

STRIKE END IS NEAR; WORKMEN ORGANIZED

Trouble at Sawyer-Goodman Mills at Marinette Promises Early Settlement

Marinette, April 20.—Chances for an

early settlement in the strike of between 600 and 700 men at the Sawyer Goodman mills in Marinette appeared bright today with a report of a committee scheduled to be acted upon by the men at a meeting in the Green Bay House this afternoon.

A committee of three laborers met C. A. Goodman, one of the officers of the company, and Mayor Wittig and agreed upon a tentative wage scale. The terms of the agreement were not

announced. This committee was to meet Mr. Goodman again and arrange definitely on the wage scale and then to make a report to the men at the meeting called for two o'clock this afternoon.

The men organized at a meeting in the Marinette High school last night. Between 750 and 800 men attended this meeting which was addressed by District Attorney Edward Miller, and Henry Ohl of Milwaukee, an organ-

izer for the Wisconsin State Federation of Labor. The meeting was quiet and everybody orderly. The men are asking for an increase amounting approximately to 25 cents per day per man.

Railroads and railroad employes are each making strong bids for the support of public opinion in the controversy over wages known as the eight hour day demand. The latest appeal made by the railroad men says:

"Any advances in operating costs of the railroads have not been due to added outlays to transportation employes. Train and engine crews have given to the transportation companies more than they have received in increased rates of pay. This fact is clearly shown by the reports of the railroads themselves to their stockholders and to the Interstate Commerce Commission. Although engineers, firemen, conductors and trainmen have received some advances in rates of pay during recent years, they have had to work harder, and have handled more traffic each year for each dollar of additional compensation received.

"Transportation employes are pieceworkers. They are engaged in handling freight and passenger traffic. The requirement for a standard day's work is to haul so many tons of freight or so many passengers 100 miles. If the weight of a freight train is increased the cost to the railroads for labor in handling each ton of freight 100 miles is less.

"The constant increasing of train loads has been the predominant factor in recent railway operating progress. The growth in weight of trains has been more rapid than the advances in rates of pay to transportation employes. Engine and train crews have transported proportionately a greater volume of freight than they have received increases in wages. As a consequence, the labor cost to the railroads of engine and train crews has decreased.

"During the course of the recent arbitration between the Western railroads and their engineers and firemen. It is shown that the proportion of total operating expenses arising from payments to transportation employes was 14 per cent less in 1913 than in 1890. In 1913 it was also shown that wage payments to transportation employes required only 19 cents out of each dollar of revenue earned by Western railroads in 1913 as compared with 21 cents out of each dollar of revenue in 1890. When considered on the basis of freight tonnage, it was found that it cost the railroads for wages to locomotive engineers and firemen 65 cents for each 1,000 tons carried one mile in 1890, while, in 1913, engineers and firemen transported 1,000 tons a mile for only 33 cents, a decrease of cost to the railroads for these employes alone, during this period of slightly more than 50 per cent. It was also shown further by exhibits submitted during the Western Arbitration that during the more recent years, 1900-1913, the cost to the transportation companies for wages of engineers and firemen decreased 12 per cent for each 1,000 tons of freight hauled one mile."

Marquette county, which has made rapid strides in agricultural and dairy lines in the last few years, now has a county farm agent, and agricultural progress will probably be accentuated. Delta county could make excellent use of a farm agent, and it is to be hoped that the recent movement started by the retail merchants and the grang-

About 700 men are on strike at the Sawyer-Goodman lumber mills in Marinette, asking a substantial wage increase. The men have effected an organization, and say they will stay out till their demands are granted. They say that their wages have always been cut in dull times, but that they have not been boosted with the return of prosperity. Their argument is reasonable. The workman is entitled to his share of the profits made in these boom times.

E. N. Breitung, the banker of Marquette and New York, has under consideration a new plan to lease all available idle ships of belligerent nations tied up in neutral ports and operate them under lease until the termination of the war. The plan is to apply not only to German and Austrian ships in United States and South American ports but also to English ships in German ports.

The idea of gathering this group of ships together into a fleet occurred to Mr. Breitung many months ago, long before the suggestions for a release of said ships was made by English statesmen. There have been a number of conferences among capitalists, and it is understood that a syndicate to finance the venture is in the making. It is not now proposed to buy the ships outright. Such a proposal was entertained originally, but the excessive prices demanded seemed to make such a plan unfeasible. The Germans held out for very high prices, it was learned. They said that their ships had greater value, proportionately, than English ships of equal tonnage because they had not been operated under a strain as the English ships have been operated for the last eighteen months. The German ships have been maintained in excellent condition and could be fitted out on short notice.

Originally forty-eight ships were included in the list to be purchased. This list has now been much extended it is believed. Negotiations are on with the German government and also with South American countries. Leasing contracts would stipulate a fixed monthly leasing price, and it would be stipulated that all ships be returned to owners at the conclusion of the war.

Mr. Breitung and his associates would not ply these ships between belligerent countries, but only between neutrals, and particularly to the Orient. They would carry only non-contraband goods. The plan would not be practical, of course, if the European nations at war did not agree to let the ships go unmolested, and such an understanding must be obtained if the plan is to work out.

No leases have been drawn up so far. There will be no difficulty over the financing, however, if the plan is approved. Washington officials, it is understood, have been sounded on the plan, and much depends on their action.

Movement For Nation-Wide Farm Preparedness Started

(By United Press)
Madison, Wis., April 21.—A farm preparedness move of continental scope was announced today in the formation of the National Agricultural Organization Society. This organization created by the delegates to the third national conference on marketing and farm credits that met in Chicago last winter, will form co-operative societies among farmers.

Such societies will include the sale of farm products, the purchase of farm supplies, co-operative implement rings and rural credit associations. The society will also investigate land tenure systems and conditions in America with a view to constructive measures for land reform.

This organizing society will not do any of the things mentioned for the farmers, but will aid the farmers in doing such things for themselves. It will also furnish expert auditors, instructor in co-operation and legal advisers. It purposes to affiliate the farmers' organizations now in existence and to federate them into a strong defensive alliance.

The plan of work is modeled after the operations of similar organization societies in Ireland, Scotland, England and British South Africa. The Rochdale plan of co-operation and the non-profit-making corporations will be advocated. Working agreements are to be effected between the N. A. O. S. and state and federal educational institutions and departments of agriculture.

The new organization will also train agricultural organizers, giving them field work in America and in European systems of co-operation.

Temporary national headquarters have been established here with Chas. W. Holman as secretary, Miles C. Riley counsel, and Charles A. Lyman, general organizer. A staff of experts is giving service to farmers' organizations, and organizing co-operatives where they have a chance to succeed. The general committee in charge of the work until the farmers gather in the fall to take it over consists of Frank L. McVey, chairman, Grand Forks, N. D.; Clifford Pinchot, Milford, Penn.; John Lee Coulter, Mor-

gantown, W. Va.; H. W. Tinkham, Warren, R. I.; Clarence Poe, Raleigh, N. C.; Millard R. Meyers, Chicago; H. W. Danforth, Washington, Ill., and Clarence Ousley, College Station, Tex.

"Research work is being carried out at the Geneva laboratory of inorganic chemistry," adds the newspaper, "on the separation of carbonic anhydrides in the form of snow by chlorophyllous pyridine in solution and other nitrous organic liquids. In the residue, besides free carbons of varying weight, have been found very hard and very white tetrahedral and octohedral crystals, which burned without leaving ashes and were insoluble in aqua regia, possessing, as far as the analysis made up to the present show, all the properties of the diamond."
