To The Citizens of Delta County

Believing firmly in the innate patriotism of the citizenry of Delta County, we, the undersigned Committee of One Hundred, of the Delta County War Relief Association, call upon you for your hearty support and earnest co-operation in carrying the plan of this Association into effect.

The object of this Association is to collect from all the people of Delta County a fund sufficient to meet the war relief needs of the future. The further object is to stop for all time and for all purposes all drives and special campaigns for war relief funds.

Every man, woman and child in Delta Countywho is an earner or who has an income, is expected to pay into this fund each month a sum not less than one per cent of his or her earnings or income.

For instance, a housemaid who earns \$5 a week will pay into the Association 5c each week. The man who earns \$3 a day will pay into the Association fund 75c a month. The man who earns \$100 a month will pay into the Association treasury \$1 a month.

Solicitors will canvass the County on Friday and Saturday, February 8 and 9. Make it your business to be there. Incomes above \$3,000 a year are to be taxed at not less than 2 per cent, and corporations and firms of the County will pay into the fund an amount equal to the total amount paid in by their employes.

The causes for which the funds of this Association may be expended are:

A.-American Red Cross. B.-Y. M. C. A. C.-K. of C. D.-Military relief American Red Cross. E.-Civilian relief American Red Cross. F.-Any special call which may come with the endorsement of the President, and which is for distinctive war purposes. G.-Any call that in the opinion of the Executive Committee will advance the early and successful termination of the war.

Our Nation is at war. The necessity for sacrifice by every loyal citizen was never more imminent than it is today. Yet the amount we ask the earners of Delta County to give each month to support your and our fighting men at the front is small.

Thousands of men stand ready and are today offering their lives as their sacrifice for their Nation.

You are asked only to give a small sum monthly to provide our Nation's fighting forces with succor if wounded and with the ordinary comforts' and care to which they are more than entitled in the trenches and at their camps and cantonments.
