U-BOAT TOLL IN FOUR MONTHS IS 1,745,000 TONS

BRITISH STATEMENTS COMPILED BY WASHINGTON SHOW THAT 322 VESSELS OVER 1600 TONS HAVE BEEN SUNK.

135 Vessels Under 1,600 Tons Were Torpedoed Since February 17, Report Shows.

(By Associated Press) February 17, as shown by the official British statements shows that 322 vessels of more than 1,600 tons were sunk and that 135 of less than 1,600 were torpedoed. British steam fishing vessels sunk number 78. The records for sailing fishing vessels is incomplete. but during the last three weeks shows seventy-eight.

It is estimated that the total loss in slightly less than four months will reach 1.745,000 tons, or about 250,000 tons less than the entire world's shipping construction during 1916.

Frence Steamer Lost. New York, June 18 .- News of the destruction of the big French freight steamer Mississippi by a German submarine with a loss of one of the merchantman's crew, .has been brought here by officers of a British freight vessel.

The Mississippi, it was reported. was sunk about 145 miles out from Brest, France, on June 2, according to officers of the British ship which rescued forty-seven officers and seamen from the open boats.

VESSEL AND U-BOAT BOTH DESTROYED IN LONG BATTLE MAY 16

Submarine Which Fired Torpedo Was Itself Sunk as British Steamer Was Going Down.

(By Associated Press) New York, June 18 .- In a battle be ween a crippled stranded British steamer and a German submarine of WAR DEPARTMENT SAYS NO DATE SET the Italian cost, both were destroyed, according to members of the crew of the American steamer Hilonian, which arrived today. The Hilonian, itself. had already been reported sunk on May 16, the crew being landed.

On the same day an unidentified British steamer carrying coal was torpedoed, but the captain managed to get the vessel into shallow water before it went down. Two days later, the Americans assert, the submarine reappeared and attacked the vessel launching a torpedo which hit amid ship and almost blew her up.

As the submarine came to the sur face to observe what had been the result of the attack, the two deck guns on the British steamer were turned on the submarine. A six-inch explosive shell hit the U-boat and it was seen to turn over twice and split squarely in two. During the fight which occurred less than a mile from the shore, coast batteries also took

Russian Situation Is Better: Duma Orders Army to Start an Offensive at Once.

(By Associated Press) London, June 18 .- An official statenent of the British admiralty says that a Teuton submarine has been sunk by a Japanese warship in the

Mediterranean sea. (Associated Press Summary) Developments of importance are impending on the Macedonian front following the recent clarifying of the military situation in Greece coincident with the abdication of King Constan-

The most pronounced move is the withdrawal by the British, without pressure, of their advanced positions east of the Struma river on the extreme eastern end of the front. Several towns which have been evacuated have been occupied by the Bulgarians. Simultaneously comes the news of pro nounced reconnoitering activity by the entente forces along the Vardar river in the center sector.

It has been frequently pointed out by military observers that the only practical route for a successful advance to cut the lines of the Central Powers in the Balkins and to reclaim Serbia was up the Vardar valley along the railroad line there.

The present activity points to the probability that an offensive by Genthat embracing the Vardar valleyis imminent.

An aggressive movement has now been made possible by the removal of the menace in the rear of the English forces which existed as long as King Constantine was on the Greek throne were in control of the Greek military

Both the Russian army and the Russian navy are giving more evidences Austrian statements instanced increas ed activity by the Russian military forces on the Volhynia and Galician fronts where the great Brussiloff offensive was in full swing at this time a year ago.

The Russian naval forces have been so largely in evidence in the Baltic sea that Berlin announces it has found it necessary to carry out extensive raids on the Russian bases in this

In the Arras battlefield the British have been subjected to heavy counter attacks on their new positions won last Thursday east of Monchey-le-Creux. They held the last main portions of that important infantry positions, but had to fall back from some positions further in advance.

Two Men on One Machine Nearly Struck by Ore Train at Wells Crossing in Afternoon.

Two motorcycle riders whose names could not be learned, both on one machine, came near death or serious in: jury yesterday while crossing the railroad tracks at Wells. The two were speeding along supposedly enroute to Gladstone and approached the Wells crossing just as an ore train came along. Apparently they did not see the approach of the train and just as the train neared the crossing, the motorcycle shot over the tracks.




