WILSON WARNS AGAINST A GERMAN PEACE

GERMANLINE IN BELGIUM FORCED BY THE BRITISH

RETIREMENT BY GERMANS ON A FRONT, OF TWO MILES IS RE-PORTED IN LONDON DIS-PATCHES TODAY.

GERMANS CAN'T STOP BRITISH DRIVE

Germans Being Followed Closely by British Who Are Meeting But Few Obstacles.

(Associated Press Summary) The German line in Belgium is fast crumbling under the British offensive. Evidences of this fact appear in the announcement from London of a German retreat on a two mile front near Warneton.

After wiping out the Messines- Wytschete salient in the crushing attack of last week, General Plumer has continued to attack the Germans from time to time east of Messines and has gained advantageous ground. Further south the British are pressing hard the lines of General von Arnim.

Having lost the last commanding artillery and observation positions when the Messines plateau fell into British hands, the Germans are finding the pressure beyond their ability to meet. One of the first results of the pressure is the abandoning of the important section of their first line trenches between the Lys river and St. Yves.

GERMAN PLAN IS "A NEW INTRIGUE"

Wilson Delivered Address at Flag Day Celebration at Washington Monument.

(By Associated Press)

Washington, June 14. - President Wilson warned the American people in a Flag Day address on the Washington monument grounds today that Germany has carried into effect the greater part of her immediate plan of conquest and now is negotiating a new "intrigue of peace" designed to end

All the central empires, the president declared, have been cemented into one great autocracy-ridden empire, throwing a broad belt of German military power and political control across the very center of Europe and beyond the Mediterranean into the heart of Asia. "This achieved." he said, "it is easy to understand why Germany is fostering a propaganda for an early peace."

"Peace, peace, peace has been the talk of her foreign office for now a year and more," said the president. "A little of the talk has been public, but most of it has been private. Through all sorts of channels it has come to me and in all sorts of guises. many is bleeding, see very clearly what point fate has' brought them. INSURANCE AMONG THE SWISS

Thrifty Person May Guard Himself Against Almost Any Form of Disaster to Be Dreaded.

A system of insurance against unemployment prevails in some of the Swiss cantons, whereby persons contributing a certain sum per month are guaranteed employment or paid a weekly indemnity for the period during which they are out of work. Such persons must, however, be able to show that their unemployment is not their own fault. This plan of insurance is, however, not general, nor is it very popular, as it involves many details which make it difficult for the beneficiaries secure the payment of the bene-

Employees of Swiss industrial institutions are required to insure themselves against sickness or accident, and this measure also obviates to a great extent the necessity for public charity when wage-earners are deprived of their income on account of illness or accident. Under the compulsory insurance act the expense is divided between the employer and the insured. This plan works most satis-

secure in their employment. There are also other systems by which employers and employees can protect themselves against the expense of medical treatment and supplies in case of illness or accident. The society for the protection of domestic servants assumes, for instance, the responsibility for the care and treatment of those enrolled upon its rec-




