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NOTE LAST WORD, WILSON SAYS TO CONGRESS

TO BREAK RELATIONS SHOULD GERMANY NOT STOP CAMPAIGN

Wilson Tells Congress He Has Given Germany Irrevocable Notice of Intention to Break Relations if Submarine Campaign is Not Conducted According to International Law

CONGRESS LISTENS IN SILENCE

(Associated Press)
Washington, April 19, 2:30 p. m.—President Wilson told Congress, assembled in joint session shortly after 1:00 o'clock today that he had given Germany irrevocable notice that the United States will break off diplomatic relations if her illegal submarine campaign is continued.

The president asked no action whatever of Congress. He simply informed it of the accumulation of facts proving that Germany's assurances to the United States are being violated; that the submarine campaign, despite the earnest protest of the United States, is being carried on with renewed vigor in contravention of all the laws of nations and humanity; and that he means to sever relations unless it is brought within the law.

The diplomatic history of the world shows that such a course is almost sure to mean war.

Note and Message Final.
The president's note and his message to Congress are final. They mark the end of diplomatic exchanges. The continuation of the longstanding friendly relations, he made clear, depends alone on Germany's conduct.

"I have taken the step, and taken it in the confidence that it will meet with your approval and support," he said. "All sober minded men will unite in hoping that the imperial government of Germany, in other circumstances the champion of all we are now contending for in the interest of humanity, may recognize the justice of our demands and meet them in the spirit in which they are made."

As the president began his review of the German submarine campaign no demonstrations occurred to punctuate his recital of the sacrifice of American lives. Not a sound above the president's voice was made as he spoke the name "Lusitania." Every head bent forward as the president indicated that he was approaching the keynote of his message, the announcement of his course.

Silence Greets the Message.
When he pronounced the words of the ultimatum declaring that unless Germany should immediately declare and effect the abandonment of an indiscriminate submarine warfare, this nation would have no choice but to sever relations, there was still no demonstration. Only a tense silence, a reflection of the gravity of his words.

When he concluded with the expression of hope that Germany will so act as to avert a regrettable break with America the assembly broke into cheers.

Republican leaders of both the House and the Senate strongly decried the president's course, characterizing it as a political subterfuge to bring on a war with Germany during a presidential year. Representative Mann said that the nation should be neutral, and that Wilson has never been neutral, but always on the side of England.

Washington, April 19.—President Wilson has sent the note to Germany declaring that unless attacks on merchantmen carrying Americans in violation of international law are stopped diplomatic relations will be severed. The president explained that the note is practically an ultimatum, but does not contain a time limit. It demands a reply immediately. The note was forwarded last night in code by way of Copenhagen. The president wants it to be in the hands of Ambassador Gerard or the Berlin foreign office when he appears before Congress. Members who heard the president outline it did not understand that it is an ultimatum in the sense the term is used. (Continued on page six)

Holy Week is Being Observed By Catholics of Whole World

Holy Week is being observed in the Catholic world this week—the period when the church commemorates the events preceding and following the crucifixion of Christ. On Holy Thursday this week only one mass can be celebrated in the church which is sung in white vestments. The bells which are rung in the mass at the Gloria do not sound again until in the mass on Holy Saturday. The celebrant consecrates an additional Host which is placed in a chalice and borne in procession to a place prepared for it. Like Lord's Journey. This procession with the Blessed Sacrament on Holy Thursday compares with the Lord's Journey to the Mount of Olives after the Last Supper. The "Pange Lingua" is sung by the choir during the procession and the place to which the Sacrament is taken is called the Altar of Repose, which is decked with flowers and lighted candles. After the processional the altars are stripped to remind the Christians of the way in which Christ was stripped of his garments. It is Saddest Day. Good Friday is one of the saddest and most solemn days in Holy Week and commemorates the Passion of Christ. The clergyman says the mass in black vestments. PAPERS OF VON IGEL NOT RETURNED; WILL GO AHEAD WITH CASE

NEW YORK AUTHORITIES PUSH PROSECUTION ON RECEIPT OF WASHINGTON INSTRUCTIONS

BERNSTORFF RENEWS DEMAND TO U. S.

Ambassador Refuses to Discuss Case—Papers to be Examined by Authorities

(By Associated Press)
New York, April 19.—The papers seized by Federal agents in the office of Wolfe von Igel, former secretary of Captain von Pape, recalled military attaché of the German embassy, will not be restored. Neither will the prosecution of von Igel for alleged participation in the plot to blow up the Welland canal be dropped, says Assistant Attorney Roger S. Woods. He announced that he had received instructions from Washington to go ahead with the case as if no protest had been made.

Bernstorff Sees Lansing
Washington, April 19.—Count von Bernstorff went to the state department today to push further his former demand for the return of the papers which the department of justice agents seized from Wolfe von Igel, former private secretary of Captain von Pape, in New York yesterday.

The department of justice decided to hold von Igel unless the state department demands his release on the ground that his crime was committed a year before he became diplomatic agent.

After a fifteen minute conference with Secretary Lansing, von Bernstorff said: "I really only called to discuss the von Igel affair, and there is nothing to be said on that."

Demand Not Mandatory
That was the only comment he would make. It was said at the state department that while the demand was not mandatory, it was the custom to comply with state department requests in diplomatic matters.

Under certain circumstances it was said that von Igel is not entitled as a diplomatic agent to have all his seized documents returned to him, and they will probably be examined by the department of justice.

Home Rule Is Cry of Wets

Petition to Amend State Wide Election is Being Circulated in City and State

The first movement of the wets in the campaign for statewide prohibition has been launched, in the form of a petition to amend the state wide prohibition election to put into effect the "home rule" proposition.

The petitions are now being circulated throughout the state, and one made its appearance in Escanaba today. It is being circulated by James Tolan, who has already secured many signers.

The home rule proposition would provide that every city and town could decide the question of saloons or no saloons for itself. In such a case it would be possible for Escanaba to remain wet while the rest of the county could go dry, while any town in the county would be given the same freedom. The proposition would allow with the county as a unit in voting on the liquor question, and would make it impossible for a county's dry majority to make a city dry when the latter's vote went wet.

GERMANS IN FURTHER ADVANCE NEAR VERDUN

Berlin War Office Reports Capture of Quarry—Fire Sweeps Section of Belgrade

Berlin, April 19.—The report today from the war office says the stone quarry south of Hautremont farm in the Verdun district east of the Meuse had been captured by the German troops, completing the success of the previous day.

Fire in Belgrade
Paris, April 19.—A destructive fire in Belgrade, the former capital of Serbia, is reported in a dispatch to the Matin from Bucharest. It is said the eastern section of the city is almost destroyed. Several hundred houses were burned and thousands are homeless.

Norse Steamer Sunk

London, April 19.—A Lloyd's dispatch from Lisbon says that the Norwegian steamer Terje Viken, 3600 tons, sank on Monday in Casca Bay, 15 miles west of Lisbon, after three explosions on board. The crew was saved.

MRS. FLORENCE MCKENZIE IE BEFORE COURT ON CHARGE OF KEEPING HOUSE OF ILL FAME

MASLOME GIVEN FROM 1 TO 3 YEARS

Man Who Shot Workman for Taking Ax is Found Guilty—Liquor Violator Arraigned

A jury in the case of Mrs. Florence McKenzie, charged with running a house of ill fame, was drawn this afternoon, and the first witness for the state, 17 year old Ellen Lundgren, of Gladstone, went on the stand.

The girl testified that she and Clara Forest had been brought to Escanaba by two youths in an automobile. The men, according to the girl's story, took them to Mrs. McKenzie's place on the plea of getting a lunch. There the men attempted to assault them, she said. She said that the men left and that later Mrs. McKenzie gave the girls enough money to get back to Gladstone.

Mrs. McKenzie's case was called after the recess this morning, but her attorney, N. C. Spencer, had just returned from attending the supreme court at Lansing, and was not ready to take up the trial of the case, so court was adjourned until 2:00 o'clock this afternoon.

Tony Borak pleaded guilty this afternoon to selling liquor to a minor, who was intoxicated at the time. He was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail.

The jury in the case of Stephen Maslome came in this afternoon with a verdict of guilty of an assault with a deadly weapon and Judge Flannigan sentenced the prisoner to state's prison for a term of from one and a half to three years, with a recommendation of three years.

The Maslome case went to the jury at 10:00 o'clock this morning. According to Maslome's own story, he had missed his breadax while working at a camp near Cook's, and at the place where he had left the ax found a heel plate mark which he thought had been made by the shoe of Paul Belaski, the complaining witness. Maslome admitted that he took Belaski's own gun, a .303 Savage rifle, from the latter's bunk, and went to a Polish house where Belaski was visiting.

At the house Maslome called Belaski out, ordered him to put up his hands, and at the point of the gun marched him toward the camp, with the intention, he says, of making him give back the breadax. Near the camp Belaski started to run. Maslome says he ordered Belaski three times to stop, and then shot at him, hitting him in the leg.

The court instructed the jury that if they wished, they could eliminate from consideration all the testimony except that given by Maslome himself. On the basis of that testimony, the court said, the defendant was guilty of a felonious assault, but he instructed the jury that they could bring in one of three verdicts, guilty of assault with intent to do great bodily harm, guilty of assault with a deadly weapon, or not guilty.

George W. McCormick of Menominee presided at today's sessions, as president of the Bureau. The other officers are Alton B. Roberts, Marquette, first vice president; Thornton A. Green, Ontonagon, second vice president; H. W. Reade, Escanaba, treasurer.

One of the most important actions to be taken at the meeting is the naming of a manager to take the place of Col. C. Mott, who has retired. F. D. Davis, of this city, is out for the office, and is prepared to make a strong bid for the post.

Another problem which faces the directors is the selection of a place for the bureau headquarters. The offices have heretofore been located at Menominee, but this year both Marquette and Escanaba are presenting their claims to the headquarters.

NEW ORDINANCE WILL CUT LICENSES TO 40 AFTER PRESENT YEAR

COUNCIL HEARS FIRST READING OF MEASURE TO LIMIT SALOONS BEGINNING IN 1917

BOARD ASKS FOR A NEW GAS HOLDER

Want Additional Tank With Capacity of 100,000 Cubic Feet to Meet Demands

WHAT COUNCIL DID LAST NIGHT

Heard first reading of ordinance to limit saloons in Escanaba to 40 after this year.

Authorized the Board of Public Works to secure bids on a 100,000 foot gas holder to cost about \$15,000.

Authorized committee to contract for garbage disposal on basis of bids submitted last night.

Accepted bonds for \$25,000 of W. H. Yockey, new city treasurer.

Heard and acted on petitions and communications.

Adjourned to April 29, when saloon licenses will be granted.

The city council met last night in a lengthy and busy session, with the first reading of an ordinance to limit the number of Escanaba saloons to 40 after this year, and an authorization for the board of public works to get bids on a new gas holder of 100,000 cubic feet capacity as the features of the meeting.

A star chamber session, with the subject of consideration said to be the matter of saloon licenses, was held before the open meeting. The new ordinance on saloons, as read at last night's meeting, proposes that beginning with 1917, the number of saloons in the city be limited to 40, and that no new applications be considered thereafter unless one of the old licenses expires or is taken from the holder. It also provides that if any saloon keeper shall be convicted of two violations of liquor laws, his license shall be taken from him. The license fee is fixed at \$250, with either personal or surety bonds for \$500 required. No license shall be granted to a woman, a non-citizen, or anyone who has served a jail term, and license holders shall not be permitted to sell liquor to women. of any provisions of the ordinance is set at from \$25 to \$100 fine and 90 days in jail.

Aldermen Noreus, Sheahan, and Hodson were appointed on a committee to open the bids for garbage disposal, and they reported that Wilhelm Johnson had submitted the lowest bid, \$169 a month. The bids ranged from that figure to \$205 a month. The committee was authorized to remain organized and enter into a contract for the garbage removal.

Ask New Gas Holder
The board of public works presented a request that it be allowed to purchase an additional gas holder for the municipal lighting plant, with a capacity of 100,000 cubic feet of gas, the cost to be about \$15,000. It was explained that with the present capacity of only 50,000 cubic feet of gas, the supply is insufficient to the demand, and there is no reserve in case of mishaps. With the number of gas customers increasing steadily, it was pointed out that in the very near future a much larger capacity will be needed. A vote was taken, and the request granted unanimously.

Petitions Are Heard.
Charles Gauper presented a petition asking permission to take out curbing at his residence at Hale and Sarah streets in order to construct a roadway to his garage. The petition was referred to the street committee with power to act.

E. A. Grabowski asked permission to sink four iron tanks, of 220 gallons capacity each, for containing gasoline in the alley at the rear of the Escanaba Steam Laundry. The tanks are to be sunk three feet, and to have tested to 6,000 pounds pressure. The request was referred to the building committee with power to act.

The De Grand company applied for team work for the summer, and its request was also referred to committee.

To Straighten Finances
William H. Yockey's bonds for \$25,000 were presented and accepted.

A motion was carried to have the finance committee meet with the board of public works to figure out

the financial status of the lighting company and the borough, and determine their differences.

A petition by property owners near Ruth street and Cortland Ave. for an arc light at that corner was granted.

The meeting adjourned to Monday, April 24, when the matter of saloon licenses will be presented.

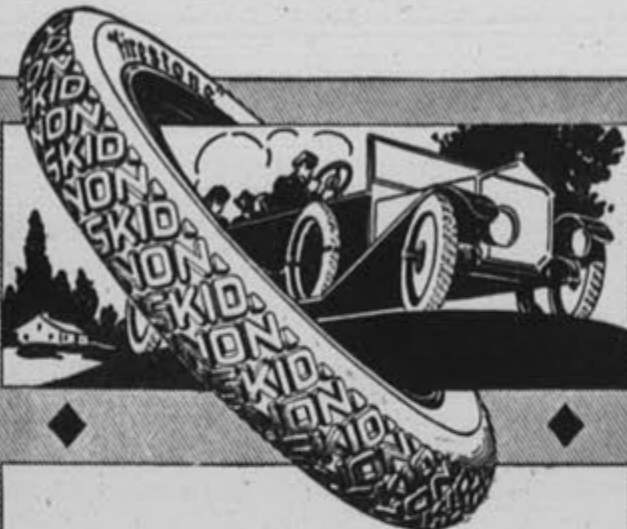

Tenth Anniversary of San Francisco Disaster

APPAM CASE BEFORE U. S. COURT TODAY

Representatives of Great Britain and Germany Make Rival Claims of Ownership

(By United Press)

Norfolk, Va., April 19.—One phase of the European war will come up for settlement by the judge of a United States court here when representatives of England and Germany appear before Judge Waddill to claim ownership of the prize ship, Appam, the British steamer captured on the high seas by the phantom German raider Moewe and brought to Hampton Roads port a captive by German naval men.

Germany claims the United States government should surrender the Appam to Germany on the ground that the steamer was captured as a prize of war and was compelled to put in at the neutral port of Hampton Roads because she was in an unworthy condition.

Lieutenant Berg, commander of the prize crew of the Appam, contends that making this port under these conditions leaves the vessel and cargo legally a German prize, entitled to be taken back to Germany and kept as German property. Berg cites a treaty of 1828 between the United States and Germany, to uphold this theory.

The English representatives claim that when the Appam touched Hampton Roads port the question of her legal possession automatically came under the jurisdiction of the neutral government; and that, because she was originally owned by British subjects, she should be turned over to the British owners by the neutral government.

San Francisco, April 19.—San Franciscans took thought yesterday of the same date ten years ago, when fire, starting from an earthquake shock of one minute's duration, burned three days and destroyed property valued at \$250,000,000. Because the lessons then taught in fire protection were acted upon long ago, and the hundreds of acres of burned buildings have been replaced and augmented, attention turned mainly to grateful recollections of aid which was poured in from every corner of the United States to tide the city over its first necessities. In recollection of this a whirlwind finish on a campaign for 25,000 members in San Francisco for the Red Cross society, which sent relief valued at nearly \$10,000,000 was a leading feature of the day's program.

The number of members actually obtained, was announced at the close of a musical festival held at night in the municipal auditorium, recalling the grand opera season which was interrupted by the fire. Beside this formal memorial gathering many downtown business houses kept a quiet, open house, and many a man or woman who slept in a public street or park ten years ago last night, paused to tell of it. Most of the stories, like the one of the hotel whose side wall fell out, revealing the startled occupants scrambling into their clothes, had a humorous tinge, and the tale of the millionaire banker who tried, in vain, to borrow a dollar from a newspaper man was retold to indicate that the real distress was transitory. These stories were woven in with accounts of the large grasp of the situation taken by the committee of fifty; and the spontaneous generosity of the railroads which furnished free transportation to any one wishing to leave the city, and spent more than half a million dollars in this way alone.

The day's activities recalled to visitors that buoyancy of the spirit which astounded the world a decade ago and which perhaps was exemplified in the recollections of a well known attorney.

"I was in New Orleans on my way to Europe for a three months holiday," he said, "and when I saw the papers, I knew I had lost everything I possessed."

"And you hurried back?"
"O, no. I considered that I was cleaned out and there were too many people in San Francisco in the same plight. So I went on with my trip."

Old timers recall that the town, built to perilous heights under the mistaken impression that redwood, which was cheap, would burn slowly, it at all, has been reconstructed, over the burned area, into a city of steel, stone, concrete and brick. A new civic center costing eight million dollars has just been completed near the site of the old city hall.

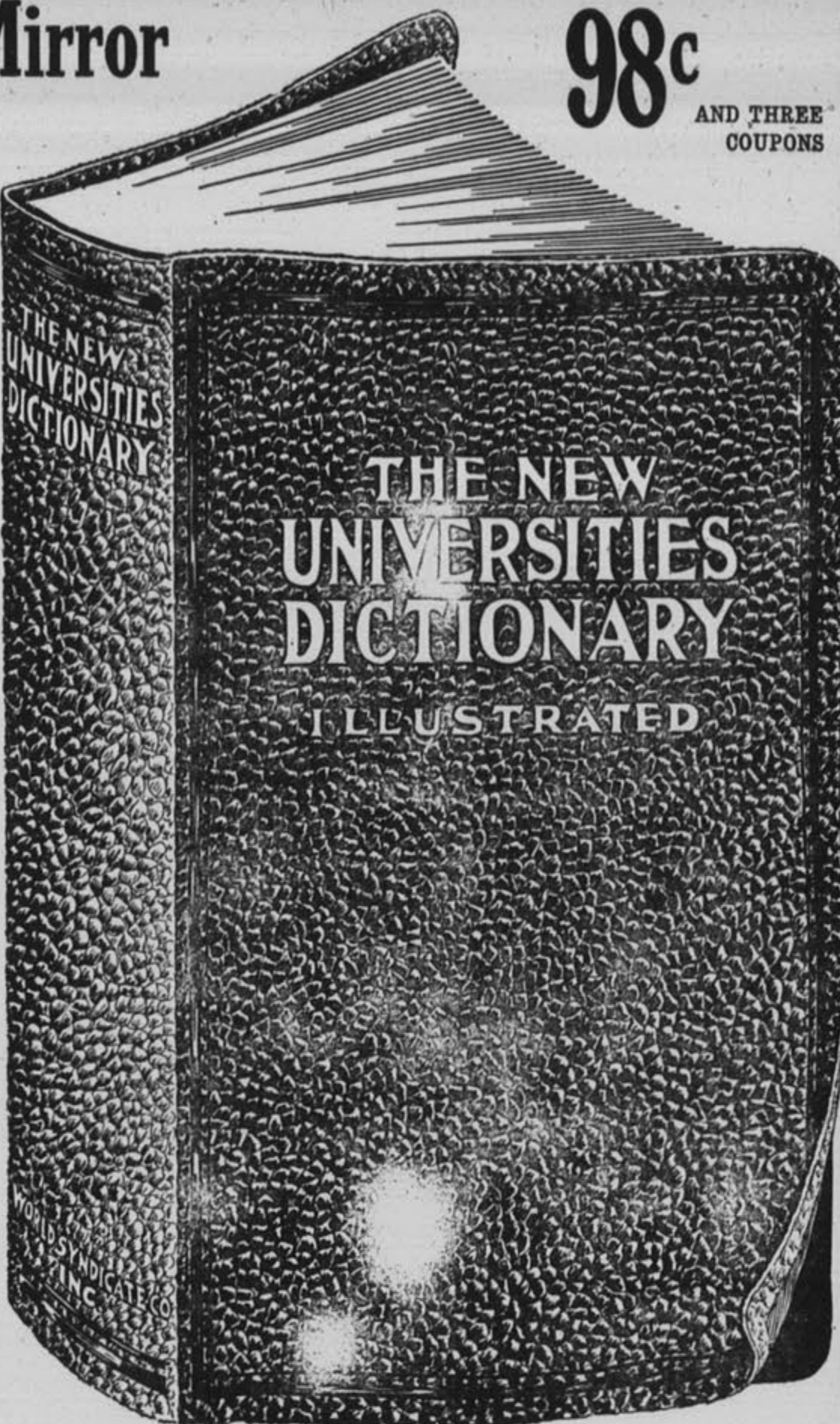

GERMANY NOT STOP CAMPAIGN

(Continued from page One) is technically used, but it is considered to have the same effect.

Refers to Sussex Case
Evidence in the Sussex case was referred to, and the president pointed out the apparent similarity in the account of the time and place of the attack on her and the attacks admitted by Germany to have been made by one of her submarines on a ship in that vicinity. It is believed the evidence in the Sussex case is convincing.

The president went over the situation thoroughly with committee leaders and told them explicitly that he did not believe the United States could remain on friendly terms with Germany if American lives continued to be placed in jeopardy by German submarines.

Address a Strong One
"The president's address is a strong one, and the note is a strong one," said Senator Stone, chairman of the Senate foreign relations committee. "It puts the next move up to Germany and brings the diplomatic correspondence to an end. It does not necessarily mean a breach. It demands that Germany modify her method of submarine warfare and says this is the last word to be said by this government on the case."

"The president will not ask Congress to do anything. After his message is read to Congress and when I return to the Senate I will move that the address be printed and referred to the foreign relations committee."
The president takes the position that he is contending not for Americans alone, but for all neutral nations and their rights.

War is Possible
The president consults Congress at this time, it is pointed out, because while he has authority to break off diplomatic relations, Congress alone can declare war, and there is only one instance in modern history where a break between two first class powers has not been followed by war. That case is the one between Germany and Italy.

First class powers have broken with lesser states and lesser states have had breaches among themselves without hostilities, but all diplomatic history points to a state of war when two first class powers reach that point.

Stocks Drop at News
New York, April 19.—The president's decision to submit the German situation to Congress caused great surprise in the financial district, and commission houses with wire connection to important centers were almost overwhelmed with liquidating orders.

The greatest excitement prevailed and speculative holdings were abruptly closed out. Apprehension increased when it became known that the note was already on its way. It was heightened when its purport to be an ultimatum was published. Munition stocks dropped from four to six points Anglo-French bonds were unloaded in blocks of 100,000 and 200,000. The sales for the first hour were 300,000 the heaviest selling known in Anglo-French securities.

To Discuss Issue
Washington, April 19.—Secretary Lansing today informed Count von Bernstorff that he was ready to discuss the submarine situation with him and the conference will probably be arranged for tomorrow. Yesterday Mr. Lansing informed him that he could not discuss the subject.

New Fires Struck.
The ceremonies on Holy Saturday begin early in the morning with the blessing of the new fire a candle with three stems is lighted. The blessing of the paschal candle is followed by the twelve prophecies after which the priest goes to bless the font.

The water in the font is scattered to the four corners of the world to indicate the catholicity of the church and the world wide efficacy of her sacraments. The priest breathes on the water in the form of a cross and plunges the paschal candle into it three times, for the spirit of God is to hallow it and the power of Christ is to descend upon it.

Sunday Ends Lent.
Lastly a few drops of oil of catechumens and of the chrisam are poured on it in order to signify the union of Christ our anointed king with his people. The celebrant now returns to the altar during which time the litanies of the Saints are sung. The altars are again decked with flowers and the candles lighted and mass is begun in white vestments.

Easter Sunday which ends the season of Lent is the feast of our Lord's resurrection. The word Easter is of Jewish origin—the feast of the Passover—from which the Christian feast is derived.
