STAND BY FIRST AMENDMENT.

The continued freedom of the press has a strong friend in Representative Edward E. Browne, of Wisconsin, who believes that no man is wise enough to say how 100,000,000 of his fellow citizens shall speak or write. In the words of Mr. Browne, "A republic flourishes on criticism; while a monarchy withers." Sound public opinion cannot be formed unless the people have access to the facts, and when a government bases its action on public opinion that has been molded by those in power, its judgment is worthless. Congressman Browne is impressed with the fact that the leading men of England have denounced the censorship that has been in effect there since the beginning of the war, and lay England's shortage of food, delay in preparedness, and defeats on the battlefield to that cause. Mr. Browne is determined to do what he can to prevent a repetition of those disasters in this country.

TWO-THIRDS FOR POSTERITY.

Congressman C. Bascom Sloop of Virginia has discovered that England has raised about 25 per cent of her war expenses by taxation, France 22 per cent, and Germany only 16 per cent. Mr. Sloop thinks it would be well for the United States to follow their example and not endeavor to impose practically 50 per cent of the cost of the war on the present generation, as provided in the revenue bill passed by the House. Business would not be so seriously disturbed in this country if we limited ourselves to raising about a third of the sum by taxation and Representative Sloop hopes that the bill as finally enacted into law will be reduced to that amount. The indications are that the Senate committee share Mr. Sloop's views, and will eliminate some of the more drastic taxes.
