Delta County War Relief Ass'n Will Be Launched Soon

(Continued From Page One)
Four plans for subscriptions have been decided upon. One form is for employees of factories, shops, etc. By this form the employe agrees to subscribe from the monthly wages a sum not less than one per cent of their monthly wages, if wages are less than \$3,000 a year, and two per cent if over \$3,000 a year. Another form is for farmers who will be asked to give \$1 a month. Another is for business and professional men who will be asked to give one per cent of their monthly wages under \$3,000 a year and two per cent over \$3,000 a year. Another is for the employers of labor to give an equal amount each month to that given by the employes.

This plan in Delta county, it is estimated, will produce a fund of \$100,000 a year. The causes for which this fund shall be used by the association are:

- A. American Red Cross.
- B. Young Men's Christian Association.
- C. Knights of Columbus.
- D. Military relief of the American Red Cross.
- E. Civilian relief of the American Red Cross.

F. Any special call which may come with the endorsement of the president and which is for distinctive war purposes.

G. Any call that in the opinion of the executive committee will advantage the early and successful termination of the war.

The by-laws provide that the first dollar paid by each subscriber shall go to the Red Cross and shall constitute a Red Cross membership, and it is anticipated that for the year of 1919 and every year thereafter until the end of the war, the same procedure will be taken.

Everyone is expected to contribute their percentage to the fund and that no later than March 1, 1918, the names and addresses of all wage earners who refuse to co-operate with the association shall be published in the newspapers at the expense of the association.

The money raised by the association the by-laws provide, shall be distributed in an equitable manner to all banks in the city, and that the banks pay three per cent interest on the money deposited for the length of time it is on deposit. All funds raised shall remain in the city and county banks, who co-operate, until such time as a call is made in any of the above ways.

The officers of the association will be a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer and a board of directors of 25 men. The directors of the association shall have monthly meetings. None of the officers shall be paid compensation for service and only necessary clerical work shall be paid for. If the fund in Delta county reaches one above \$100,000 the executive committee has the right to stop all collections until such time as more funds are needed to carry on the work of various activities.

The articles provide that the membership in the association subscribes to a principle that "Help withheld from your country in time of war is help given to the enemy," and that friends of the enemy may be classed among any of the following:

Those who hamper the building of ships, of the making of war material and its movement, for which delays must pay in the blood of our soldiers and sailors.

Those who sit silent, apathetic and unconcerned in face of this world calamity and our national peril.

Those "neutral" Americans who have neither word of praise for their own forces or of condemnation for the outrages of the enemy; no word of sorrow or of honor for the lives sacrificed in our service; no word of solace or cheer for those bereaved by the war.

Those who cling to their extravagances, their ease, their costly selfish pleasures and the non-essentials of life, refusing any sacrifice to help win the war.

Those who refuse to save or to prevent the waste of food needed for our army and the allies.

Those who being able fail to aid the Red Cross and other war relief and local charities.

Those who being able refuse or fail to support the Government loans to conduct the war.

Those who evade their war taxes.

Those who fail to show honor and respect for the Flag and uniform on all proper occasions.

Those who fail to promptly resent any disloyal utterances within their hearing.

Those who fail to raise their voices when opportunity offers to awaken the patriotism of a dormant, spiritless citizen.

Those who are loud in their assertions of loyalty but short on performance of patriotic services.

It is the solemn consensus of opinion of the members of this association that any citizen of this county who shall be guilty of any or all of the above declarations is a traitor, and shall be held as such.

Pioneer Iron Co. Suffers A \$100,000 Loss Early Today

(Continued From Page One) of the employees were in the boiler room at the time, eating their lunch. The building crumbled like a house of cards and windows a mile and a half distant were broken by the explosion.

The plant is a wreck. The immediate loss of \$100,000 is regarded as less serious than the resultant idleness and it is said that the machinery, much of which was brought into existence by the war and very difficult to replace, cannot be fully restored in nine months.

Two men, Jake Sanderson and Dan Calacanti, in an out building where the explosion occurred, were thrown bodily out of the building, but were not hurt.

They have no idea what caused the explosion, which was followed rapidly by several others, more or less terrific.

Six or seven buildings ablaze last night lighted up the Normal school as if the sun was shining. All of these buildings are still burning and the firemen are unable to gain control.

All Frame Buildings. The buildings destroyed by the explosions and fire are frame structures, but the machinery in them cannot be replaced in less than eight or nine months, according to a statement by the officials of the plant last night.
