance of Country Highways.

That full value may be received for the money appropriated for road purposes and that the best results obtainable may be secured it is essential that the right man shall be placed in charge of road work. He should be selected not only because he actually knows more about good roads than any other person in the community, but also because he can get the best results from the money furnished. It is not sufficient, however, to let the matter rest with the appointment of a road overseer. He should receive the whole-hearted support of the community in the work. It should be seen to that under the conditions and with the money furnished the community is getting what it has a right to expect in the way of road improvement. It is well to remember that if for any reason an incompetent man is placed in charge of the work the responsibility for failure rests upon the community. There should be no other consideration, therefore, in selecting a road overseer than that of securing a man with the ability to perform the duties required. It should be realized that good roads have much to do with the prosperity of a community and that united action in the right direction is the surest and quickest way to and the crown is kept in condition by secure them.

Where the road overseer has had but little experience in road work, or free from weeds, etc., and that they where some new and difficult problem is presented to the experienced man, the office of public roads and rural engineering of the U. S. department of agriculture when requested, will of. At spaces of every few hundred feet fer advice and suggestions for carrying on the work and how best to overcome the difficulties.

To secure a satisfying road of any type, it is absolutely necessary to remember: First, drainage; second. drainage; and third, drainage. The earth road, properly cared for, will answer satisfactorily for the traffic of many rural sections that cannot af. 100 feet of its length. ford the better types of roads; but the earth road must be well drained. After this fact is well understood, two other requirements may be taken up-the location of the road and the reduction of grades to a general average of 5 per cent.

With the exception of sandy roads, which are easiest for traveling when damp, all roads must have proper side ditches to carry away the surface water. ### JEWISH PASSOVER BECINS TODAY

(Continued from page One) Israel enslaved in Egypt were led from bondage to freedom by the great leader Moses.

The Passover festival speaks for the sanctity of the home as well as for self-respect and liberty. The Jews accordingly assemble in their homes on this festival, and signalize it by a solemn service in which the story of the ancient struggle for emancipation ( is recounted with plous fervor. This Seder, as it is called, is unique in spirit and form.

The roasted bone reminiscent of the paschal lamb of the first Passover; the bitter herbs calling to mind the hard labor of the Israelitish slaves; the unleavened bread, known as the "bread of affliction," symbolizing the hasty departure from Egypt; the roasted egg, recalling the individual sacrifice which was offered in the Temple; the mixture of graded apple. nuts and wine, suggesting the clay, from which bricks were made by the enslaved people, and the parsley and salt water, symbolic of growth and the fertilizing freshness of spring, invest the domestic' ceremony with a real and forceful meaning.

A beautiful and most suggestive part of the service is the Open Door, through which the messianic prophet Elijah enters every home that night, a splendid expression of the great ideal which the prophets of Israel announced will become real some day when men will cease to hate and begin to do justice.

It is customary to remove all leaven out of the household in preparation for the feast. Leaven is the symbol of the sordid, and refers to those who are unemancipated from the commonplace things. During the feast, only matzoth and not bread, are


