Split Pea Soup.

1 can peas
1 pt boiling water
2 T fat
1 T flour
1 pt milk
1/2 t salt
1/2 t sugar
Scald the milk to which the onion has been added. Melt the butter, add the flour and milk. Add this to the hot milk and stir until the mixture is thickened. Add the peas and cook for 15 minutes in a double boiler. Just before serving add the well beaten yolk of egg.

Tamale Pie.

2 C corn meal
2/3 t salt
1 C boiling water
1 onion
1 T fat
1 lb Hamburger steak
2 C tomatoes
1/2 t Cayenne pepper, or
1 small chopped sweet pepper.
When a mash by stirring the cornmeal and 1/2 teaspoon salt in boiling water. Cook in a double boiler or over water for 15 minutes. Brown the onion in the fat, add the Hamburger steak and stir until the red color disappears. Add the tomato, pepper and salt. Grease a hot, deep dish, put in a layer of cornmeal mush, add the seasoned meat, and cover with tush. Bake 30 minutes.

Beef Stew.

1 lb beef
4 potatoes cut in quarters
1/2 pt green peas or 1 can
1 C carrots cut up small
1 t salt
Cut meat in small pieces and brown in the fat from the meat. Simmer in 2 cups of water for 1 hour. Add the peas and carrots and cook for one-half hour. Then add the potatoes. If canned peas are used, add them 10 minutes before cooking. Serve when potatoes are done.

Cottage Cheese and Nut Loaf.

1 C cottage cheese
1 C nut meats (use those locally grown)
1/2 cup bread crumbs
juice of 1/2 lemon
1 t salt
1 t pepper
2 T chopped onion
1 T onion-sage, meat drippings or vegetable oil.
Mix the cheese, ground nuts, crumbs, lemon juice, salt, and pepper. Cook the onion in the fat and a little water until tender. Add to the first mixture the onion and sufficient water or meat stock to make a loaf. Mix well, pour into baking dish and brown in the oven.

Turkish Pilaf.

2 C rice (cooked)
1 onion (small)
1/2 C water
Salt and pepper
1 t tomatoes
1 t cooked meat
1 T fat
Melt fat, add the chopped onion and cook slowly, until onion is yellow, add the other ingredients and cook slowly for 1/2 hour or more. Raw meat may be used, in which the onion should be browned with the meat before other ingredients are added.

Kidney Beans Casserole.

1 pt boiled kidney beans
3 medium carrots—cut fine
1 medium onion—cut fine
1 C tomatoes
1/2 C ground steak, chopped.
Soak the steak in a small amount of fat in a pan, add the other ingredients, and season the mixture with salt, pepper, and every salt. Bake the mixture for about forty-five minutes in a covered dish in a moderate oven, or until all the vegetables are well done.

Baked Bean Croquettes.

1 C baked bean pulp
1 t onion juice
1/2 C thick white sauce
Salt and pepper
Combine the ingredients and allow them to stand for two or three hours. Shape this mixture into croquettes. Roll them in bread crumbs, beaten egg and crumbs again. Bake in hot oven.

Lima Bean Salad.

Mix 1 pt cooked Lima beans, 1 small onion minced and 1 pimento cut in small pieces. Stir in cream dressing and serve.

Goulash.

2 slices bacon
1 small onion
1 can tomatoes
1/2 lb cooked meat (left over)
1 can kidney beans
Seasoning
Cut bacon small and fry with sliced onion. Add meat, ground or chopped, and the tomatoes. Cook slowly one hour (or longer in fireless cooker). 15 minutes before serving, add the beans. If raw meat is used, goulash should cook 1 1/2 hours or more.

PARKER RETIREMENT BRINGS FEELING OF SORROW AT CUSTER

Retired Commander of Cantonment May Be Recalled for Active Service, Army Officers Believe.

Delta Creek, Mich., March 1.—The recent retirement of Major General James Parker as commander at Camp Custer, was generally considered the saddest incident that has taken place at the cantonment since it came into existence. "To be as popular as Parker" has been the slogan of army officers in the Custer division of the National Army.

For two days before General Parker reached the age limit of 64 years and for more than 24 hours after he passed the retirement age, Camp Custer buzzed with rumors and speculation. There were reports that Washington would recall General Parker to active service, there were intimations that the general would be sent to France and then, seemingly from nowhere, came the report that Parker was to be retired. A few hours later the situation was cleared by an Associated Press dispatch which announced that Major General Charles W. Kennedy could succeed the retired commander.

General Parker's great popularity and his remarkable success at Camp Custer may be summed up in one sentence: he was a student of human nature. Officers at the cantonment have advanced many reasons for Parker's achievements but invariably their estimate is based on the statement that General Parker knew his men and they knew him. A secondary reason was that Parker was a foe of red tape. He literally murdered round-about processes at times, to get to the heart of things.

General Parker made no comment on recent events. He was in keen good humor when he received newspaper men on his birthday.

"If you are retired, where will you go," he was asked.

"I haven't any home," the general said, laughing. "I will have to pick one out, I guess. Forty-two years in the saddle hasn't given me much time to build a home."

Local army officers believe that General Parker soon will be recalled for active service, even though he is not ordered to command a cantonment.

TIMBER JOBBERS ARE HANDICAPPED BY CARS

**CAMP CUSTER WILL BE DEPOT DIVISION**

Capacity of Cantonment Will Be 80,000 As Soon As New Buildings Are Finished—Many Improvements.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS)

Battle Creek, Mich., March 1.—Officers at Camp Custer cantonment who have trained several thousand men who already are in France or expect to be there before many weeks, seem certain that Camp Custer will become one of the important depot divisions of the national army and that the select men will not go to the fighting front as an intact organization.

Contracts have been let to the cantonment contractors to construct a number of buildings. It is expected that the cantonment will practically be doubled and may be made large enough to accommodate 80,000 men.

A new pumping station, new heating plants, larger barracks, and a sewer and water system are listed among the proposed improvements.

### LESTER BROTHERTON WRITES OF LIFE IN FRANCE WITH YANKS

Local Boy Is Band Corporal and Is Proud of His Organization Which Furnishes Music at All Times.

From "somewhere" in France comes an interesting letter from Band Corporal Lester Brotherton of the 17th. F. A. Band, American Expeditionary forces. The letter is written to his mother, Mrs. H. O. Brotherton, and is published in part as follows:

Somewhere in France, Feb. 3, 1918. "I received your Christmas box and Charles received one from his mother too. Both came in excellent shape. The second class mail is all opened to see if there are perishable goods in the boxes and are closed again. The boxes were great and the candy was fresh and nice. Over here we can't buy candy like in the United States. Three small chocolates for one franc. Sugar here is not as plentiful as in the states.

"Charles and I spent our time sight seeing Sunday. I have souvenirs from all of the places and can tell you of them when I get back home. We went through forts, castles, cathedrals that were erected in the early years, Caeser's (L.A.). So you know what we saw. American millionaires come over here to see these sights and pay \$15 and \$20 a day for guides to take them to these places. We spent 24 francs for our trip, railroad fare, meals and all. We had a wonderful time all day.

"Tell Dad we play Beethoven's Fifth symphony, his Eighth symphony and Sixth, also Robespierre overture, the hardest "sax" part I ever run across. So you can see what sort of band Charles is in. John Bemis was in today and will come up tonight. The orchestra plays at the officers' mess some nights out of the week.

"If you can remember back of reading of Major General March being promoted to full fledged general and out back in the states as chief of staff you will know that General March was our commander of the brigade. Our band, the Seventeenth, played his farewell and got a fine sendoff from him. Two nights later the orchestra was playing at officers' mess and the new brigade commander came over to our regimental commander and asked him if the orchestra belonged to his organization. The colonel said it did and then the general said "you sure have a fine lot of men and fine musicians."

"The Seventeenth is still going high in the eyes of its officers."

He concludes his letter by saying he is feeling great and with a request for some toilet articles and etc., which cannot be bought in France.

On the French and British fronts there is no change in the situation in Italy all patrol engagements and artillery action continues.

**Abdication Demanded.**  
London, March 1.—The peace terms submitted to King Ferdinand, of Rumania by Count Czernin, the Austria-Hungarian foreign minister, include a demand that the king abdicate in favor of his brother, Prince William, or the taking of a referendum in Rumania regarding the successor according to a Berlin dispatch transmitted by the Exchange Telegraph company at Amsterdam today.

### CITY CANNOT MAKE LIGHT EXTENSIONS

City Attorney H. R. Dotch will report to the city council at the next meeting that the city cannot legally extend the electric light wires along the Ford River road as requested by property owners in a petition to the city council at the last meeting.

"At least 75 per cent of the fires could have been prevented by reasonable care and precaution on the part of the property owner. Hundreds of fires the past year originated from sparks and shingle roofs, defective chimneys and flues, defective stoves and heating systems, defective electric wiring, accumulations of rubbish and inflammable material, the careless use of gasoline, matches, cigars and cigarettes.
