GERMANY HALTS INVASION OF RUSSIA

BALFOUR SEES NO **BASIS FOR PEACE** IN HERTLING TALK

Chancellor's Proposed Acceptance of Wilson Principles Only "Lip Service," Foreign Secretary Says.

60 U.S. SOLDIERS GASSED

German Shells Disable Occupants of American Trenches; West Continues.

(Associated Press War Summary)

No basis for peace is found in the speech of Chancellor von Hertling by A. J. Balfour, British secretary of foreign affairs. In making the first official reply to the German chancellor in the House of Commons, he rejected the German suggestion regarding Belgium and said that the chancellor's professed acceptance of President Wilson's four principles was only "lip

In their advance into Russia the Germans are meeting with more resistance and apparently are unable to make much headway towards Petrograd from Pskov. Petrograd is declared to be the Teuton objective in the north. On Tuesday the Germans made no progress, or at least Berlin reported none, while in the south great gains were made in Ukrainia. German attacks on Vitebsk near the center of the front failed before the Russians, whose resistance forced the enemy to retire, Petrograd says,

The American sector in France on Wednesday was subjected to an attack by gas shells which had but little effect. Tuesday two gas attacks caused five deaths and the poisoning of 60 Americans. The majority of those affected by gas are not serious. German airplanes still are active over the American front, twenty-seven having crossed the line to the west,

Aerial and artiflery action on the British and French fronts is most severe. Eighteen German airplanes were brought down by French and 17 GARDEN SCHOOL British airmen and guns, while Berlin claims the Germans have accounted for fifteen allied machines. German airdromes, railway junctions and other military_targets continue to be bombarded by the allied airmen.
