THE GREAT TASK.

The most stupendous and appealing call in the history of the world to aid suffering humanity confronts our Red Cross. Millions of men who have been fighting for liberty lie dead or wounded. Millions of women and children are homeless and helpless. Hundreds of towns and villages have been destroyed. Disease and distress are rampant.

Up to now, our own people have not suffered. While Europe has been pouring out her life-blood, America has experienced a prosperity she had never before known.

But now we ourselves are in this gigantic war. We now see that the struggle against autocracy and tyranny which our allies have been making, is, and has been from the first, in reality, no less our struggle than theirs. We ourselves must now share the suffering which they have endured. We too must bear the burdens and we must do our part in a real way.

Our Red Cross is a vital factor in the struggle. To promote efficiency in administering its great responsibilities, the President of the United States has proclaimed a Red Cross week, in which the nation is to raise the sum of \$100,000,000 as an extraordinary war fund. Of this amount, \$3,000,000 is Michigan's share.

It will require the co-operation of every citizen to make the plan a success. Let everyone see his duty clearly and give according to his means.

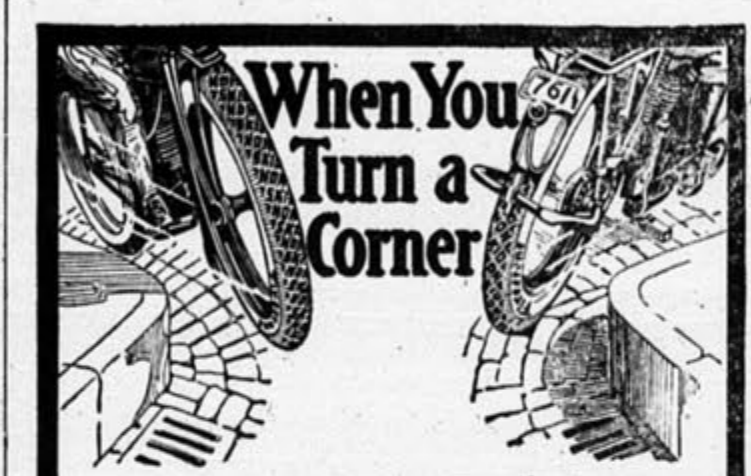

61 MEN ARRESTED IN IRON COUNTY

Are Held on Charge of Not Registering for the Draft on Registration Day.

Marquette, June 18.—Sixty-one Iron county men are charged with having failed to register on registration day. Of these eighteen were arraigned before a United States commissioner here and were committed to jail in lieu of furnishing bonds in the sum of \$1,000.

Of the eighteen arrested all were aliens, except two who are citizens. Eleven of the men were released on their own recognizance after they registered. Thirty-two of the men had good excuses for not registering and were allowed to sign up and be released.

COMMITTEE TO SELL \$25,000 ROAD BONDS

Half of the Remaining Bond Issue Will Be Put on the Market at Once by County.

Half of the remaining \$50,000 of the county road bond issue will be placed on sale immediately, according to action taken Saturday by the county road committee of the Delta county board of supervisors. The \$25,000 portion of the issue will net the investor approximately 4.7 per cent per annum. Those who desire to subscribe to the issue should make application to County Clerk A. J. Peplin at once.

The money derived from the sale of the bonds will be used to defray the expenses of road improvements and new projects which the board will take up this year. The road commissioners have decided that owing to the scarcity of labor and because of their desire to co-operate with the government, only one mile of macadam road will be built this year, that between St. Jacques and Ogontz, to fill in the gap between the two present stretches of macadam road.

WANT REGISTRATION OF PLAGUE VICTIMS

State Board of Health Advocates Getting List of Every Sufferer in Michigan.

Ann Arbor, June 18—The state anti-tuberculosis society is seizing upon the interest in the registration for the conscriptive draft to drive home the necessity for another registration which is of as great importance in fighting tuberculosis as the draft registration is in fighting the Germans. For years the anti-tuberculosis workers of the state have been endeavoring to secure a registration of all tuberculosis sufferers, and there is a law on the statute books requiring this. But so far only a comparatively few have complied with the legal requirements.

A good many physicians are lax in turning in to the state board of health the names of the tuberculosis sufferers they are treating, and individuals rarely take the trouble to apprise the department of their condition. The government of the United States finds it necessary to have all men of a certain age registered in order to secure an adequate fighting force. If all tuberculosis sufferers were registered in the same way, the tuberculosis problem would become comparatively simple, health authorities declare.

Tuberculosis is a menace only when it is unknown. There are thousands of persons in Michigan afflicted with this disease of whom the state board of health has no record. Such being the case, little can be done for them.

MEMONINEE SCHOOL DISPUTE GETS WARM

Memoninee June 18—Taxpayers and parents of children of the Memoninee (Boswell and John N. Davis schools) to the number of 843 have adopted a resolution calling upon the board of education to make answer to a suit brought in the circuit court by Calvin R. The changing of the names of the school by the board has created a great deal of agitation in the city. The schools were first named after prominent residents and the change in the names has brought forth a flood of protest.
