With the American Army in France, Thursday, Feb. 28.—Swift retaliation has fallen on the German batteries which this week bombarded the American trenches northwest of Toul with gas shells. American heavy artillery continued its fire on the German Minenwerfer batteries for half an hour today and obliterated the

Many direct hits of high explosive shells were made by the American gunners. Limbers were thrown high in the air and explosions, probably of enemy ammunition and gas resulted. The ground about the batteries was churned upside down and if there were any German soldiers there, they certainly suffered death.

Thus far six men have died from the effects of the German gas shells. More than 80 are in the hospital suffering from gas poisoning. Most of these cases are slight and one man is reported in a grave condition.

The American sector is now ocean of mud and constant work is carelessness and lack of co-operation pits and dugouts free from water.

Lansing, Mich., March 1.-Frank H. Ellsworth, state commissioner of insurance, today issued an urgent appeal to Michigan property owners for cooperation, to avoid repetition of the tremendous fire losses sustained in 1917. The total loss was in excess of \$10,000,000.

We spent 24 francs for our trip, railroad fare, meals and all We had a wonderful time all day.
