## AMERICAN TANKER IS SUNK BY U-BOAT

### MICHIGAN TOTAL OF REGISTRATION IS 372,872 MEN

CENSUS ESTIMATE OF 330,000 EXCEEDED BY 40,000, ACCORDING TO OFFICIAL TABULATIONS.

### EXEMPTIONS PROBABLY 183,270 MEN

State Ranks High in Percentage of Men Registered in Proportion to Population.

Lansing, Mich., June 12.—Complete official tabulations of the Michigan registration gave the state 372,872 registered men. Of this the whites are 294,297 and colored 6,172. The registration shows 62,282 aliens and 3,921 alien enemies. The total possible exemptions is estimated at 183,270. The census estimate for the state was 330,000 men.

When the provost marshal general's office closed last night thirty-one states had sent in their registration returns. They showed a total registration of 6,258,288, compared with a census estimate of 7,063,482. The returns have about kept up the percentage of previous reports and the predictions as to the grand total ranged from 9,000,000 to 9,500,000.

Among the states which had reported up to last night, Ohio stood first in the proportion of registration to the census estimate, with 113 per cent. Illinois had 104.7 per cent; Wisconsin, 104.5; New Hampshire, 102.9; North Carolina, 103; Iowa, 101.3; Connecticut, 100.9 per cent. Washington was the lowest state with 50.9 per cent.

In the thirty-three states reporting were 4,817,980 whites and 830,586 colored. The alien enemies was tabulated as 58,304 and the possible exemptions were 3,439,527.

### Hit New York Hard.

Washington, June 12.—Virtually every citizen of military age in some New York City districts, Senator Calder today advised the war department, will be taken under the army draft bill because of the population basis on which the draft will be made and because in the districts referred to there are three times as many aliens as citizens. He suggested remedial legislation, which the department and congressional committee have found impracticable.

### SECOND FOOD MEASURE IS READY TO REPORT

Administration's Bill for Food Control Will Be Passed After Two Weeks' Debate.

Washington, June 11.—The second administration food control bill granting broad powers to the president was agreed Monday by the house agriculture committee 12 to 3 yesterday, and its immediate report to the house was authorized. Chairman Lever expects the bill to pass in less than two weeks' debate.

The first food bill deals with the stimulation of production. The second deals with the control, distribution and price. The bill provides the guarantee of a minimum price to the producer of non-perishable agricultural products under regulation to be prescribed by the president. The committee dropped the plan to make maximum prices, believing it was unnecessary. A good deal of opposition has been expressed to it.

### WARNED AGAINST TRADING WITH ENEMY COMPANIES

(By Associated Press) New York, June 12.—In correspondence made public today between William C. Redfield and a firm of office importers, the secretary of commerce advised the firm not to conduct commercial business with the business firms of South or Central America, which are presumably controlled by subjects of Germany or of her allies, pending action by congress on the so-called "trading with the enemy act."

### SEAPLANES WILL BE M. W. A. MEET

Motor Boats and Air Craft Will Be Part of Big Entertainment for Modern Woodmen.

Chicago is going the limit for the entertainment of the Woodmen at the big convention next week. It was announced yesterday that a portion of the program of the week will be a hydroplane race off the big municipal pier, followed by an exhibition of flying and dropping "bombs."

Military rules will apply at the big encampment in Grant park, which means that lights will be out at 9:30 each night, excepting on the nights when there is something in the way of entertainment elsewhere. There will be 10,000 men in the gigantic camp and every one will be kept under rules. Delegates will receive their pay on the last day of the convention and will have to report on the first day in order to get it. They will also have to attend every meeting.

### DAMAGED GERMAN U-53 FOUND OFF COAST OF SPAIN

A SUBMARINE WHICH SHOWED SIGNS OF BEING IN FIGHT WITH NAVAL VESSEL TAKEN TO CADIZ.

### WILL PROBABLY BE INTERNED THERE

Repairs Will Be Made at Cadiz; Submarine Was Towed into Spanish Port by Destroyer.

(By Associated Press) Cadiz, Spain, June 12.—The Spanish torpedo destroyer No. 6 today discovered the German submarine U-52 disabled by gun shot which struck her at the entrance of the harbor. The submarine was towed into the harbor by the torpedo boat and stripped of its wireless so that the vessel could not communicate with other vessels of the Central Powers.

Repairs to the submarine will take at least two days, but it is believed that the vessel will be interned. The German commander after reaching the port paid a visit to the Spanish port commander, who later returned the visit.

The submarine is of 450 tons and has a crew of 20 men. It is equipped with two torpedo tubes and two rapid-fire guns.

ORGANIZATION OF DELTA COUNTY CHAPTER OF RED CROSS COMPLETED AT MEETING LAST NIGHT.

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE WILL BE NAMED

Campaign for \$20,000 for Fund to Aid Dependents of Soldiers Will Be Launched Soon.

Permanent officers were elected last evening for the Delta County Chapter of the Red Cross at a meeting of the board of directors held at the city hall. Plans were also discussed for the campaign in Delta county to raise \$20,000 as the county's share of the great fund for the care of dependents of the American soldiers.

The officers elected last evening were as follows: T. M. Judson, chairman. Mrs. A. C. Barras, vice chairman. S. M. Matthews, secretary. M. N. Smith, treasurer.

L. M. Beggs was selected as chairman of the publicity committee and will announce his assistants within a few days.

Late this afternoon a meeting of the officers will be held at the city hall at which time an executive committee of nine members will be selected to have direct charge of the campaign for funds. As soon as this committee is named, an active campaign will be opened to secure subscriptions to the fund.

Edwin J. Curtis of Flint, Michigan field representative of the American Red Cross, will be in the city in a few days and will confer with the local committee relative to the campaign which will be launched in the state for \$3,000,000. He will arrange for co-operation by the state organization and will aid materially in Delta county in getting the work under way.

I. G. English of The Mirror this morning received notification of his appointment as a member of the statewide advisory publicity committee, with Paul H. King of Detroit as chairman, in connection with the Red Cross week campaign which will begin on Monday next, as fixed by the president's proclamation.

### JOLIET PRISON WAS A REGULAR ARSENAL

Hardly a convict was without some kind of instrument and so many files were found that they suggested a big plot of a wholesale delivery.

### ESPIONAGE BILL IS READY FOR SIGNING

(By Associated Press) Washington, June 12.—The administration's espionage bill was finally approved by the senate today without a roll call and was sent to the White House for the president's signature. The provision for a newspaper censorship was stricken from the bill and material modifications had been made.

### ASSOCIATED PRESS OFFICIAL IS DEAD

One of the Well Known Superintendents, Arthur W. Copp, Died in Washington, D. C.

(By Associated Press) Washington, D. C., June 12.—Arthur W. Copp, superintendent of the southern division of the Associated Press, died today of a complication of diseases after a lingering illness. He was 49 years of age.

Before coming to Washington, Mr. Copp was superintendent of the western division at San Francisco and before that served the Associated Press in many places and in many different capacities.

Entering the service as a telegraph operator nearly 25 years ago, he had risen to superintendent of the southern division. Mr. Copp, when a volunteer was about to be called to make the perilous trip with the American steamer St. Louis, the first armed merchantman to cross the Atlantic, volunteered himself and made the trip for the Associated Press. The nervous strain added to the precarious condition of his health, the seriousness of which was unknown to but few except himself. Soon after returning to America from that trip he was taken to the hospital.

Twenty years ago as an Associated Press correspondent, he served with the Army in Cuba. Mr. Copp was born in Madison, Wis., where he will be buried. He was unmarried. His brother, J. M. Copp of Madison, was with him at his death.

### DEMONSTRATION OF FOOD PRESERVATION

Food Preparedness Committee of Delta County Arranges for Services of Miss Justin.

The Delta County Food Preparedness committee has arranged to have fruit and vegetable canning and drying demonstrations by Miss Margaret Justin, extension specialist of the Michigan Agricultural college in the upper peninsula. Miss Justin has arranged to come to Escanaba on July 12 and remain here until July 17 to give daily demonstrations on the art of preserving fruits and vegetables.

Just where the demonstrations will be given has not been decided, but they will be held in a place easily accessible to all. The food preparedness committee believes that preserving of food is as important as the producing of it and made the arrangements to have Miss Justin and her assistants come here to show Escanaba housewives just how to do the work.

The work will be carried out under the direction of a committee of the Woman's club, Mesdames Barras, Andrews and Frost, who will arrange the details of the demonstration. The demonstrations have been arranged to be held just before the biggest canning and preserving season opens and at a time when the instructions will be of the greatest amount of good.

Later in the summer, Miss Justin and others will make a tour of the upper peninsula in a special train demonstrating the same work as she demonstrates here. The demonstration here will be the opportunity of Escanaba housewives to secure some valuable instructions in the art of preserving the food supply and all should take advantage of it.

### TWO DELTA COUNTY MEN ARE REPORTED

Russians From Maple Ridge District Failed to Register; Reported to U. S. Officers.

The names of two Russians from the settlement near Maple Ridge were forwarded to the federal authorities today by Sheriff Iverson, following their failure to register yesterday as provided by law. Further action by Sheriff Iverson will await word from Grand Rapids.

Sheriff Iverson has reported only the two names as not being registered. These are the only two reported to him and are probably the only men in the county who failed to obey the selective draft law in the county.

All the other Russians in that vicinity came to Escanaba this week and registered with the county clerk. They were advised, they claimed, by Victor Branders that it was not necessary to register and did not do so because they were advised to the contrary.

### THE PETROLITE LATEST VICTIM OF SUBMARINES

TWO BOATS WITH MEMBERS OF THE CREW ARE MISSING, SAYS CONSULAR REPORT TO WASHINGTON.

### TEN AMERICANS ABOARD THE STEAMER

Vessel Figured in Attack by Austrian Submarine Two Years Ago Which it Survived.

(By Associated Press) Washington, June 12.—The American steamer Petrolite, 3,700 tons, has been sunk by a German submarine. Consular reports to the state department brought the news of the destruction of the vessel. One boat with 20 men has been landed and two boats with an unestimated number of men are missing.

The vessel had a crew of 38 men, of whom ten were Americans. She was armed and carried a gunners crew. The Petrolite was formerly the Excelsior, under the German flag and which was transferred to American registry with others of the Standard Oil company's fleet early in the war.

John Potz and Alvin Moore were assessed fines of \$10 and costs each today in justice court on the charge of engaging in a free-for-all fight last night in a saloon in North Escanaba, during which the bartender got a black eye and other injuries and several bystanders only escaped injury by a hurried exit from the place. Two other men whose names were given as O'Neill and Franklin were released from custody when it was proven that they were not mixed up in the fracas.

This afternoon a new charge was lodged against Potz, who it is claimed, hit a crippled man during his rampage yesterday. He was arraigned on the charge and sentenced to sixty days in the county jail. The men were taken by the police last night after a lively chase.

**BRADNER IS BOUND TO FEDERAL COURT**

Maple-Ridge Man Who Incited Fellow-men Not to Register Arraigned On Saturday.

Victor Brander of Maple Ridge, arrested here last week and turned over to the deputy United States marshal on the charge of having influenced his fellowmen not to register for the draft, has been bound over to the federal grand jury, according to the following from the Marquette Chronicle:  
"Victor Brander was given a hearing before United States Court Commissioner F. J. Schultheis, Saturday and was bound over to trial before the federal grand jury. He was charged with having incited his fellow countrymen of Maple Ridge, near Escanaba, not to register last Tuesday. He was placed under a bond that was raised and was given his liberty. The grand jury meets in the Soo, July 10."  
"Brander was arrested by Sheriff Andrew Iverson of Escanaba, and was placed in the custody of T. T. Hurley, United States Marshal, who brought him to Marquette. It is reported that Brander went about among the Finnish population of Maple Ridge suggesting that they refuse to register. He was brought up on this charge and will be asked to answer for it later on. The two men who were arrested in Negaunee will also be tried at the same time under similar charges."

## 180 MORE RECRUITS FROM THIS DISTRICT

Eleven Men a Day Until June 30 Are Needed to Fill Up Regular Army Quota, it is Estimated.

One hundred and eighty recruits are needed in the district covered by the Escanaba recruiting station between now and June 30 in order to bring up the enlistments from the district to the quota assigned by the war department. To obtain this number of men in the next eighteen days, Lieutenant McNeal, in charge of the local station, plans to open a "strong campaign" to obtain them.

The field for the campaign will be mostly in Wisconsin, the ten north-eastern counties which are in this district and which have furnished hardly a fifth of their quota since April 1. The quota of the ten counties, Iron, Oneida, Price, Vilas, Forest, Florence, Langlade, Oconto, Marinette and Lincoln is 270 men. Sixty men have been enlisted from this district.

The upper peninsula, as announced in The Mirror on Monday, has filled its quota for the regular army. The quota is the fifteen counties was 606, while 636 men have been enlisted.

It is interesting to note that Delta county with a quota of 56 men has furnished 132 recruits; Houghton county with a quota of 163 has furnished only 36 men; Gogebic with a quota of 44 has given 167 recruits; Iron county with a quota of 28 has furnished 85 men; Luce county with a quota of 8 men has furnished none.

The ten Wisconsin counties have failed to come anywhere near filling their quota. Sixty men have enlisted from those counties while the war department fixes the quota at 270 men. It is also true, however, that the recruiting station has not made a thorough campaign for recruits in those counties and that held men should secure a large number of men in the district within the next eighteen days.

The quota of the entire district under the Escanaba station is estimated at 876 men, while 696 have been secured, leaving a deficit of 180 men, which is to be the object of the campaign of the recruiting station between now and June 30.
