GIVE 'EM A CHANCE!
Representative George H. Tinkham, of Massachusetts, has introduced a bill which would permit laborers who have served three years in the Post office department to take a non-competitive examination for promotion to regular clerkships. Mr. Tinkham contends that a man who has served such an apprenticeship would be far more competent to fill a clerkship than would an outside applicant who knows nothing of the routine of the Post-office department. Such a law would improve the efficiency of the department, and as Mr. Tinkham declares, would give the lower down a chance to rise.

AUTOISTS CAUTIONED AGAINST USING CARS WITHOUT NEW PLATES

Chief of Police Tolan Gives Out Letter From State Department With a Warning That Law Will Be Enforced.

Chief of Police John Tolan has called attention of motorcar owners to a letter from Coleman C. Vaughan, secretary of state, relative to automobile licenses, which he makes public with the announcement that his department will be on the lookout for any violation of the automobile license law. The letter from Mr. Vaughan is as follows:
"Probably not one-half of the operators of motor cars have paid their tax for 1918. Many are still using

1917 plates, some using none at all. We call your attention to the following:
"The tax for 1918 is now due, and machines cannot lawfully be operated until payment is made.
"The passenger car plates are green in color with white letters, and should not be used on any other type of cars.
"Dealers' and truck plates are yellow in color. Truck plates cannot legally be used on passenger cars, nor passenger car plates on trucks. Colors are different that frauds may be detected.
"Passenger cars engaged in carrying passengers for hire cannot be rated as trucks and should not be permitted to use yellow plates.
"Every car should be compelled to show front and rear license plates. Display of one plate indicates the other is being used on another car.
"Motorcycles carry but one plate.
"Every person engaged in driving cars or making that business a part of his daily vocation is a chauffeur, and must be registered. A chauffeur must be 18 years old.
"Every driver of cars for hire (owner or not) must be registered as a chauffeur.
"Dealers must use their plates upon their own cars only, and cannot loan or transfer dealers' plates.
"Plates cannot be transferred from one car to another but when cars are transferred, formal transfer of ownership must be made at this department.
"Specialty of the law collected goes into the county town where it originated and all tax payment for the benefit of the highway.

Colonel Petermann has returned from a tour of the upper peninsula and a visit to Lansing, where he conferred with members of the military board, has announced the makeup of the three battalions of the upper peninsula regiment of the new Michigan State Troops and the appointment of the commanders. These recommendations have been made to the military board and the adjutant general, and the oaths of office have been sent the several commanders.

All twelve infantry companies of the three battalions are now organizing. Colonel Petermann finds that in each of the twelve towns that will have companies in the regiment there is a splendid sentiment for the new troops and that the companies can be easily organized and maintained. All will be equipped as soon as the organization work is perfected and the oaths signed and returned.

The Twelve Companies.

thousands of bushels.
"Michigan must go outside to get the seed. But where, is the problem. Indiana, Ohio and Illinois have an embargo against selling seed corn outside the state. They need all they have. Canada with only two-thirds of Michigan seedage has purchased much seed corn.
"Representatives of the college, acting as agents of the Michigan War Preparedness board, have been touring many states in the quest of seed corn. So far they have secured about fifteen cars. But they are having trouble. We still need thirty-five cars.
"We can get none in Wisconsin, little in Minnesota; none in North Dakota, little in South Dakota and just a little in Iowa. New York has some

and from Pennsylvania we can get a little more.
"We cannot bring corn in from the southern corn states, because it will not acclimate itself to our climate in a single season. We have only ninety days growing season at best, even in the southern portion of the state. The number of days in which corn can mature in sections farther north is still shorter."
