**TO REPRESENT VASA ORDER AT MEETING**

Two Ishpeming Men and One From Menominee Are in Washington to Represent U. P.

Albert Bjork and Gust Johnson, both of Ishpeming, have gone to Washington, D. C., as representatives of the Superior district, comprising the Upper Peninsula, of the Order of Vasa. The national convention opens June 26 and continues for five days. David Anderson of Menominee, is the third delegate.

The Order of Vasa, which is a comparatively new society, is making wonderful strides, and is now the largest exclusive Swedish order in the world. It has a membership of over 50,000, and 340 subordinate lodges. There are eighteen district lodges, of which the Superior district, including Upper Michigan branches, is No. 10. Mr. Johnson, a past president of the district organization, is one of the two district delegates. Mr. Bjork is inner guard of the national body.

**SLEEPER ASKS THE PASTORS TO HELP**

Issues Proclamation Setting Aside Tomorrow as Red Cross Sunday in Whole State.

Lansing, June 23.—Responding to an urgent request from the executive head of the American Red Cross, Governor Sleeper yesterday proclaimed Sunday, June 24, as Red Cross Sunday and asked that special services be held in the churches and that liberal Red Cross contributions be given.

**Michigan Half Done.** Washington, June 23.—The Red Cross reports up to noon Friday gave Michigan a total of \$1,476,229. Ohio reported \$5,358,470.

**\$500,000 From Ford.** Detroit, June 23.—The Ford Motor company announced that it would make a half million gift to the Red Cross, which makes it possible for Detroit to reach her two million quota. The gift is in the form of an order for expenditure in any way the organization pleases. The company is now building thousands of ambulances. The gift may be used to buy ambulances or can be collected by the government.

**HIGH HONOR TO NIECE UPPER PENINSULA MAN**

Marquette, Mich., June 23.—James A. Pearce of this city, has received word to the effect that his niece, Miss Elizabeth Crawford, has been given recognition by the Italian government for her work in the Italian army field and base hospitals and that the order of "Cittadina Onoraria de Bagnaja" has been conferred upon her. This order is said to be the highest that can be conferred upon any person by the Italian government. The order was conferred upon her by King Victor Emmanuel.

### EMPLOYEES OF MICH. STATE TAKE BONDS

Practically All of the \$250,000 Subscribed for Phone Company Employees Is Taken.

Employees of the Michigan State Telephone company have taken practically all of the \$250,000 Liberty loan bonds subscribed for them by the company. With reports still incom-

plete, it is evident that the telephone employees fully came up to the estimate made by George M. Welch, general manager, as to the part they would take in the Liberty loan. The number of employees subscribing will exceed 3,700, says Mr. Welch. The part taken by the girls of the operating department is especially gratifying. The young women responded liberally to the call of the government. Many decided to make some sort of sacrifice in order to enable them to spare the money for a Liberty bond. The total bond subscription of the telephone operators amounts to \$87,000.

Superstitions of employees in the Central group of Bell companies, to which the local organization belongs, will reach a total of \$700,000, according to late estimates. These subscriptions are in addition to the \$5,000,000 taken by the Bell system.

The majority of subscriptions taken by employees were for bonds of the \$50 denomination, indicating the demand was largely from small investors.

### H. J. RUSHTON MAKES STATEMENT IN CASE

Denies Knowledge of Alleged Immoral Escapades of Man Arrested for Embezzlement.

Attorney H. J. Rushton yesterday issued the following statement in connection with the case of a young man arrested for embezzlement in which he repudiates the inference that he was responsible for the publication of an article published in The Escanaba Journal:

"To the Editor of The Mirror: "I noticed today in The Escanaba Journal an article in regard to a young man arrested on a charge of embezzlement by Mr. DeGrand. The paper apparently quoted Mr. Russell, president of the Detective Agency of Milwaukee.

"As attorney for Mr. DeGrand, I detected the loss of money, how large an amount I was unable to estimate. "In regard to the young man being connected with any prominent married women in nightly escapades, I will say that I have no personal knowledge of this. I did understand, however, that he had attended a party or two where there was nothing, as near as I could learn, of an immoral nature connected with the party or parties, but perhaps it might have been improper for some to have been there. In fact, I did not investigate very much in regard to the facts concerning those parties as I was not interested, and the same had no bearing on the guilt or innocence of the defendant.

"Mr. Russell and I do not agree on some things, and one of the things is that there are some things which might better be left unsaid. This man has a wife and two children who certainly have my sympathy more than I can say. It is a case where the innocent pays the debt of the guilty.

"However, where an employee is unfaithful to his trust, he must be brought to justice in a way which will harm the innocent as little as possible.

"The case is now in the hands of Prosecuting Attorney, Mr. Strom, and I am confident will receive his very best attention. I feel he is fully competent to handle the case without any of my assistance. The methods he will use in prosecuting the case are up to him, and I feel my services to my client are ended. I do not care to have anyone imagine I would be a party to anything savoring of black-mail. (Signed) H. J. RUSHTON."

### LATE FLASHES

(By Associated Press) Munitions Explosion. Amsterdam, June 23.—More than 1,000 persons were killed or injured or missing as the consequence of an explosion in a munitions factory in Bloeweg, according to an announcement made in the lower house of the Australian parliament, and forwarded in a dispatch from Vienna.

Red Cross to Russia. Washington, June 23.—The Red Cross will send an American commission to Russia to work along and behind the battlefront in the same way as a similar commission is operating in France and Belgium. In that way the army can be supplied with relief.

Urges New Government. London, June 23.—Reuter's Petrograd correspondent says the Ukraine military conference has called upon the Ukraine national assembly to cease relations with the Russian provisional government and proceed to effect an independent organization of Ukraine.

Germans Report Success. Berlin, June 23.—A French position southeast of Filain on a front of one and one-half kilometers and 500 meters deep was captured yesterday by the Germans; the army headquarters says. Prisoners numbering 300 were taken.

Considering Bill. Washington, June 23.—Consideration of the prohibition section of the food control bill began in the house today immediately after the rejection by a vote of 125 to 33 of the Meeker amendment to strike out the price fixing section.

### REV. C. A. LUND IS HIGHLY HONORED

Pastor of Swedish Lutheran Church Is Member of Board Directors of Augustana College.

The Rev. C. A. Lund, pastor of the Swedish Lutheran church of this city and president of the Superior conference of the Swedish Lutheran church, has been signally honored by election as a member of the board of directors of the Augustana College and Theological Seminary of Rock Island, Ill., for a term of four years. The honor came to Rev. Lund while he was in attendance at the annual meeting of the Augustana Synod of North America of the Swedish Lutheran church.

Rev. Lund attended the synod meeting as the president of the Superior conference of the church, and as a member from this conference of the Synodical council, which met from June 7 to 11 and arranged the work of the synod meeting. Mrs. Lund attended the meeting as the president of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary society of the Superior conference of the church. The synod meetings were started on June 13 and continued over June 18. About 1,000 delegates from all parts of the United States, Alaska and part of Canada attended.

A feature of the meeting was the celebration of the four hundredth anniversary of the Reformation, which was carried through the entire program.
