Among the states which had report ed up to last night, Ohio stood first the census estimate, with 113 per cent. Illinois had 104.7 per cent; Wisconsin. Carolina. 103; Iowa, 101.3; Connecticut, 100.9 per cent. Washington was the lowest state with 50.9 per cent.

SECOND FOOD MEASURE IS READY TO REPORT

Administration's Bill for Food Control Will Be Passed After Two

Weeks' Debate. (By Associated Press)

Washington, June 11.-The second administration food control bill granting broad powers to the president was agreed Monday by the house agriculture committee 12 to 3 yesterday, and its immediate report to the house was authorized. Chairman Lever expects the bill to pass in less than two weeks' debate.

The first food bill deals with the stimulation of production. The second deals with the control, distribution and price. The bill provides the guarantee of a minimum price to the producer of non-perishable agricultural products under regulation to be prescribed by the president: The committee dropped the plan to make maximum prices, believing it was unnecessary. A good deal of opposition has been expressed to it.

Washington, D. C., June 12-Arthur W. Copp; superintendent of the southern division of the Associated Press. died today of a complication of diseases after a lingering illness. He was 49 years of age.

Before coming to Washington, Mr. Copp was superintendent of the western division at San Francisco and before that served the Associated Press in many places and in many different capacities.

Entering the service as a telegraph operator nearly 25 years ago, he had risen to superintendent of the southern division. Mr. Copp, when a volunteer was about to be called to make the perilous trip with the American steamer St. Louis, the first armed merchantman to cross the Atlantic, volunteered himself and made the trip for the Associated Press. The nervous strain added to the precarious condition of his health, the seriousness of which was unknown to but few except himself. 


